(Continued from preceding page) by sunk the first of his two gifts. His second shot bounced clear of the rim and tall Richard Clear stuffed in the rebound to tie up the game, 45-44. Elgin raced down the floor but was unable to rack up a counter, and as Baker hurried the ball into the front court he was fouled again and he and Red repeated their foul shot-rebound routine with 10 seconds remaining to give Ione a 48 to 45 victory.

The Huskies jumped into an early lead, boasting a 13-8 first quarter margin, but the Cardinals closed in to 23-21 by halftime. Ione put on a scoring spurt early in the third stanza and moved into a 31-25 lead mid-way through the period, but Elgin snared the advantage right back and led 37 to 34 at the rest stop. Elwyn and Edwin Hug and Dallas Cason spearheaded the Husky attack as they moved into that prohibitive looking 45-36 margin, but coach Russ DeBondt's Cards weren't to be denied their 25th straight.

Edwin Hug and Red tied for high point honors with 12 apiece. No other player managed to tally more than nine, as the defense minded Elgin clamped the lid on the high flying Cardinals for all but those last two minutes and thirty seconds. Baker, who racked up 26 against Mill City Thursday night, marked up nine counters.

Burt Burroughs' Mill City quint had more woes added to its tournament misfortunes as it experienced one of its worst games of the entire campaign in the clash with the fired up Talent outfit.

The Timberwolves actually were never in the ball game after coach George Bray's Bulldogs, in breath-taking fashion, built up a 12-0 margin in the first four minutes. Talent led 18-7 at the end of the first period and had a 29-19 advantage at the intermission.

**Big Third Period**  
The Bulldogs made amply certain of the game in an explosive third quarter that saw them tally 22 points while Mill City was hitting but seven. Little Allen Hoffman popped in 12 of the Bulldog's marker in the big frame with six connections from the field and went on for game scoring honors with 19. There was virtually no doubt of the outcome as Talent hit the third-period rest stop with a mammoth 51-26 lead.

In sharp contrast to his 27-point performance against Ione Thursday night, Mill City's Elton Gregory suffered a frigid time of it with two points. Phil Carey topped the Timberwolves with 11 as they totalled but 12 field goals in their concluding tourney mix.

The Knappa-Heppner mix was a thriller, with the team from Eastern Oregon barely falling short after a stirring final-period rally. It was 51-49 for Knappa with ten seconds left when Heppner's Dick Kononen drew a pair of free throw chances. He hit one of 'em, but missed the one which would have tied up the ball game.

Howard Kauffman's Knappa gang led by varying margins throughout, with Bob Hunt and Eddie Elliott carrying most of the scoring burden. The coast quint had a 11-8 margin at the end of the first period, was in front 24-21 at the half then widened to 41-31 as the third frame ended. Heppner tossed in 19 points to Knappa's 10 in the last eight minutes—but didn't quite make it. Hunt led Knappa with 18 and Elliott had 16. Bill Hughes and Skip Ruhl each potted 12 points to top the Heppner attack.

MIAMI (AP) — The Brooklyn Dodgers scored four runs on one hit in the eighth inning Friday night to end the Boston Red Sox five game winning streak, 4-3.

Willard Nixon and Skinny Brown shut out the National League champions with two hits, both off the former, until Jim Ehler took over in the eighth. The right-hand-

er rookie from Texas walked four straight batters, then made way for Truman Cleveland.

An infield out and an error by Dick Berbert permitted the Brooks to tie the score. Wayne Belardi's single drove in what proved to be the winning run.

Roy Campanella, Brooklyn catcher, was hit on the right forearm by Nixon and had to leave the game. The injury is not believed serious but Campy's arm will be X-rayed as a precautionary measure.

**BRADENTON, Fla. (AP) —** The Pittsburgh Pirates belted six home runs Friday to rout the Milwaukee Braves, 25-11, in a major league exhibition game.

Frank Thomas clouted two of the homers and Sid Gordon, obtained by trade from the Braves last winter; Jerry Lynch, Jack Lohrke and Brandy Davis added the others. The six blasts gave the Pirates a total of 15 home runs in their last three games.

**PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) —** Willie Mays slammed two more homers Friday to spark the New York Giants to a 12-5 victory over the Cleveland Indians and snap a four game losing streak.

**ST. PETERSBURG (AP) —** Del Ennis unloaded a two-run homer in the first inning Friday and that served the Philadelphia Phillies for a 2-1 victory over the New York Yankees. The winners made only five hits and the Yanks seven.

**ONTARIO, Calif. (AP) —** Seattle stopped the winning ways of the San Diego Padres Friday, handing them a 6-2 setback.

Seattle slammed two San Diego pitchers for 14 hits, including one by manager Gerry Freidy which batted in a run.

Manager Lefty O'Doul used 16 players but his team was held to seven hits.

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## State Welfare Probe Sought By Umatilla

PENDLETON (AP) — The Umatilla County Welfare Commission Friday asked Gov. Paul Patterson to investigate the State Welfare Commission.

The county agency, according to M. J. Pinney, vice chairman, is disturbed over an audit of the county's account ordered last month by Mrs. Lea Howard Mason, state welfare administrator.

"The notoriety was tremendous, unnecessary and uncalled for. (It) showed a lack of co-ordination between the departments in the state welfare office and lack of proper administrative procedure..." Pinney said.

The audit was ordered after the county commission reported it lacked funds to meet certain expenses. The state commission maintained that the funds should be on hand and ordered the audit to find out why they weren't.

It developed that there was no actual shortage. Rather, it was a case of the two agencies not being in agreement on their bookkeeping.

Pinney also contended that Mrs. Mason was influenced in her handling of the dispute by the chairman of the subcommittee on welfare of the Ways and Means Committee of the State Legislature, Sen. Rex Ellis, Pendleton, is chairman of the committee.

**Dulles' Name Added to List Of 'Institute'**

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS commentator Edward R. Murrow said Friday night that Secretary of State John Foster Dulles was a member of the board of trustees of the Institute of International Education in 1935.

Murrow's activities on behalf of the institute in 1935 were criticized Thursday night by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis).

McCarthy was especially critical of the institute's plan for what he termed "a Moscow University summer session."

In replying, Murrow said on his regular news commentary Friday night:

"Now here are the facts about that Moscow summer school. . . I was the assistant director of the Institute of International Education. This organization dealt primarily with the exchange of students and professors between this and foreign countries."

"It was largely financed at that time by the Carnegie Corporation and the Rockefeller Foundation. Among its board of trustees were such as John Foster Dulles, John Basset Moore, Thomas W. Lamont and others equally distinguished."

"The Russian authorities abruptly, and without satisfactory explanation, cancelled the proposed summer school before it began," Murrow said, "and most of the prospective members spent the summer traveling in the Soviet Union. I did not accompany the group to the Soviet Union. No effort was made to revive the venture, and the advisory council was therefore dissolved."

**Oregon Leads Reforestation**

Oregon led the nation for the second consecutive year in reforestation of denuded state forest lands with a total of 11,509 acres either aerially seeded or hand planted, the State Forestry Department reported Friday.

The figures were taken from the annual forest and shelterbelt planting report prepared by the U. S. Forest Service for the period July 1, 1952, to June 30, 1953.

Largest share of the reforestation on state forests was on the Tillamook Burn which has been the major target for Oregon's self-sponsored \$10,000,000 rehabilitation program. In second place was New York with 5,944 acres of state forests reforested.

Major factor in placing Oregon at the head of the list was the research initiated in field techniques of aerial seeding during 1943 through 1949 by the State Board of Forestry which successfully demonstrated that direct seeding from the air was cheap and efficient.

By using helicopters, reforestation costs are approximately one-third that of hand-planting, foresters said.

**Hearing Due On \$200,000 Left in Estate**

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — A hearing will be held this week to determine who is entitled to the \$200,000 estate of a retired school teacher who lived here 30 years on the \$100-a-month pension.

The woman, Mrs. Susie M. Young, died Jan. 1, 1953. Securities valued at \$200,000 were found in a bag under a table in her house.

The estate will go to her closest survivor. That is believed to be Mrs. Julia A. White, a second cousin, who lives at a rest home in Astoria, Calif.

**Stocks Back Down From Record High**

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market backed down Friday in a moderate manner from the 24-year high mark reached Thursday. At the close prices were right around their lows of the session, between 1 and 2 points at the most.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was down 30 cents at \$116.10. It was up exactly that amount Thursday at \$116.40.

The average Thursday broke through the 1953-54 top by 10 cents and reached the highest point since June 4, 1929.

The industrial component of the average Friday was off 40 cents while the railroads fell 60 cents and the utilities remained unchanged.

The market remained broad with 1,190 individual issues traded of which 394 advanced and 496 declined with 75 new highs and 9 new lows for 1953-54 were registered.

Business fell just short of the two million mark at 1,980,000 shares. That compares with 2,050,000 shares traded Thursday.

**Dust Blows Winter Wheat Price Higher**

CHICAGO (AP) — Blowing dust in the winter wheat belt sent wheat prices up on the board of trade Friday. Wheat's action had a firming influence on the rest of the market.

Wheat closed 1 1/2-2% higher, corn 1/4% higher, oats unchanged to 1/4% higher, rye 1 to 1 1/4% higher, soybeans 1 to 3/4% higher and lard 10 cents lower to 20 cents a hundred pounds higher.
