

The present rule allows a second free throw if the first is missed. Floyd S. Stahl, chairman of the **Rules** Recommendation Committee explained the proposal made by Coach John Bunn of Springfield (Mass.) College would again make basketball a 40-minute game. No Automatic Throws If passed by the Rules Commit-

tee, the automatic two free throws in the last three minutes would be eliminated. The coaches voted Friday to ask

the rules committee to eliminate the quarter system in favor of two halves, thus cutting down on the number of stalls. Bunn's proposal was accepted by

Trojans Lose Penn State Victor 70-61 for 3rd Place

By BEN PHLEGAR KANSAS CITY In - LaSalle's mighty Explorers burst the Brad-ley bubble Saturday night with a brilliant third quarter spurt that carried them to a record-shattering 92-76 triumph and the National Collegiate basketball championship before a screaming crowd of almost 10,500.

Bradley's Braves, who had parlayed borrowed luck into a winning streak that carried them almost all the way, faded before the magic zone defense and powerful scoring thrusts of the Explorers after the halftime.

In the preliminary game, Penn State led all the way in taking third place with a 70-61 victory over Southern California. Bradley had dominated the first 20 minutes and led by seven points

early in the second quarter but its one-point halftime lead vanished as All-America Tom Gola with brilliant help from two fine sophomores, Charles Singley and Frank Blatcher, tore open the contest be-tween the third and eighth minutes of the third quarter.

Equals Huskies Total

The 92-point total broke the previous high in a championship game by an even dozen points and equalled the all-time high for an NCAA contest, set last year by the University of Washington. Kansas scored 80 points in beat-

ing St. Johns of Brooklyn in the 1952 classic.

The total 168 points also broke the all-time record, 165, in two different regional games a year ago. Gola scored 19 points before he fouled out. His tip-in with 4:28 left broke the previous 80-point game


