## Council to Put Money Issues on May Ballot

City legislation required to put several financial issues on the May ballot will be introduced at a City Council meeting Monday night in City Hall.

Extent of the ballot program for special financing of city projects will have to be determined by the aldermen within the next month.

The council members last month had threshed out a \$500,000 program tentatively approved for the ballot, but one major item has since been all but ruled out.

That's the proposed \$135,000 bond issue for fire alarm system and other fire and water department improvements aimed at raising the city's fire insurance rating and hence lowering the insurance rates to householders and business property owners.

But assurance that this program would lower fire insurance rates has not been forthcoming from the National Fire Underwriters Bureau. Several of the aldermen had announced they wouldn't endorse the program unless some advance assurances were made by the underwriters.

Whether the aldermen now will substitute some other projects for the fire alarm item hasn't been decided. Among the priority city works recommended by City Manager J. L. Franzen are several new bridges to replace the city's last, old wooden bridges on streets; widening of Center Street bridge over Mill Creek; some drainage and sewer lines.

Biggest ballot item appears certain to be the \$240,000 bond issue proposal for widening 12th Street, curbing to isolate railroad tracks, traffic signals and related items.

Also on the tentatively approved ballot list are widening of downtown Ferry Street, purchase of the Capitol Journal building, and permission for longer-term leases of airport property to private parties.

## Discussion of United Fund Campaign Set

The board of directors of the Salem Community Chest will meet Thursday with directors of local agencies not affiliated with the Chest to discuss the possibility of a United Fund campaign in Salem this fall.

The meeting was called by Otto Wilson, president of the Community Chest, and Elton H. Thompson, chairman of the Marion County Red Cross Chapter. Other agency heads have been invited to attend.

No decisions will be made at the meeting, according to C. A. Kells, executive secretary of the Community Chest, and the discussion will not affect fund campaigns now in progress or planned this summer.

## Teen-Agers Arrested For Theft of Lamb

Two twin-agers were arrested by state police Saturday in connection with the recent theft of a lamb from the Asel Eoff property south of Salem.

Pleading guilty to the charge was Ernest Antone Reinhard, 18, of 4140 Beck Ave. He was held in the county jail in lieu of \$1,000 bail. A 17-year-old Brooks companion was certified over to juvenile court. Both were charged with larceny of livestock.

## Oregon Group Asks Men in China Freed

MEFORD (AP)—Churches, civic and fraternal organizations and business men here have started a campaign to win freedom for two American newsmen who have been prisoners of the Chinese Communists exactly one year.

The two are Richard Applegate, a native of Meford, of the National Broadcasting Co., and Donald Dixon of International News Service.

Duplicated letters for mailing to the State Dept.'s office of protective division are being circulated among Meford organizations. Sponsors hope the campaign, designed to keep the cases of the men before the attention of the State Dept., will spread to other communities.

The NBC man is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Applegate of Meford.
