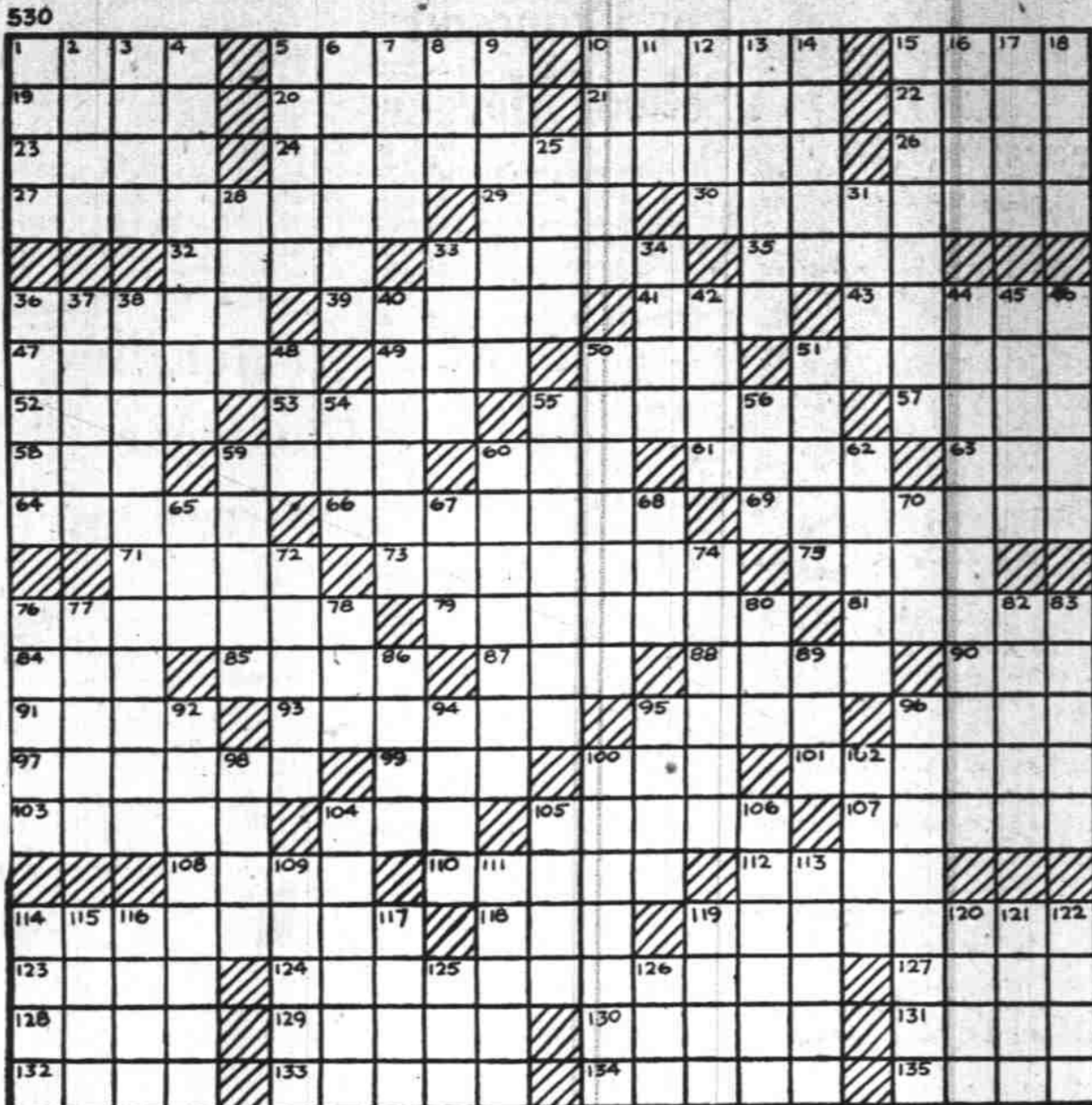


### Premier Sunday Cross-Word Puzzle

## U.S. Army Regulations in Germany Handcuff Cupid

HEIDELBERG, Germany (AP) — The U.S. Army in Germany is at war with Cupid.

That doesn't mean American troops are firing away at the chubby little nude: The fact is, the troops are all for him.

It's the U.S. Army's regulations concerning marriage in overseas commands that are out for cupid's hide.

The regulations — known as Circular No. 3 — outline in military language the steps a soldier in Germany must take in order to marry his German sweetheart and take her home with him.

The one that is a particular thorn in cupid's side states: "The approved date for marriage of U.S. personnel ... will, in no instance, be more than 120 days prior" to the soldier's departure for the United States.

This prevents a soldier from marrying his German sweetheart, no matter the circumstances, until his last four months in Germany.

One of the biggest arguments against the rule is that it encourages a young soldier and his German fiancée to set up housekeeping rather than wait until the Army says he can marry.

Doesn't Want to Wait  
A soldier who falls in love with a German fraulein when he first gets over here usually doesn't want to wait until the last minute to get married. Many of them don't.

A retired U.S. Army general publicly blasted the regulation recently.

Maj. Gen. Arthur R. Wilson (ret) said: "While preaching morality, the Army in Germany is actually sponsoring immorality."

"A soldier in Germany can marry any nationality in the world, except a German."

"The present marriage policy is discriminatory and an un-American slap in the face to the German nation."

Army's Position  
The Army's position is given by Maj. Gen. John V. Van Houten, assistant chief of staff, at European headquarters here.

"There's only one side to the question as the Army sees it. We are merely implementing existing regulations which have proved satisfactory."

"The Army has the responsibility of looking after its men. Many of the soldiers over here are draftees — 18 and 19 years old. Their judgment is not as mature as older men."

"The marriage regulations do not cause a major morale problem, but naturally there are some individuals who think that it is big."

Col. Edwin L. Kirtley of Enid, Okla., the Army's chief chaplain, says he finds no disagreement with the requirements.

"They recognize the God-given right of marriage, but they also give strong consideration to the national interest."

"The soldier has work to do and the brief time that most soldiers spend in Europe is not too long for a young man to devote to his country unencumbered by all the responsibilities of marriage."

### Faulty Indictment Delays Trial in Klamath Case

KLAMATH FALLS (AP) — Raymond J. Bodinet, 31, Portland, charged with armed robbery in a shooting at a bawdy house here Jan. 8, will have to be reindicted.

That is because the indictment said Bodinet and his companion, Edwin Coyle, shot to death by a policeman, each were armed with "guns." His attorney argued before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg that the charge was that each had only one gun.

When Dist. Atty. Frank Alderson admitted that was so, Judge Vandenberg said he could do nothing else than to remand Bodinet to jail to await another indictment by a new grand jury.

The shooting led to a crackdown on vice which has resulted in closing of the city's bawdy houses.

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### Rites Monday At Dallas for Mrs. Crider

DALLAS — Funeral services for Mrs. Nora E. Lyons Crider, 82, early pioneer of this community, will be held at 2:30 p.m. Monday at the Bollman Funeral Chapel. She died Friday in a Salem hospital.

Born in Shelby County, Iowa, June 2, 1871, Mrs. Crider came to Dallas in 1874 with her parents. She was married in 1901 to David Curtis Crider, an early resident and business man of the community. He preceded her in death in 1932.

A member of the Presbyterian Church, Mrs. Crider lived in Dallas until 1943 when she was injured in a traffic accident. Since then she had been in poor health and had made her home in Portland.

She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Roy Adsett, Salem, and Mrs. Marion M. Headley, Portland; and three grandchildren.

Concluding services will be held at the Dallas Cemetery with the Rev. Dallas Meserve of Portland, husband of a granddaughter, officiating.

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### South Oregon Tooth Decay Survey Near

PORTLAND (AP) — Jackson and Josephine County children 14 to 16 years old will be examined for tooth decay as part of a dental survey in different areas of Oregon.

Dean Harold J. Noyes of the University of Oregon Dental School said the study will be started by Dr. Demetrios Hadjimaros, assistant professor of public health.

Similar studies have been made in Clatsop, Coos, Deschutes, Klamath, Marion and Benton counties.
