Haymes Said Trapped Into Violating Law

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Dick Haymes' attorney said Thursday he will demand a congressional investigation of the crooner's deportation order on the ground Haymes was "virtually trapped" into violating immigration laws.

Attorney David Marcus said he is forwarding to the Senate Judiciary Committee the deposition of a former immigration official who stated he was ordered not to warn Haymes he might be deportable if he went to Hawaii. Haymes flew there last year to visit Rita Hayworth, now his wife.

The deposition was made by Richard B. Cody, 34, who resigned last January after 10 years with the Immigration and Naturalization Service to enter private law practice.

Color Tires New Business At Mehama

MEHAMA — A new idea in the tire business has recently been perfected and announced by the Phillippi tire shop at Mehama. The innovation is colored sidewalls for tires to match car body colors.

White sidewall tires have been well known for years but use of other colors is something new in this state. Phillippi tire shop has the exclusive franchise for the process in this part of Oregon.

Used tires can also be converted into any of the eight shades in a few hours time. Shades include white, reds, greens, blues and yellows.

First the side wall of the tire is buffed smooth. The colored rubber is then laid in place and vulcanized. A black curb guard is also vulcanized into place to protect the colored sidewall from scuffing.

Stock Market Makes Third Decline in Row

NEW YORK (AP)—A final hour recovery movement in the stock market Thursday gave a big cushion to the list's third straight decline.

Volume amounted to only 1,720,000 shares as compared with 1,900,000 shares traded Wednesday. It was noted that 570,000 shares were traded in the final hour and a half when the best of the recovery was taking place.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 40 cents at \$114.60. That is \$2.10 under the 1954 high touched on Monday.

The industrial component of the average was down 30 cents, the railroads lost 70 cents, and utilities eased 10 cents.

The list narrowed down to 1,142 individual issues traded, five less than Wednesday, of which 357 advanced and 493 declined with 36 new highs and 25 new lows for the year registered.
