Heroin Ring Smashed in San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Federal authorities disclosed Monday the smashing of a multi-million dollar heroin ring supplied by Red China. A big Hong Kong gambler was indicted as its head. Nine Chinese were arrested here Sunday as suspected distributors in San Francisco's famed Chinatown. One, operating the Fragrant Flower House, is accused of concealing heroin for his patrons in boxes of carnations. Undercover men nabbed the nine suspects after being offered so much heroin the agents were about to run out of money. Six pounds were seized, valued in the millions of dollars, on the illicit market. Federal officials said the ring was plotted while the Hong Kong gambler, Judah Isaac Ezra, 62, was in McNeil Island, Wash., federal prison. They said the co-conspirator, John Brown, alias Carroll, received the first shipments in hollowed-out magazines. Brown refused to talk when arrested in 1952, delaying the ring. He was sent back to McNeil Island. The heroin kept pouring in. Investigative Results Ernest Gentry, head of the San Francisco office of the Federal Narcotics Bureau, said investigation showed: Merchant seamen obtained the heroin at Ezra's Hong Kong gambling establishment and brought it over by various methods, including concealment in secret compartments of oriental camphor wood chests. U.S. Atty. Lloyd Burke said it would be up to the attorney general's office in Washington to initiate extradition proceedings against Ezra. The indictments accused him of specific heroin deals with Brown before the latter was caught and sent back to McNeil Island. Ezra had served time there after he pleaded guilty in 1953 to heading a million dollar opium ring that operated internationally, getting the opium from Mexico. After Ezra's release from McNeil, builders renovating an apartment house he had occupied here came upon a cache of morphine and heroin valued at \$337,000. In Washington, Harry J. Anslinger, federal narcotics commissioner, said a full report on smashing the big heroin ring would be made to the United Nations in time for discussion by the U.N. Narcotics Commission on April 19. Anslinger said definitely, "the source of the heroin was Communist China."

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3 Arrested After Wreck

A two-car accident four miles north on Wallace Road Monday night resulted in considerable damage to the two vehicles and arrests for three occupants of one car. First born, March 15, to Mrs. Thelma Chapman, 31, wife of Aviation Electrician Wilbur F. Chapman, was Susan Joy, weighing 3 pounds 14 ounces.

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7 Tornadoes Rip Through Midwest Area

Six separate tornadoes ripped through the southwestern part of Iowa and the northwest section of Missouri Monday night while another twister tore up some farm building near Riley, Kan.

No deaths or injuries were reported, but communications were disrupted, homes were damaged and some livestock killed. A series of four tornadoes struck Southern Pacer County in Iowa. One swept between Northboro and Blanchard, damaging buildings on six farms. Two other tornadoes were observed in the vicinity—one about four miles southeast of Blanchard and the other about the same distance southwest, both in Missouri.

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Babies, Conceived by Frozen Semen, Seem Normal, Healthy

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — There are three lively babies in the world, all under six months of age, who are entirely unaware of their place in the history of mankind. They are the first babies known to science to be the children of conceptions from the use of stored frozen semen.

The bare fact of their births, probably last December, January, and February, was confirmed Monday by Dr. R. G. Bunge, one of a team of University of Iowa scientists who instituted the study resulting in them.

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
