

Truman Says British Retain A-Bomb Veto

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former President Truman and Sen. Hickenlooper (R-Iowa) hooked up Tuesday in a sharp cross-country clash over whether Great Britain still has a veto power over United States use of atomic bombs.

Lincoln County Board to Pick Academy Site

WASHINGTON (AP) — A five-man board, including Charles A. Lindbergh, began Tuesday the politically ticklish task of choosing a site for the new Air Force Academy.

Working with the famed trans-Atlantic flyer will be two other civilians, President Virgil M. Hancher of the University of Iowa and Merrill C. Meigs, Chicago business man, and two Air Force generals, Gen. Carl A. Spaatz and Lt. Gen. Hubert R. Harmon. No chairman was designated.

The 126 million dollar academy, "West Point of the air," was authorized in legislation signed in 1949. The law provided for the academy to be located in a place of law by President Eisenhower last Thursday. Planned eventually to take care of nearly 2,500 student officers, it is to open July 1, 1955, with an initial class of 300, probably in temporary quarters.

The law which provides for the academy also directed formation of the five-man board to help Harold M. Talbot, secretary of the Air Force, pick a site. If the board's recommendation is unanimous, Talbot is bound by its finding. If not, Talbot will make the final selection from the board's three top choices.

Aerial Gas Stations Urged For Airliners

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gas stations in the sky were proposed Tuesday to the Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB).

The practice of supplying fuel to military aircraft in flight is old hat, but CAB spokesmen said this was the first proposal to go in for aerial filling stations for commercial flights.

United Nations Aviation Corp., a Massachusetts corporation with headquarters at Cresskill, N. J., filed the proposal. The company's idea is to sell gas to commercial liners in the air over the United States and way stations in mid-ocean.

Marvin J. Griggs, president of the company, said his proposal would eliminate time-wasting fuel stops for planes in the United States and would end the necessity for planes to land on the little oceanic islands for additional gas.

The whole idea, Griggs explained, would save a lot of time for commercial travelers and would extend the range of the flights.

The venture apparently is little beyond the idea stage at this time. The application said the company has no aircraft, but has the crews and know-how, and planes are readily available.

The application asked for authority to operate at these primary points: Idlewild Airport, N. Y.; Gander, Nfld.; Shannon, Ireland; Wake, Guam; San Francisco, Los Angeles, Kansas City, Miami, Bermuda, Azores, Seattle, Aleutians and Alaska.

"Secondary points" sought include: Oakland, Palmdale, Calif.

Scanlan Gets AFL Position

PORTLAND (AP) — Tom Scanlan is the new public relations director of the State Federation of Labor. He succeeds Kelley Lee, who retired last week.

Scanlan has been assistant editor of the Union Register. Scanlan formerly worked for the National Labor Relations Board in Seattle and also was with the Union Register, publication of the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers, when it was published in Seattle.

Yes, Britain has, Truman said in an interview at Kansas City.

"Not correct," Hickenlooper told the Senate.

"No comment," Truman said when asked about Hickenlooper's statement. "The record speaks for itself."

James C. Hagerty, President Eisenhower's press secretary, declared: "Sen. Hickenlooper is correct."

Everyone agreed, however, that no nation holds veto power over U. S. use of the newly-developed hydrogen weapons.

The question of atomic agreements flared Monday when British Prime Minister Churchill told the House of Commons it was the responsibility of "misfortune" of Clement Attlee's 1951 government that a wartime British-American atomic pact was no longer in effect.

Blames U. S. Attlee snapped back that the U. S. Congress ended the agreement, not his government. The agreement, he said, was cancelled by the U. S. Atomic Energy Act of 1946.

At that time, it was reported that the wartime pact, signed in 1943, had been a closely guarded secret from that time on. Truman disputed this Tuesday, saying many persons knew about it.

Actually, the agreement was made public in April, 1952, with the publication of the private papers of the late Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg of Michigan. Republican foreign affairs leader.

Vandenberg said Churchill and former President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed an agreement in 1943 providing that the atomic bomb could not be used against another country without the joint consent of the two powers.

The papers said that Vandenberg and Hickenlooper entered vigorous objections to the agreement when they learned of it late in 1947 and that an agreement with Britain and Canada was reached in January, 1948, to remove the British veto provision.

Thereafter, the papers said, "the final decision was left in the hands of the president, as specified by the American control legislation."

The Atomic Energy Act prohibits the sharing of atomic secrets with any other nation.

Portland Lifts Rush-Hour Parking Ban

PORTLAND (AP) — Protests from merchants led the City Council to lift its ban on rush-hour parking on downtown streets Tuesday.

Parking has been banned on some east-west streets in the 4 to 6 p. m. period for some weeks. Merchants said this was ruining their business in those hours.

The parking ban was imposed to speed traffic in evening rush hours. Motorists had found it helpful.

Industrial Use For Springfield Factory Sought

SPRINGFIELD, Ore. (AP) — Another attempt is to be made to find some industrial use for the wartime alcohol-from-wood plant here.

In an agreement reached between the city and Western States Development Corp., San Francisco, the firm promised to try to find some profitable use for the plant.

The city in turn will recommend to the federal government that Western States be allowed to buy the plant on a bid of \$186,500.

If no use is found, the city will have a reasonable time to try to find another buyer. Failing in that, the city will acquire the shell of the plant and the land for \$1, and Western States will junk the equipment.

City Schools to See H-Bomb Test Movies

A color-sound movie of Operation Ivy, the H-bomb test explosion in the Pacific last fall, will be shown this week at several Salem schools and military meetings under sponsorship of the Marion County and state Civil Defense agencies.

The movie will be shown at noon today at Parrish Junior High School, Thursday noon at Leslie Junior High and Friday noon at Salem Senior High.

It will be shown Thursday night at the Naval Reserve Training Armory for the surface division and at the same place Friday night for the Seabees. Salem Kiwanis Club has slated for its noon meeting on May 3.

Dairy Surplus Count Made

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department reported Tuesday it bought about 116 million pounds of surplus dairy products on March 31, the last day before the government dairy product price supports were reduced 15 per cent.

These purchases included 19,900,000 pounds of butter, 65,300,000 pounds of cheese and 30,900,000 pounds of non-fat dried milk.

On April 1, the government's dairy supports were reduced from 90 to 75 per cent of parity. Parity is a price declared by law to be fair to farmers in relation to prices they pay. Processors sold heavily during the last day to take advantage of the 90 per cent supports.

The department also reported that during the dairy marketing year ending March 31, it bought about 380 million pounds of butter, 463 million pounds of cheese and 669 million pounds of non-fat dried milk, costing a total of about \$60 million dollars.

Guards Block Burglary at Prison Annex

State prison guards surprised Tuesday two would-be burglars Tuesday night as they emerged from a building-site tool shack at the northeast end of the penitentiary annex east of Salem and an all-night search by state police followed.

State police combed the area to no avail after the pair ran from the shack and sped away in a waiting pickup truck, nearly driving over the guards.

Prison officials had been alerted to burglary or pilfering in the area when a skill saw and drill were taken from the tool shack sometime during the night Monday. Guards were alerted to check the shack carefully.

The truck was believed by the guards to be a red 1949 or 1950 Chevrolet.

Principals in Two Portland Cases in Court

PORTLAND (AP) — Principals in two of Portland's major criminal cases appeared in court Tuesday.

George F. Sack, accused of first degree murder of his wife, was granted until April 20 to enter a plea.

Jimmy Valentine, under indictment on two charges of kidnapping and one of attempted kidnapping, was granted a delay so his attorney could make a further investigation of the case.

Sack, 57-year-old apartment house owner, is accused of killing his wife, Goldie Sack, in an automobile trunk last Feb. 18, where she was asphyxiated.

Valentine, 41, is accused of attempting to kidnap 9-year-old George F. Brice III from Cathlamet School and of forcing the boy's mother, Mrs. George Brice Jr., and the family maid Lizzie Mae Brown, to drive him from the Brice home to the school.

Under question by police, both Sack and Valentine have maintained their innocence.

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Reply to CBS Show Given By McCarthy

NEW YORK (AP) — Sen. McCarthy presented a 25-minute reply Tuesday night via television to CBS commentator Edward R. Murrow's charge against him made over his program "See It Now."

Murrow on March 9 accused McCarthy of repeatedly stepping over the line that divides investigation and persecution.

McCarthy retorted Tuesday night that Murrow "as far back as 20 years ago was engaged in propaganda for Communist causes."

Between McCarthy and CBS, the text of the senator's filmed statement was kept secret up to the time of broadcast. However, in a reply prepared in advance, CBS said in part:

"The management of CBS has had ample opportunity x x x to become fully aware of Mr. Murrow's passionate devotion to this country and to the fundamental principles upon which it is built. It also knows of his equally passionate opposition to those who, either within or outside our boundaries, would subvert those principles."

Murrow made no comment whatsoever on the television program, "See It Now," itself. But he, too, had a printed statement in reply to McCarthy ready in advance.

He said in part: "Sen. McCarthy's reckless and unfounded attempt to impugn my loyalty is just one more example of his typical tactic of attempting to tie up to Communism anyone who disagrees with him x x x."

Solons Back Priest Rapids Power Dam

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House public works subcommittee Tuesday approved a bill to permit the Washington State Power Commission or local public utility districts to build a 360 million dollar power project at Priest Rapids on the Columbia River.

It is the first legislative approval given to any proposal in line with President Eisenhower's partnership power development program under which states and local communities would share with the federal government the cost of big new plants.

Rep. Mack (R-Wash), subcommittee chairman, said the bill was amended at the request of Rep. Angell (R-Ore) to assure that Oregon, downstream from the Priest Rapids site, would obtain a "fair and equitable" portion of the Priest Rapids power, regardless of what agency builds it.

McKay Bureau Funds Approved

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Tuesday passed by voice vote an appropriation bill to provide \$364,969 for the activities of the Interior Department in the 12 months beginning July 1.

In amendments, the House added a total of \$977,000 more than was recommended by its Appropriations Committee.

As amended and sent to the Senate, the bill would provide for a reduction of \$57,780,441 from the budget requests submitted by President Eisenhower.

Contracts for 2 State Road Jobs Awarded

Contracts for two state highway department projects were awarded here Tuesday.

One contract involves 12.23 miles of grading and 13.28 miles of paving and construction of a 62-foot bridge on the Sage Hen Hill-Hines section of the Central Oregon highway, west from Hines. The bridge would be of concrete construction.

Low bidder on this project was J. C. Compton, McMinnville. His bid was \$540,339.50.

The other contract involved 0.69 mile of paving the Burns (Foley Drive) paving project in Burns. Low bid of \$11,812.50 was submitted by J. C. Compton, McMinnville.

TV Station to Delay Start

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — KVAN TV Tuesday announced a further delay before going on the air, and said the Federal Communications Commission would be asked to extend the deadline on the station's construction permit.

Fred Chitty, general manager of KVAN, Inc., earlier said he hoped to be broadcasting in March. The time now is indefinite.

Chitty said manufacturers have been unable to deliver transmitter equipment, because such equipment is going first to areas that have had no television station.

The KVAN transmitter is to be located in the west hills of Portland, where two other television stations already have transmitters. The station's construction permit is scheduled to expire May 24. The permit is for channel 21, an ultra high frequency channel.

Italy EDC Bill In Parliament

ROME (AP) — Italy started a bill for ratification of the European army treaty rolling through the slow parliamentary processes Tuesday. It faces a long and rocky road before it will come to a vote.

Prime Minister Mario Scelba introduced the bill in the chamber amid loud Communist and Socialist jeers and protests. They are expected to grow in intensity and possibly develop into demonstrations and strikes.

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Lincoln County Grand Jury to Call Witnesses

NEWPORT, Ore. (AP) — The Lincoln County grand jury, which is in recess this week, issued a list Tuesday of 12 more witnesses to be called for testimony next week.

The grand jury has been investigating charges of lax law enforcement in the county.

Included in the new subpoenas issued were those for a former assistant in the district attorney's office, a former state patrolman, a former mayor of Newport, and the chief of police at Waldport.

Jaycees Back Fluoridation Of City Water

The membership of the Junior Chamber of Commerce went on record at their regular meeting Tuesday evening in favor of fluoridation of Salem's water supply.

This action followed a panel presentation of the topic by Dr. Willard J. Stone, county health officer, and Dr. Gordon Bickler, both Salem dentists. The discussion, moderated by Wade Patterson, county health educator, was held at the Marion Hotel.

Dr. Bickler, in his presentation, pointed out many of the fallacies in arguments against fluoridation. The film, "A Drop in the Bucket," portraying the ways fluoridation lessens tooth decay, was shown. Dr. Stone presented a picture of the serious dental health problem in Marion County and explained that much of the reasoning behind this problem is the lack of the fluorine ion in water supplies.

Dr. Schofield showed slides relative to fluoridation and told the group that in the next 10-year period, children that are born now will cost their parents an average of \$1.38 in dental bills. If fluoridation is instituted, he said, this can be reduced to \$39.

Charges of adultery were made against an Aurora woman and a St. Paul man in complaints signed by their spouses. Held Tuesday night in the county jail in lieu of \$1,000 bail each were Virginia Tauffert, 33, of Aurora Route 2, and Alphonse John Van Damme, 38, St. Paul.

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Salem's Fifth Masonic Lodge Makes Debut

Vista Lodge, AF & AM, the fifth Masonic Blue Lodge for Salem, was instituted Tuesday night under the tutelage of Thomas E. Lampkin, grand master of masons in Oregon and almost the complete array of Grand Lodge officers.

A total of 71 members of the new lodge were present and the remainder of the 240 present was composed of masons from throughout Western Oregon.

Officers installed during the ceremonies at Beaver Hall, 248 N. Commercial St., were Robert Williams, master; Raymond R. Hoffman, senior warden, and Harold A. Rosebraugh, junior warden. Charter for the new lodge, presently under dispensation of the grand master, will be presented at a later date. The lodge is slated to meet the first and third Tuesdays of each month.

Government To Sell Corn

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department announced Tuesday it will sell 170 million bushels of government-owned corn from the 1948 and 1949 crops at reduced prices. The aim is to dispose of it before it deteriorates.

Beginning immediately, this grain will be sold at local market prices, but at not less than 20 cents a bushel below the local 1953 price support rate for No. 3 yellow corn. Previously, the sales price had been not less than the 1953 support rate, except for deteriorated grain.

DAYVILLE, Ore. (AP) — Logging resumed in the woods near here Monday after a seasonal shutdown, and on the first day a strong wind toppled a tree onto Don Burrill, 19. He was killed instantly.

GRANTS PASS (AP) — Herschel Hon, truck driver for a logging firm, was crushed fatally Tuesday by a log that rolled off a truck at a log dump in O'Brien, Ore. He is survived by a widow and three children at Cave Junction.
