

Reds on Run on Home Front, Atty. Gen. Brownell Asserts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Atty. Gen. Brownell declared Friday night the FBI and the courts already have dealt body blows to Communists on the home front, and he outlined a program to destroy "this threat to our nation's safety."

In a nationwide TV-radio report on the "fight against communism" he called for such things as:
Laws to weed out potential spies or saboteurs out of defense plants; to "eliminate Communist control of any industrial organization or labor union in vital sections of the economy," and provide the death penalty for peacetime espionage.

Nowhere in the advance text of his speech did Brownell mention Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) or his Red-hunting activities. Whether one aim of the speech was to take the hall away from the controversial Wisconsin senator was not stated, but Brownell told his far-flung audience:

"The FBI, the Department of Justice and the courts are your agents in dealing with this Communist conspiracy. All are vigilant in their readiness to meet any move or emergency which the Communist Party in America might precipitate."

Picturing American Communist leaders as jittery over the drive against them, Brownell said that when they learned he was to make Friday night's speech they "became very concerned."

"In various sections of the country," he continued, "the underground leaders scattered and have tried to completely disappear for a few days to see what happens."

Paying high tribute to the FBI for ferreting out inner secrets of the Communists, he said that weeks before Moscow disclosed to the world last year that Joseph Stalin was ill, the United States government knew it and knew also that Georgi Malenkov would succeed him in the Kremlin.

The attorney general asserted that the information was given to him by the FBI in early February, 1953. It was not until March 4 that the Soviet government announced that its dictator was under the care of physicians. Stalin died on March 5.

Brownell told this story by way of re-assuring the American public that those charged with U.S. internal security know a great deal more about the Communists than the Communists think they know.

The attorney general prefaced his Stalin-Malenkov reference by saying that "for security reasons I cannot tell you about the great coup — espionage work the FBI is doing today."

Both the Justice Department and the FBI turned aside reporters' inquiries as to how an internal agency like the FBI would know what was happening in the Kremlin, but the implication throughout Brownell's speech was that it came from undercover informants who had penetrated the inner circles of the Communist Party in this country.

His address was a follow-up to President Eisenhower's telecast of last Monday night. The President discussed "fears and apprehensions" of Americans concerning the Communist threat, the national economy, and the possibility of further wars.

He said that he lined up Joseph Lears, 42, another ex-private eye, on the promise of \$50,000 as his share. He said Lears was "not too bright" and entered the kidnapping believing it was the real thing.

Jackson and Lears are on trial on charges of kidnapping Moskowitz last January for \$500,000 ransom, later reduced to \$300,000. No ransom was paid.

Jackson testified Leonard said he was in bad with his father Maurice, because of a real estate deal and was antagonistic toward him because he felt the elder Moskowitz had shown favoritism toward a sister.

He said Leonard wanted \$100,000 for himself but was more interested in publicity.

"A pound of ink is worth a pound of gold," he quoted Leonard as saying. He said Leonard expected he would "get a million dollars in publicity and would become, if not the largest, then one of the largest real estate men in the Bay area."

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H-Bomb Delay Due for Public Discussion

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) said Friday he intends to publicly discuss his charge that the United States' hydrogen bomb research was delayed deliberately for 18 months.

He told a press conference he would go into the matter in considerable detail.

He declined to discuss whether he has documentary proof of his charges.

"Our investigating committee took up the question a year ago as to whether to go into (the delay) in detail," McCarthy said.

"We never got to the point of voting on whether there should be public hearings."

Some committee members were afraid if we tried to disclose Communist infiltration on the scientific staff there might be danger of a slow-down."

McCarthy said he was perplexed by a statement by former President Truman that the order to go ahead with the hydrogen bomb was given as soon as the scientists were ready to go to work, and a remark by President Eisenhower that it was news to him if there had been a delay.

"Rep. Sterling Cole (R-N.Y.), chairman of the Senate-Atomic Energy Committee, said there had been a delay," McCarthy said.

"The chairman of the committee should certainly know."

"I cannot believe the three statements (Cole, Truman and Eisenhower) are accurate. They are three diverse statements. Someone must have been misquoted. They are too contradictory."

Services for Frank Kolsky, who died Thursday at the age of 84 years following an illness of the past several years, will be held today at 10:30 a.m. in the Howell-Edwards Chapel with interment at Belcrest Memorial Park.

The Rev. B. J. Holland will officiate.

Kolsky, a retired farmer and Salem resident for the past 25 years, was born April 9, 1870 in Bohemia and came to the United States at the age of seven years. He and his parents settled in Kansas where he lived until coming to Salem. He married Hattie Hudson in 1896 and she preceded him in death in December, 1932.

Survivors include a son, Frank M. Kolsky Jr., Salem; three sisters, Mrs. Fannie Brock, Thompson Falls, Mont.; Mrs. Mary Petrack and Mrs. Rosa Hess, both of Oberlin, Kan.; three brothers, John Kolsky, Stockton, Kan.; Ernest Kolsky, Kuna, Idaho; and George Kolsky, Lawrence, Kan., and a granddaughter, Laurie Kolsky, Salem.

Funeral services for the late Mrs. Fannie Brock, Thompson Falls, Mont., will be held at 2:30 p.m. today at the Howell-Edwards Chapel with interment at Belcrest Memorial Park.

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Benson Action Rapped, but Funds Okaved

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Appropriations Committee accused Secretary Benson's Agriculture Department of a "breach of faith" and "arbitrary and unrealistic" actions Friday and then voted it more funds than it had requested.

The committee took issue with the department's plan to shift spending emphasis from "action programs" to research and extension activities, and declared it is for Congress to determine the scope of various departmental programs.

It voted the department \$696,741,813 in cash and \$320,500,000 in loan authority for the fiscal year starting July 1. This is the exact amount of cash requested but an increase of 45 million dollars over the amount sought in loan authority by the department.

Appropriations for the current year ran about 36 million more in cash and 64 million more in loan authorities.

The bill, which was sent to the House floor for debate next Monday, cut some of the projects in the overall farm program and recommended that the savings be added to the school lunch program.

The department had proposed reductions in funds for the Forest Service, the Soil Conservation Service, crop insurance, the Rural Electrification Administration, Farmers Home Administration, school lunches, and for disease and pest control work.

The committee said many of the department's proposed cuts were made on "an arbitrary and unrealistic basis."

It also described as "arbitrary" Benson's freeing of funds for some of the "action programs" last fall, only a few months after the department had pleaded with Congress for even more money than was finally voted.

Labeling this a breach of faith, the committee said the intent of Congress should not be thwarted by freeing appropriated funds.

Dr. Bellinger Honored at TB Session

What was advertised to be the annual meeting of the Marion County Tuberculosis and Health Association Friday night included as well a surprise recognition for Dr. Grover C. Bellinger, slated to leave his post as superintendent at the State Tuberculosis Hospital July 1 after 40 years service.

Bellinger is to be replaced by Dr. Robert E. Joseph, his assistant for the past several years.

The retiring superintendent was presented a myrtlewood tray by Charles Feike, member of the board of directors.

Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar, retired executive secretary of the State Tuberculosis Association was at the meeting and reminisced for the more than 80 present the many years she had known Dr. Bellinger during his work at the hospital.

Guest speaker at the meeting in the First Presbyterian Church was L. L. Riggs, president of the Oregon State Board of Health, who spoke to the group on the subject of "The Present Administration's Policy on Public Health Education and Welfare of the Nation."

He reminded the group that the State Board of Health budget for the coming fiscal year has already been cut by \$100,000 which will mean drastic reductions of service in the study of cancer, tuberculosis, mental health and sanitation "unless the state will assume the burden of financial responsibility to make up this difference," he said.

He speculated too that one mobile X-ray unit may not be able to operate if this cut is not made up.

Report of the nominating committee to the group was that the uncontested nominees for office be elected unanimously.

Theft of Coffee Cleared by Arrest of Pair

An arrest in Portland Thursday night of an unemployed cement finisher has resulted in what appears to be the clearing of a recent wave of burglaries in and near Marion County, deputies reported Friday.

Apprehended at Portland was Robert Mason, 42, and Portland authorities said they uncovered a cache of stolen coffee and cigarettes at his home. One detective at Portland said he believed the loot came from a three-county burglary string.

Arrest of the man led to further questioning of Aone Emmett Wheeler, 19, currently residing at the Marion County jail on charges of burglary not in a dwelling and larceny of poultry. His 17-year-old brother is also charged the same and authorities said they are still looking for their uncle, Emmett R. Wheeler, 43, for questioning.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Wayne Stevenson said Friday that the teen-age Wheeler boys are held in connection with burglary of the King's Valley Grocery, in Benton County, last March 2, from which 44 cans of coffee, other canned goods and about 30 cartons of cigarettes were taken. The youngest boy is also believed connected with the March 24 burglary of Joe Marsh's Grocery, near Silverton, from which 15 cases of coffee, 44 cartons of cigarettes and other merchandise was taken, deputies said.

Marion and Benton County authorities believe that the Wheelers have been selling the merchandise to Mason at Portland. Aone Wheeler has been taken to Portland twice and has identified Mason, Deputy Stevenson explained.

John Reuter Succumbs to Long Illness

Services for John Pete Reuter, who died Thursday at the age of 87 years, will be held Saturday at 10 a.m. in St. Joseph's Catholic Church with interment at Restlawn Memorial Gardens.

Reuter, ill for the past six months, was born April 5, 1867, in Luxembourg, and came to the United States at the age of 21 years. He first moved to St. Louis, Mo., and from there moved to North Dakota where he farmed for a time. He married Elizabeth Harle, at Dickinson, N. D., in 1898. Since moving to Salem, Reuter and his wife had made their home with his son, Joseph J. Reuter, and his family. He was a member of St. Joseph's.

Survivors include the widow, Salem; a son, Joseph J., Salem; a granddaughter, DeNea Susan Reuter, Salem, and a brother, Theophile Reuter, at Luxembourg.

A confession by a convict at the Oregon State Prison Friday cleared up the burglary last January of the Pacific Rendering Company plant, 1725 S. 25th St. Inmate Joseph Robert Vicenzi Jr., formerly of Eugene, admitted in a signed statement the burglary of the plant from which several company checks were taken. He was received at the penitentiary last March 28 from Lane County.

He told officers that he forged signatures on three of the checks, totaling about \$120, and cashed them. He is currently serving two years on a forgery charge and action in this case has not yet been determined.

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Kidnapper Testifies Victim Plotted Scheme for Publicity
