Garden Time At Hand for Youths, Adults

Gardening season is at hand for the younger gardeners as well as adults, R. Ralph Clark, Oregon State College extension horticulturist announced Monday. And for the youngsters there are many awards in addition to the fun of a good garden.

Clark who is state chairman of the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association, said Monday that skillful growing, marketing or use of horticultural crops can earn awards of many kinds for Oregon boys and girls from the NJVGA.

In fact, four separate contests are sponsored by the youth organization in its 20th annual program of activities. All are eligible to Oregonians.

Contests Listed

These contests include:
1. Production and marketing contest, which stresses good growing and marketing practices of the garden project.

2. Demonstration contest, which is divided into four subject sections—production, soil fertility, marketing and use of horticultural crops.

3. Judging, grading and identification contest, which involves variety types, insect identification, diseases, weeds, nutrient deficiencies and grading.

Soil Fertility

4. Soil fertility essay contest, which reports on methods, materials and practices to improve fertility of the participant's garden soil.

Many of the projects carried on by 4-H youths can be turned into contest winners, Clark added as he said that the contests cover boys and girls from 13 to 22 years of age.

Locally, in each county, details of the contests are obtainable from the county 4-H extension agents and the advisers in the Future Farmers of America. The contests are not limited to members of either of these groups but are being supervised by the heads of them.

Duck Preview Weekend Due April 23, 24

Features of this year's program include a baseball game between the Oregon Ducks and the Salem Senators, the all-campus vodvil show, a water show, and educational exhibits. The weekend will close with a semi-formal dance in the Erb Memorial Union ballroom Saturday night.

The American Forestry Association will hold its 78th annual meeting in Portland Sept. 6-9, State Forester George Spaur announced Monday.

The delegates will spend three of the four days on field trips to the Tillamook burn, Bonneville dam, Mt. Hood, the coast, industrial plants and logging operations.

NW Oil Price Dip Possible

Oil prices may dip eventually in the Pacific Northwest due to refinery construction in the area, Salem Chamber of Commerce was told Monday by A. E. Horn Jr., Seattle, manager of refinery sales for General Petroleum Corp.

Horn said General is building a 35,000-barrel-a-day refinery in northern Washington, where oil will be piped from Canada.

This will mean lower transportation costs and new competition which, predicted Horn, would lead to other oil company refineries in the Northwest.

As a result, consumers should benefit from lower prices, Horn declared in his talk at a chamber luncheon in the Marion Hotel.

The new refinery is expected to be completed in November.

Sacred Music Concert Set Here Tonight

A concert of sacred music will be given at 7:45 this evening at the First Church of the Nazarene by the Crusade choir of the Northwest Nazarene College.

Directed by Prof. James Carhuff, the concert will include an excerpt from Mendelssohn's dramatic oratorio "Elijah."

The Rev. William F. Clay, pastor of the First Church of the Nazarene, will be guest speaker at a pre-Easter youth convention in Seattle today and Wednesday. Some 40 churches in the area are participating in the conclave which got underway with a banquet Monday night.

AF Academy Here Checked As Possibility

Salem Chamber of Commerce is checking the possibility of submitting a proposed site for an Air Force Academy in the mid-Willamette Valley area.

An Air Force selection commission already has 400 U. S. sites under consideration, is accepting further suggestions until April 21.

Chamber President William H. Hammond said a chamber committee has been studying the matter and was in contact Monday with U. S. Rep. Walter Norblad in Washington, D. C.

Biggest drawbacks to finding an acceptable site in the Salem area, said Hammond, are the high value of most land as farmland and, to a certain degree, the weather. The Air Force needs 15,000 acres.

But the Salem area, he added, would rate favorably in most other points considered by the Air Force, including utilities, water, topography, community aspects.

Swiss Family To Present Show at SHS

"Echoes from Switzerland" will be presented by the Fraunfelder family in the Salem High School auditorium at 8 p.m. April 28.

Sponsored by the South Salem Lions Club, the program is designed to raise money for the club's aid to the blind project, Del R. Downey, publicity chairman, explained.

The Fraunfelder family, composed of father, son and daughter, were born in the Swiss Alps and have appeared before audiences throughout this country and in Canada. The program will include both vocal and instrumental numbers and "yodeling as you never heard before." They have performed on stage, screen, radio and television.

Yodeling is a form of lyrical expression and is over 2,000 years old, the older Fraunfelder has explained, and is used as a means of communication by villagers across the Alps.

Admission for the Salem program will be 50 cents for children and \$1.20 for adults. Profits from the performance will be used for the club's project of aiding blind persons.

Music Festival On Wednesday

A music festival will be staged at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday by the Mutual Improvement Association of the Salem Church of Jesus Christ, Latter Day Saints.

Featured in the festival at the Salem church will be a festival choir of church young people and specialty numbers. Visitors are welcome.

Stadelman Appointed to Racing Board

Wilbur Stadelman, The Dalles, fruit packing company executive, was appointed by Gov. Patterson Monday to the State Racing Commission.

He replaces C. C. Curl, Pendleton, who resigned a week ago. Curl, who is managing Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry's campaign for the governorship, quit during the controversy brought on by several Oregon horse breeders.

These breeders threatened to strike unless Cecil Edwards, racing commission steward, was forced to resign. The commission upheld Edwards, and the Oregon breeders failed to appear at last Monday's hearing which the commission called to hear their charges.
