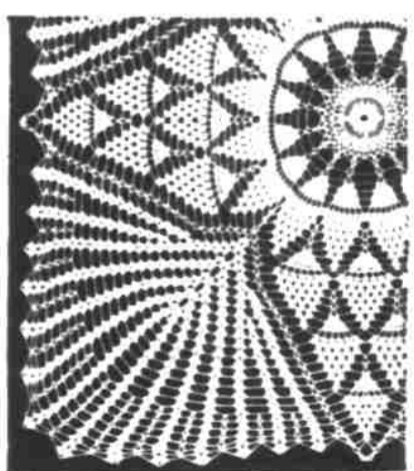
Luncheon will be served at 12:30 p.m. and will be followed by cards. Each table will be free to choose the game they prefer to play and there will be prizes.

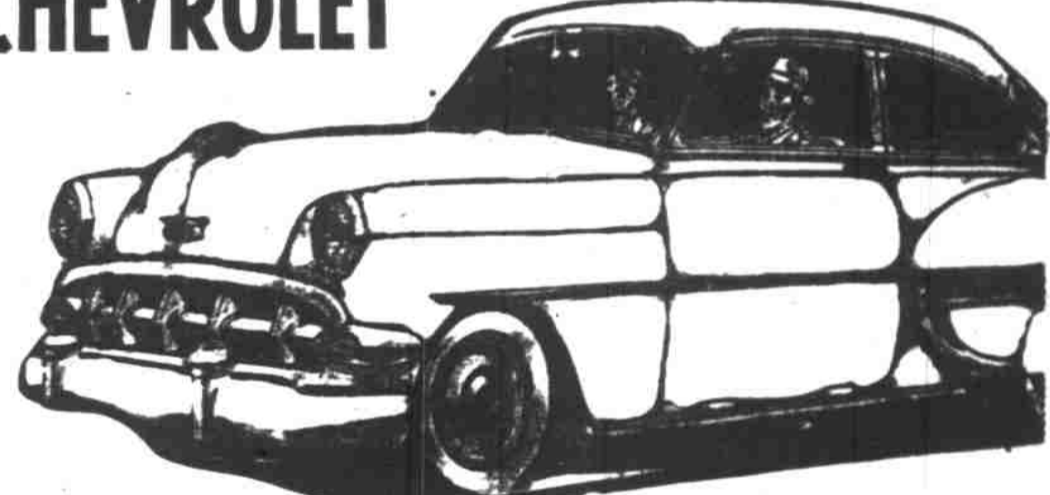
