Dedication of YWCA to Be In June

At the YWCA board meeting Tuesday morning plans for postponement of the April dedication were announced. Date will be set for early in June, at which time the furnishings will be complete and the public will have a chance to see the long awaited structure decorated. Mrs. A. A. Schramm heads the dedication committee. Groups from Eugene and Portland plan to attend the service.

Big project of this month is the P-TA breakfast April 23, at which the Y will serve 1500 people between 7 and 9 a.m.

The Barbershop Quartet, Rotary benefit for the Y, will be held April 23. Mrs. Maurice Saffron is the Y member managing the ticket sale.

Mrs. H. O. Schneider, membership chairman, announced 300 new members, many of whom have already signed up for classes. Her committee reports plans are well underway for the huge membership and donor scroll, which is to contain the thousands of names belonging and contributing to the Y up to the time of formal dedication in June. This will be a permanent scroll and will be kept in the new building.

Miss Gertrude Acheson announced that financially the association is ahead of any previous year for April. She mentioned two private gifts which will provide some major maintenance equipment.

Mrs. G. F. Chambers of the house committee outlined the policy for use of the building by groups not belonging to the YWCA. Reimbursement for maintenance of the building such as heat, washing and waxing floors and cooking must be made by all groups at regular meetings. However, community service groups visiting the building for the first time will be invited at no cost as well as benefit affairs for the YW.

The public relations committee announced its plans to take the project of finishing and furnishing the residence rooms among the rural women's groups, beginning with a talk at the Polk County Federation of Women's Clubs at Perrydale April 21. Mrs.

B. E. Hollingsworth was appointed to the committee in charge of radio publicity.

The board asked the chairman of the board of trustees, William L. Phillips, to investigate the possibilities of using the property at 141 S. Winter for a temporary parking lot for income until the swimming pool can be built. The resignation of Mrs. Deanne McMurren, adult program di-

rector, was accepted. Mrs. McMurren has accepted a position with a local radio station.
