

Burglary Suspect Nabbed by Police

An alert state patrolman was credited Thursday with the capture of Edward William Hanke, 23, wanted by Portland police for safe burglary and described as "dangerous."

Hanke has been the object of a statewide search for the past few weeks after a recent "cracked" safe in Washington reportedly had his fingerprints on it.

Portland police alerted the state office Thursday that they believed the man and his wife were on their way south on Highway 99-E driving a 1941 green sedan. In a previous alert to city police last week, Portland had advised extreme caution because the last time Hanke was in custody they said he threatened to "hold court in the street" if ever stopped by an officer again.

State Officer George Simons spotted the green sedan southbound near Hubbard at about 5 p.m. Thursday. He radioed ahead that he was tailing the car and asked that a car be dispatched to meet him and assist in arrest. At about that time he observed that the driver of the green car was "tail conscious" so he radioed that he'd have to pull it over.

Simons said the driver insisted that his name was "Green" and that he was not the fellow being looked for. The officer handcuffed the man and delivered him to Portland authorities who met them at Aurora. He said Hanke was unarmed.

Portland authorities hold at least two warrants charging burglary and burglary not in a dwelling, and Vancouver has one charging burglary with bail set at \$10,000.

City detectives were called last week to check on the rumor that Hanke was living in a Salem motel. They approached the residence with caution and learned that Hanke had left the day before.

H-Bomb Power Harness Goal Of Scientists

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Sen. Bourke B. Hickenlooper (R-Iowa), vice chairman of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, said Thursday American scientists are working to harness the tremendous power of the H-bomb.

It was the first public disclosure that scientists are trying to find peaceful uses for thermonuclear reaction.

While scientists have admitted the possibility of controlling thermonuclear power, they have generally assumed it could only be used destructively.

Speaking before the World Affairs Council of Philadelphia, Hickenlooper declined to elaborate on the new experiments, except to say there is a "possibility of direct production of power through controlled thermonuclear reaction."

He added: "It is not an impractical dream to look forward to a time when a comparatively few pounds of properly enriched uranium can produce power for great cities and eventually for most of the uses which an industrial economy would demand."

Death Claims A. S. Moody

PORTLAND (AP) — Alexander Skene Moody, 70, retired commercial vice president of the General Electric Co., died here Thursday after a brief illness.

A district manager for General Electric here, he became commercial vice president in 1936. He retired in 1948.

Surviving are the widow, two sons and a sister. Funeral services will be held here Saturday.

Mrs. Murry Mother Of Year for Catholics

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mrs. Margaret Rose Murry of San Francisco has been named Catholic Mother of the Year by two Catholic conferences.

Mrs. Murry has seven children, two of whom are priests. She is a native of San Francisco and for many years has been a leader in civic, charitable and church affairs there.

Churchill Has U.S. Pen Pal

WINCHESTER, Va. (AP) — Clifford Nicholson Jr., and Britain's Winston Churchill, are friends through correspondence — and have the same birthday, Nov. 30.

Clifford, 6, wrote to London's No. 10 Downing St. last Nov. 30 to wish the British prime minister well. He received a return greeting with the seal as well as the signature of the statesman. Recently he destroyed the Nicholson home and Clifford's prized letter. His Sunday School teacher informed Sir Winston and now Clifford has another letter.

Skull Fracture Possibility Told As Tot Quiet, Wants to Sleep

Parents of four-year-old Laura Jo Lyon, 1048 N. 5th St., became concerned Thursday when their daughter was unusually quiet and wanted to sleep in the early afternoon and indications are the reason is she may have suffered a skull fracture.

Observant neighbors and investigating city police can be thanked for alerting the parents to possible injury to the girl from collision with a car.

One neighbor, Ralph Elder, 1213 N. Church St., told city officers that he was working in his yard and heard a commotion near the intersection at Market and North Church Streets. He said he looked up and saw the girl lying in the street.

Another neighbor, Mrs. Betty Riley, 1185 N. Church St., said she emerged from her home about 1 p.m. just in time to see the youngster run across her lawn and into the right rear fender of a passing car.

She said the driver was traveling slowly and apparently had no knowledge that the child had hit his car. She described the auto as a yellow coupe.

When the youngster persisted in being groggy she was taken to a doctor and it was discovered that she had fresh blood behind the left tympanic membrane of her left ear, indicating possible skull fracture. She was slated for a x-ray examination today.

H-Bomb Set Off Underwater Most Awful, Say Reds

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet army newspaper Red Star Thursday warned the Russian public that underwater hydrogen bomb explosions are the most dangerous of all.

The newspaper described the effects of the H-bomb under water, high in the air, just above the ground and underground, indicating for the first time that the Soviet Union may have experimented with all these forms of thermonuclear explosions.

Demos Bypass Suggestion By Sweetland

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Democratic National Committee bypassed Thursday a suggestion from Monroe Sweetland of Oregon that the Democratic national chairman be barred from taking part in the party's primary campaigns in the future.

Sweetland, Oregon national committeeman, called attention to Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell's stand against giving support to James Roosevelt and Rep. Robert L. Condon in the California primary.

Mitchell took his stand because Roosevelt has been involved in a sensational divorce case, and because Condon was barred from atomic bomb tests.

The committee took no action on Sweetland's proposal. Later the committee applauded a statement by Edgar A. Brown of South Carolina, praising Mitchell's "great courage and leadership."

Steelworkers Weigh Motion For Program

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The CIO United Steelworkers wage policy committee weighed Thursday a motion to adopt a four point program including demands for higher wages and guaranteed annual wage as the basis for negotiating a contract with the basic steel industry.

The program was adopted earlier in the day by the union's 39-member executive board and handed to the wage policy committee for final approval before negotiations open with U. S. Steel Corp. May 18.

Other points in the program call for improved insurance and pension plans and better contract terms.
