WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dulles Friday night ruled out use of American armed forces in Indochina at this time but declared saving southeast Asia from communism may yet demand "serious" military commitments by Free World nations.

French Stand Rallying Topic For Far East

WASHINGTON (AP)—United States leaders sought Friday to turn the gallant but futile defense of Dien Bien Phu into a rallying cry for new, united efforts to halt Communist aggression in southeast Asia.

The isolated French bastion in northern Viet Nam fell to hordes of Red troops on the eve of efforts to reach a peaceful settlement at Geneva and while Secretary of State Dulles was preparing to outline this country's next moves in a radio-television address to the nation.

President Eisenhower, in a message to President Rene Coty of France, said defenders of the fortress should know "that no sacrifice or theirs has been in vain; that the Free World will remain faithful to the causes for which they have so nobly fought."

He added that "the battle will forever stand as a symbol of the Free World's determination to resist dictatorial aggression."

Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.), the Republican leader, referred in a Senate speech to the Alamo, Dunkirk, Bataan and Corregidor, and said the fall of the Indochinese fortress "does not mean a war has been lost, but only a particular battle."

The President called a special meeting for Saturday of the National Security Council, the government's top policy making unit on hot and cold war strategy.

Murray Snyder, assistant White House press secretary, said in answer to a question that he did not know whether the fall of the fortress prompted the call, but it appeared almost certain that the Indochina crisis would be discussed.

Robert Clinton Osborn, Gresham, was found guilty by the municipal court Friday and fined \$250 on charges of driving while intoxicated.

BUY WHEAT, BARLEY
PORTLAND (AP)—The Japanese have added 30,000 tons of wheat and 20,000 tons of two-row Western barley to their purchases under a recent Foreign Operations Administration grant, the U.S. Agriculture Department reported Friday.

Springfield Plant Put on Market Again

SPRINGFIELD, Ore. (AP)—The General Services Administration will invite new bids for the Springfield alcohol-from-wood waste plant. Sen. Guy Cordon has informed the Chamber of Commerce here.

He said the GSA told him it had rejected as too low a bid of \$186,000 by the Western States Development Corp. for the plant, built by the government during World War II.

The Eugene and Springfield chambers had urged the GSA to accept the bid after receiving assurances the company either would operate the plant itself or sell it to the Springfield chamber for \$1.

The GSA offered the plant to the firm for a "fair market value" of \$400,000, it told Cordon, but Western States would not pay that much.

Isolationists Form New Political Party

CHICAGO (AP)—A new organization called "For America" was founded Friday to "combat super-internationalism and communism."

The founders said the group is not a new political party but served notice that it will enter the fall elections "to fight within both parties for congressmen and senators who have the same principles" as the organization.

The new unit was formed at a luncheon in the Chicago Club. The host was Col. Robert R. McCormick, editor and publisher of The Chicago Tribune. In recent months the Tribune has been publishing a series of political realignments.

Clarence E. Manion and Robert E. Wood were named co-chairmen. Wood headed the America First Committee, which opposed U.S. participation in World War II until Pearl Harbor. He recently retired as chairman of Sears, Roebuck & Co.

Manion, former dean of the University of Notre Dame law school, resigned as head of a government commission after he spoke out for the Bricker amendment.

Members of the organizing committee are Burton Wheeler, former Democratic senator from Montana; John T. Flynn, New York author; Howard Buffett, former Nebraska congressman; Hamilton Fish, former GOP congressman from New York, and Manion.

A neighbor, C. H. Doner, 1431 N. Cottage St., said he didn't see the accident, but heard the crash as they hit and looked up just in time to see the Rosenfeld car bolt across the yard and into the porch. About 15 feet of shrubs were torn out in the path of the vehicle.

Ontario Put Off Limits for Traffic Delay

BOISE, Idaho (AP)—The Idaho AAA is recommending that motorists bypass Ontario, Ore., because of what it considers "undue delays" in handling traffic violations, but the mayor of Ontario said Friday he didn't see what good it would do.

"They'll still run up against the same justice of the peace and state patrolman," said Mayor Earl Bopp if they go west from Boise by way of Weiser and Payette, Idaho, rather than Ontario.

R. G. Cole, Idaho AAA manager, said he wrote three Ontario AAA motels last month, saying the auto club was placing Ontario off-limits because city officials had refused to answer his complaints about the "undue delay" of two Connecticut motorists following a traffic violation last summer.

He said there had been similar complaints from other motorists, but he only reported the one to Ontario officials. The secretary of the Ontario Chamber of Commerce, H. L. Logue, has answered his most recent letter, Cole said, placing the blame on the tourists in last year's incident. However, the AAA still is routing tourists around the town, Cole added.

At Ontario, Bopp said he looked into the complaint last year, and meant to talk it over with Cole, but forgot.

"Only 3 per cent of the tickets issued last year were to out-of-Oregon drivers," Bopp said. "We've had seven traffic deaths in the county this year, and all the victims were from out-of-state—six from Idaho."

"The only incident he mentioned to me was the one last summer, and that was the fault of the tourists. The driver's sister talked too much."

"We've taken it up with the Oregon and national AAA, and hope to get it straightened out. It's a shame for a thing like this to happen between a couple of neighboring states — the people from over here do a lot of shopping in Boise."

NEW YORK (AP)—Blonde Zsa Zsa Gabor, a diamond on her engagement finger and Porfirio Rubirosa on her arm, came home Friday from Europe.

She twittered coyly of an understanding with the play-boy diplomat of the Dominican Republic but added:

"We don't speak of marriage. We're petrified of marriage. Who isn't?"

However, reporters asked Rubirosa:

"Do you plan to be married?" "Yes," he replied, "why not?"

There are a couple of obstacles, however—Zsa Zsa's husband, actor George Sanders, and Rubirosa's wife, dime store heiress Barbara Hutton.

Zsa Zsa's divorce from Sanders is not yet final. And no legal steps have been taken to void Rubirosa's 77-day marriage to Miss Hutton, his fourth wife.

"When we are free, then we will be engaged," Zsa Zsa told the press, as the couple arrived at Idlewild Airport.
