Last Pro-Public Power Man In FPC Due for Replacement

WASHINGTON — The Eisenhower administration plans to replace the last remaining pro-public power member of the Federal Power Commission, the government agency which must decide the controversial Hells Canyon case and later act on various "partnership" dam proposals vitally affecting the Pacific Northwest.

Commissioner Dale Doty, a California Democrat, is scheduled to be relieved in June and replaced by a Republican appointee, as yet unnamed.

This move will shift the political alignment of the five-man commission to three Democrat and two Republican. The federal power act permits no more than three commissioners to be members of the same political party. It will give the administration its third appointment to the FPC in a year and a half.

Actively seeking Doty's post are John Mitchell, Denver attorney active in the 1952 campaign of President Eisenhower, and John Doerfer, now a member of the Federal Communications Commission, a Wisconsinite and a political friend of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

Power commissioners are appointed for five year terms by the president. Last spring Eisenhower appointed Jerome Kuykendall, Republican attorney from Olympia, Wash., recommended by Gov. Arthur B. Langlie. Later in the summer he tabbed Seaborn L. Digby, Louisiana attorney and, though a Democrat, an Eisenhower backer in the 1952 campaign. Kuykendall and Digby both replaced Democrats.

Others on the FPC, at least until their present terms expire, are: Claude L. Draper, Wyoming Republican, first appointed by President Hoover, and Nelson L. Smith, New Hampshire Independent, appointed in 1943 by President Roosevelt.

Doty has been on the FPC only since 1952 when he won a short term appointment by President Truman to fill the vacancy left by the 1951 resignation of Mon C. Wallgren. Previously, Doty had been assistant secretary of Interior for land management under Oscar Chapman.

Doty and Smith were the only two members of the present commission thought to be both sympathetic to and reasonably well versed in the concept of comprehensive river basin development by the federal government. Kuykendall is presumed to be familiar with this idea, but his inclinations are largely unknown, inasmuch as the FPC since his appointment has decided no cases that might permit such an evaluation.

The FPC has decided one major case since his appointment in which the issue of public vs. private was a side issue. That was last July in approving an application of the New York State Power Authority to develop the power potential of the St. Lawrence seaway project.

Doty Dissents
Only Doty dissented from one conclusion of the other commissioners: that the FPC had no authority to require New York to give preference in power sales to public power agencies. Bolstering his opinion with Supreme Court decisions upholding FPC authority on this point, Doty concluded:

"Only by the proposed preference condition can we be certain that the power developed by the St. Lawrence project will be marketed in such manner as to encourage the most widespread use thereof at the lowest possible rates to consumers, which are the reasons which impelled Congress to impose similar preference provisions respecting the disposition of power from federal projects."

While the commissioners all agreed New York should develop the project, Chairman Kuykendall, Smith and Draper opposed the preference clause provisions in the license they granted. Digby had not then been appointed.

Stock Market Shows Bounce

NEW YORK — The stock market exhibited a major amount of bounce Wednesday in an advance that offset Tuesday's losses.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks gained 80 cents at \$123.70. That was the amount of the loss Tuesday, and the average now stands again at the peak of the year, the best since April 17, 1930.

The industrial component of the average was up \$1.30 at a new high mark of \$168.20, and the utilities also established a new high of \$59.90 up 10 cents. The railroads gained 90 cents at \$90.50.

The list contained 1,192 individual issues traded of which 679 advanced and 258 declined with 105 new highs and 9 new lows for the year touched during the day.

Tuesday with the market falling there were only 1,770,000 shares traded, but Wednesday on the rise 2,210,000 shares changed hands.

Forest Road Program for Year Approved

PORTLAND — A \$2,030,000 forest highway program for the fiscal year 1955 was approved Wednesday by the Oregon Highway Commission and representatives of the Bureau of Public Roads and the U. S. Forest Service.

Projects include Ochoco \$400,000, Willamette \$450,000, Flora-Enterprise \$330,000, Belknap-Clear Lake \$350,000, Tiller Trail \$100,000, Ukiah-Starkey \$280,000, and North Umpqua \$120,000.

It was agreed to hold back the Zigzag-Government Camp project until 1956, when it will get first priority with another Mt. Hood highway project.

At its monthly meeting the Highway Commission told the South Tillamook Coast Road Committee no money is available for improvement of the Little Nestucca secondary highway. But the commission promised to consider the project for priority in the next secondary highway program.

U.S. Reveals Red Handbook For Indochina

WASHINGTON — A federal agency Wednesday made public a top-secret Chinese Communist government "handbook" which guides the activities of some of the thousands of "volunteers" who are helping Indochinese Reds fight French Union forces.

The agency said the 3,000-word "handbook" was included among instructions issued by a Red Chinese organization known as "The Chinese People's Volunteers To Help Viet Nam."

The agency, which stipulated it not be named, did not disclose how it obtained a copy of the document, dated Dec. 15, 1952, but presumably it was smuggled from the mainland by intelligence agents.

"In this context," said the agency's report, use of term "volunteer" recalls the massive Chinese Communist intervention in the Korean War and the arrogant persistence of the Chinese Communist regime in referring to their organized armies and air units participating in that aggression as "volunteers."

A translation of the "Handbook for Political Workers Going to Viet Nam" shows these agents are instructed to "precede the troops in facing risks for the purpose of using every means to increase the fighting spirit" of Indochinese Reds.

The Chinese agents are instructed to turn over all prisoners captured to Chinese Communist headquarters for questioning first and later to the Vietnamese Communist headquarters.

The booklet warns Chinese "volunteers" against drinking unboiled water and against consuming "uncooked pig's blood" because of the possibility of poisoning.

The agency's report on the Chinese "penetration of Indochina" also mentions Soviet personnel helping the Indochinese rebels.
