Fenix Accepts Job at School In California

Vice President Robert W. Fenix will leave Willamette University this summer to become comptroller of Occidental College, Los Angeles. Fenix has been business manager and financial vice president at Willamette for 11 years. He will leave here June 30 and take over his new job in August.

Expressing regret at leaving Salem, Fenix said, "It has been a difficult decision to leave Willamette after the many years of close relationship with the administration, trustees, faculty and students."

Dr. G. Herbert Smith, Willamette president, praised Fenix for his part in development of the university here since 1943.

Fenix is a past president of two regional associations of university business officers. He is a graduate of College of the Pacific and Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration.

Fenix is past president of Salem Chamber of Commerce and has been secretary of Salem Rotary Club for several years.

Board Opens Parole Path For Pen Lifer

Tentative action to parole Theodore Jordan, 48, under life penitentiary sentence for slaying a Southern Pacific railroad dining car conductor in Klamath Falls in 1932, was announced by H. M. Randall, director of the Oregon state parole and probation board Wednesday.

Randall indicated that final action probably would depend on whether Jordan will accept the terms of the parole and a job can be found for him.

Jordan, a Negro, originally was sentenced to death for the hold-up murder but the late Governor Julius Meier commuted his sentence in 1934 to life imprisonment. The commutation followed an investigation by a commission appointed by Governor Meier who reported there could be some doubt as to Jordan's guilt.

Penitentiary officials said Wednesday Jordan had been a model prisoner for several years and has been employed as a trustee on the prison farm located four miles east of Salem.

For a number of years after being received at the prison he gave the officials a lot of trouble and was involved in a series of fires which destroyed several flax sheds with a loss estimated in excess of \$500,000.

Jordan has gained considerable education through correspondence courses while in prison.

He was recommended for parole by penitentiary officials, Randall said.

AF Pilot Enlistees Need 2 College Years

Two years of college training will be required of men enlisting in the Air Force for pilot or aircraft observer training after May 31, T. Sgt. William F. Vanderpool, Salem recruiter, revealed Thursday.

For the rest of this month high school graduates who qualify physically and mentally will be accepted, he said.

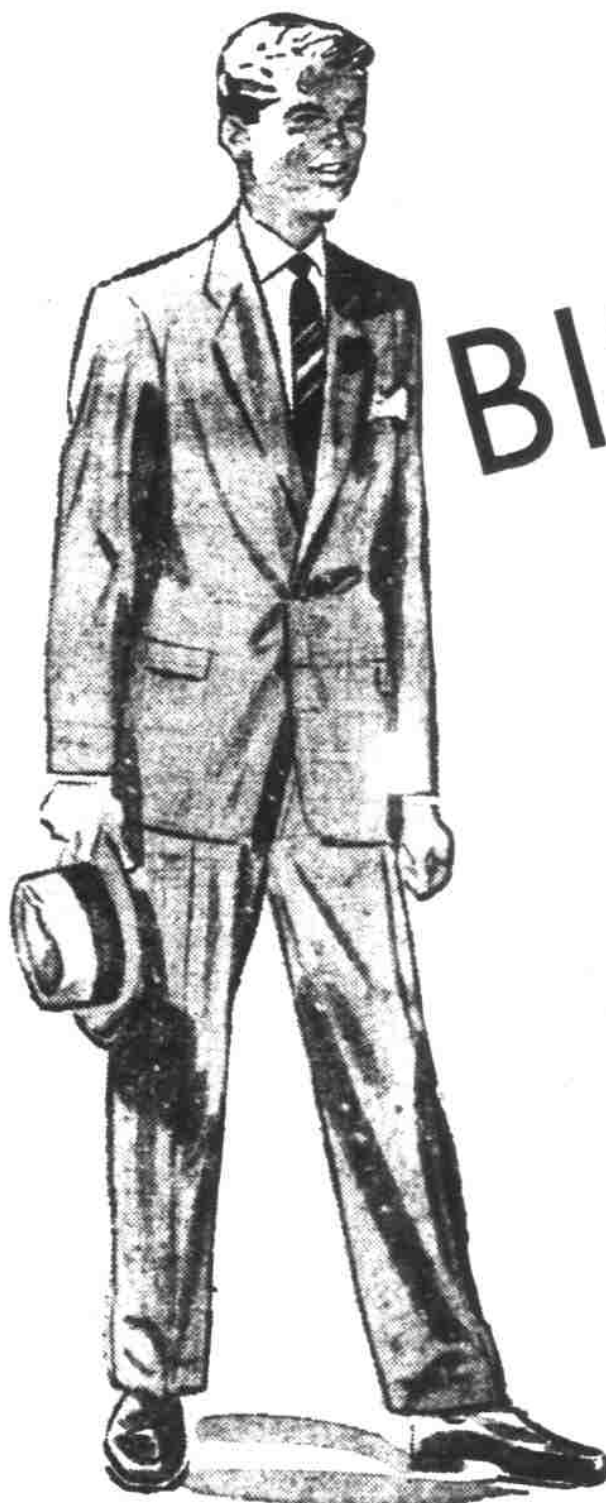

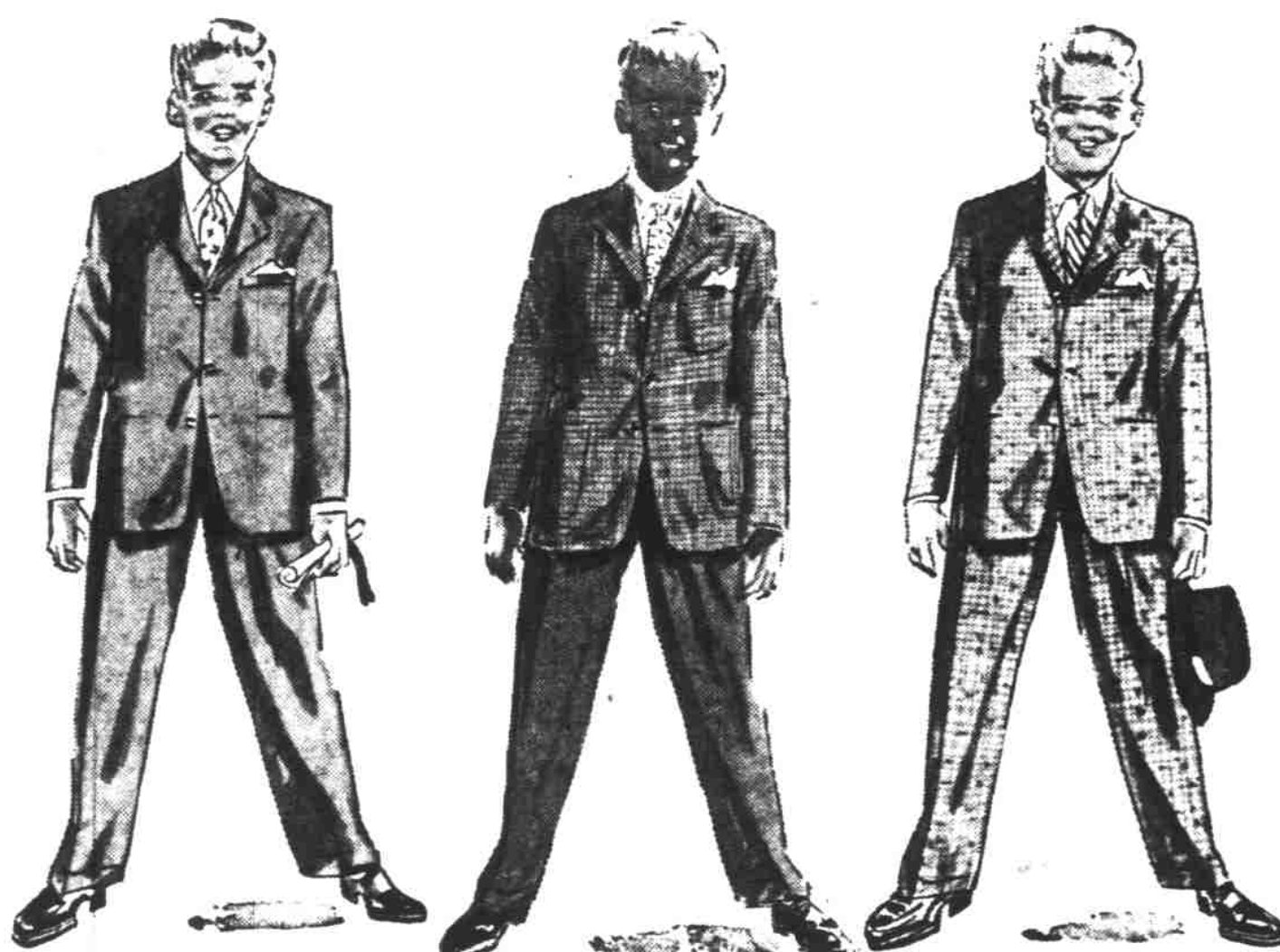
