Marion County voters have a relatively slim ballot list facing them at today's primary election. No contests appear in state and county offices listed on the Democratic ballot.

The Democrat candidates are: U. S. senator, Richard L. Neuberger; congressman, Donnell Mitchell; governor, Joseph K. Carson Jr.; labor commissioner, Norman O. Nilsen; state senator, Cecil J. Farnes; state representative, Guy Jonas; county commissioner, A. M. Vistica.

GOP Candidates
Republican candidates are: U. S. Senator, Guy Cordon; congressman, Walter Norblad; governor, Earl T. Newbery and Paul Patterson; labor commissioner, S. Eugene Allen and H. E. Barker; state senator (nominate two), Mark Hatfield, Lee Ohmart and Douglas Yeater.

Mt. Angel district is to have a write-in ballot for justice of the peace, as no candidates filed. Other districts have no JP's on the ballot as they are unopposed and will be listed in November's ballot.

County Measures
Two county ballot measures are those proposing a special tax levy to build and operate a juvenile home and proposing authority for enacting county zoning.

Four ballot measures will face city of Salem voters:
Charter change to allow lease of airport property for longer than five years; \$200,000 bond issue for 12th Street widening, extension, new bridge and curb separation of rail tracks from street; \$100,000 bond issue for purchase and remodeling of Capital Journal building for city uses; \$65,000 bond issue for widening downtown Ferry Street and resurfacing and widening South River Road inside the city.

Luxury Africa Safari Cooked Up in Chicago

CHICAGO (INS)—Want to get away from the heat this summer? Try South Africa.

A luxury safari is being cooked up in Chicago and topcoats are in order. Zoo director Marlin Perkins says:

"It gets nippy in Johannesburg."

Perkins, director of Chicago's Lincoln Park Zoo and star of a television animal show, is conducting the jaunt.

No Guns
It is a 42-day plane train-limousine tour with hotel stopoffs at Nairobi, Livingstone, Kimberley, Cape Town, Natal and Durban, dubbed the "African Riviera."

Return trip is via Rome, Italy. The route was mapped by Mrs. Edward J. Kelly, whose husband heads a Chicago travel service. She says:

The party then continues to Zululand, the famous Hluhluwe game reserve, Swaziland, Kruger national park and the gold mining center of Pietersburg.

Perkins says the party is limited to 20 persons in addition to Mrs. Kelly and him. They will leave Chicago July 3 and return August 13. Air flights are arranged from Chicago to New York to London to Livingstone, South Africa.

The price? Those traveling from Chicago and back will pay \$3,869. Those joining at New York pay \$3,775.

Streamlined French Army Slated for Tests in Field

PARIS (INS)—A proposed "new look" for the French Army, tailored to fit the atomic age, faces its first field tests this summer.

Defense Minister Rene Pleven said in the National Assembly that experiments with "new types" of large military units would take place in 1954 but failed to give details.

The results of these forward-looking tests will be closely followed by Western military observers because of their potential effect on the planning of the ground defense of Europe.

It is reliably understood that the experiments, besides taking into account the present-day development of strategic and tactical nuclear weapons, will also seek to develop an effective formula to match the now-familiar "human sea" tactics used by the Russians and their satellites.

Total War Expected
The experiments, International News Service learned, will be based on the premise that the next war will be total, immediate, simultaneous and mobile.

These four conditions, it was explained, rule out a leisurely general mobilization.

The immediate and simultaneous character of a future conflict will require the formation of self-contained military units of capable of taking up the fight at once on their own resources.

Moreover, the total aspect of the fight, with probable aerial or guided missile attacks on population centers at its very outset, is likely to create, such a state of confusion that it will become virtually impossible to assemble, equip and move large, conventional military units according to present practices.

Manpower Lack
The mobility angle, it was further pointed out, will have a decisive influence in ground fighting in Europe because of the west's lack of sufficient manpower to hold an unbroken front.

The North Atlantic Treaty Organization's central European front, from the Alps to the Baltic, extends over 500 miles, while the whole NATO Defense, perimeter, from Turkey to Norway, runs to 4,000 miles.

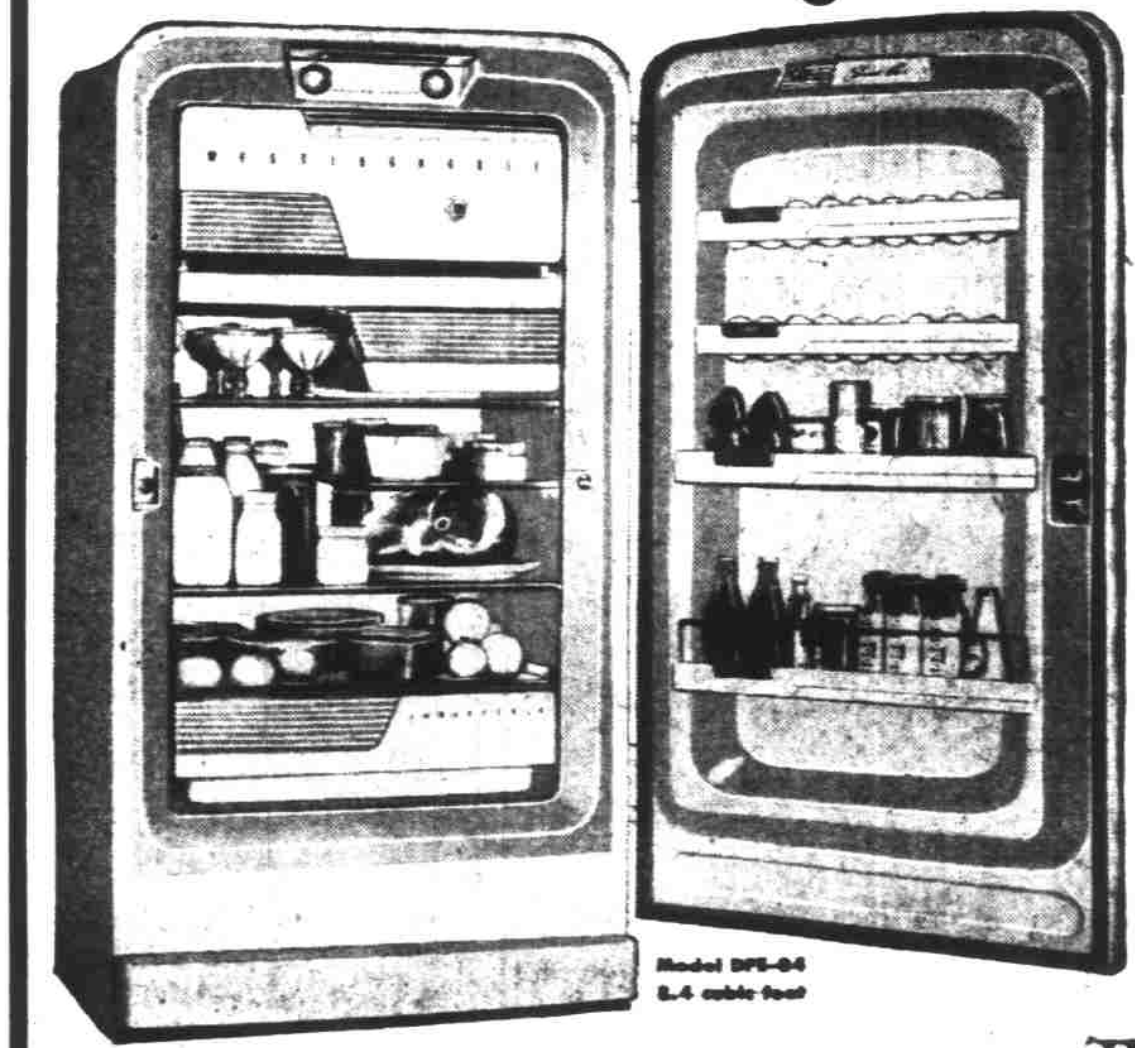
