## Yamhill Rural Budget Favored

McMINNVILLE — Yamhill County's rural school budget was approved by a four-to-one margin on the basis of nearly complete returns from the 22 school districts involved. Latest count showed the budget leading 107 to 37.

Total budget is \$651,391 of which \$418,204 is for elementary schools and \$233,186 for high schools.

Districts favoring the district included Amity, 132; Wheatland, 4-0; Dayton, 8-7; and Sheridan, 42-3.

## Extinct Mammoth Skeleton Found

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (INS) — What may be the first oceanic discovery of imperial mammoth — extinct 20,000 years — remains has been turned up during a routine offshore search for oil by four San Diego scientists.

Dr. David S. Dietz, oceanographer at the Naval Electronics Laboratory, said he came upon the crown portion of a large molar while diving at Seal Beach in search of ocean bottom oil indications. It was buried in an outcrop of sandstone formation at a 15-foot depth.

Dietz and his companions dug out two large molars, each one foot long and six to eight inches tall. They also recovered several small pieces of tusk.

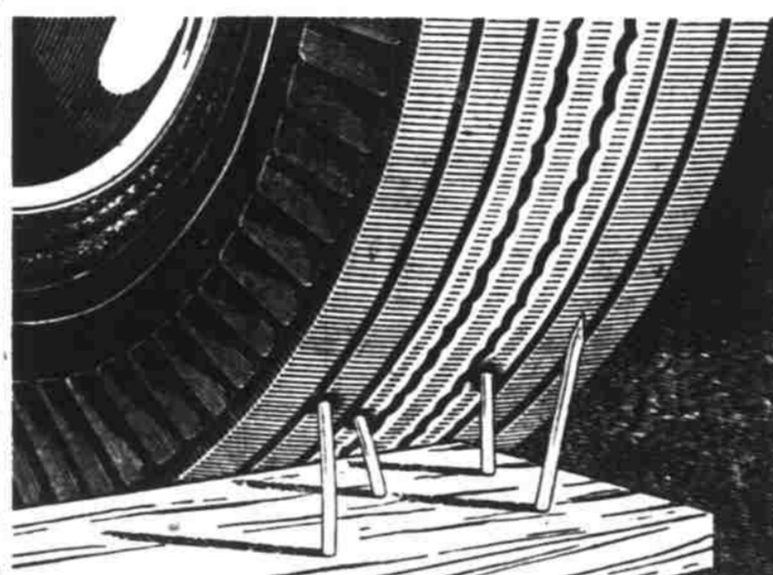
