Sheridan City Budget Higher

SHERIDAN—Sheridan's city budget will show an increase for the 1954-55 fiscal year, but will be within the six per cent limitation. The expenditures for the fiscal year, exclusive of the water department, would be \$57,392.50. The budget this year is \$48,019.12.
A new item appearing on the budget will be the sewer treatment plant, at \$7,100. This amount will be received from the sewer user's charge. Street expenses will be \$14,400, the same amount which will be received from state and county road fund taxes.
During the next fiscal year, the city will pay off \$5,000 on its indebtedness of \$15,000 on street paving bonds. The payment is \$1,000 higher than for the current year.
