Chiropractor Pleads Guilty To Larceny

ASTORIA, Ore. — Dr. C. Clyde Dunham, 41, Seaside, ousted secretary-treasurer of the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners, pleaded guilty Thursday to larceny of public money.

Circuit Judge Howard K. Zimmerman placed him on probation for five years, and directed that he pay back the state the \$9,150 he admitted taking in the period between Oct. 1, 1952, and March 31, 1954.

Dunham, a chiropractor who moved to Seaside three years ago from Heppner, said he had \$2,755 in the bank that he would turn over to the state at once, and promised to try to pay the rest back after he gets a job. He said he expected to lose his license for chiropractic practice.

Dunham was removed from office several weeks ago after an audit disclosed an fund shortage. Dunham said he had not been earning much money from his business here, and had dipped into state fees in order to meet bills. He said he had intended to all together to repay the money.

Field Artillery Unit Promotes Two Members

Two members of the 929th Field Artillery Battalion, Army Reserve, were promoted recently, one to the rank of captain and the other to the rate of sergeant first class.

Robert G. Coates, 727 Menlo Dr., member of headquarters and headquarters battery, was promoted from first lieutenant to captain, retroactive to May 19, Harold L. Ott, Canby Route 1, a member of headquarters battery, was boosted from sergeant to sergeant first class.

Coates, a graduate of the University of Oregon, served with the U. S. Marines during World War II as an enlisted man and received his appointment as second lieutenant in the Army Reserve in June, 1948. He is an employee of the Coca Cola Bottling Company.

Ott, who served for two years on active duty with the Army, was released Sept. 23, 1952 and joined the 929th in December that year.

Former City Resident Dies At Portland

Joseph F. Sabrowski, about 50 years of age, former butcher at Valley Packing Company who moved to Seward, Alaska, last fall, died Thursday at a Portland hospital.

Friends explained that Sabrowski was suffering from a cancerous condition of his spine and had been flown to Portland from Alaska a month ago. Announcement of services will be made later by the Clough-Barrick Company.

Sabrowski was a prominent pianist in local orchestras as a part-time avocation. He was a member of St. Vincent de Paul's Catholic Church. While living in Salem he and his wife resided at 1160 Donna Ave.

The Carter triplets, Denise Ann, Dianne Rae and Debora Jo, first trio born in Salem in 10 years, celebrate their first week's birthday today — and they're all doing "fine."

The three, born last Friday at Salem Memorial Hospital to Mr. and Mrs. Maitland Carter, 1120 Flood St., were all still in incubation Thursday night but nurses on the floor said they had progressed very well during their first week.

Mrs. Carter went home Monday. Nurses explained that all babies, shortly after birth, lose weight and then begin gaining it back. All three show a gain to date on the following scale: Denise Ann was 2 pounds 5 at birth; she slipped back to 2 pounds 2 and is now 2 pounds 4. Dianne Rae was 2 pounds 2 at birth; dropped to 2 pounds 2 and is now back to 2 pounds 2. Debora Jo was 3 pounds 9; went back to 3 pounds 5 and is now 3 pounds 6.

Giant Aerial Spray Job Set By City Firm

Contract for spraying a million and a half acres of rangeland for grasshopper control in Colorado was awarded Thursday by the State Department of that state and the federal government to Ace Flying Service.

The spraying operation, destined to draw the service of the company's three converted Douglas B-18's and the two PB's, will begin June 4 according to Leo (Ace) Demers, owner of the company.

Demers explained Thursday that the rangeland is basically flat and well adapted to heavy aircraft spray operations. He said that the planes will fly from 10 feet to 100 feet off the ground, depending on the terrain. Spray to be used is 10 per cent Aldrin in fuel oil.

The company has outfitted the three B-18's with wing nozzles fed from tanks located in the bomb bay. The two PB's are currently being fitted with similar wing booms. Demers said that the operation will involve 10 pilots, four mechanics, five loaders and five combination truck drivers and loaders. Each bomber will carry a pilot and engineer and the PB's will be operated by three men each.

Representatives of the federal government grasshopper control, Archie Giesler and Val Mackiewicz, both of Tulsa, Okla., inspected the Demers planes and equipment this week and passed on their capability of meeting the needs of the contract.

Demers was one of 17 bids submitted for the Colorado contract.

Appeal Made To Save State Tourist Lives

"Let's save the lives of Oregon tourists" is the appeal sent out Thursday by the Highway Life-Savers Committee of Oregon Citizens, Inc., in anticipation of crowded highways over the three-day Memorial Day holiday this weekend.

Memorial Day not only becomes a three-day weekend event, but is also the beginning of tourist season, according to E. C. Sammons, president of the committee.

State police, presuming there probably will be thousands of cars on the move this weekend, are planning to utilize their patrol strength to greatest advantage over the holiday with many officers sacrificing days off to keep order on roadways.

Police Chief Clyde A. Warren issued a warning to motorists this week who are planning trips over the holiday. He pointed out that insurance figures show that weekend automobile crashes killed 15,830 people and injured 774,680 during 1953. And the Memorial Day weekend was only a two-day holiday last year, he stressed.

Included in the chief's suggestions are the following: "Don't drive only according to posted speed limits—a safe speed depends on prevailing conditions of weather, traffic, etc. On long trips, make a stop for coffee every two or three hours; get out and walk around. Always leave ample room between you and the car ahead."

"When driving at night, don't exceed the speed which will let you stop within your headlight range. Where children are playing be able to stop within the length of your car. Keep to the right and don't cut in and out." The Automobile Manufacturers Association estimated that half the population of the nation—some 75 million persons—will take vacations this summer in automobiles and that 85 per cent of the cars will carry families. The average family will travel 1,200 miles in 10 days and spend about \$560 in that time.

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Vietminh Close In On Vital Delta Site

HANOI, Indochina (AP) — Vietminh troops surrounding Yen Phu cut closer Thursday to that key Red River Delta post only 30 miles south of Hanoi. Heavily outnumbered French Union defenders prepared for another "little Dien Bien Phu" battle.

Yen Phu guards Phu Ly, western anchor of a defense arc stretching through Nam Dinh and Thai Binh, important rice center. The French narrowed their lines on that sector, blowing up their own post at Ame, 12 miles north of Thai Binh, and pulling its 80-man garrison back to that town.

Rebel troops equal to about two divisions menaced the Phu Ly-Thai Binh line. For two weeks some 12 battalions have concentrated their
