

Salem Man Surrenders on Felony Charge

George Gibson, 44, of 2408 Brown Rd., who identified himself as a professional writer, formerly affiliated with the Los Angeles police department and ex-building contractor, called state police Wednesday night to surrender himself on a Deschutes County felony warrant.

State Police Sgt. Wayne Huffman said his first knowledge of Gibson came about when a man, identifying himself as "E. A. Smith," called to ask if police were looking for a man named Gibson from Bend.

He left his phone number with the sergeant and Huffman said he'd check and call him back. At about this time a man, identifying himself as "Edgar Smith," called the Marine County sheriff's office and asked the same question.

Sgt. Huffman checked with the Deschutes County Sheriff's office and learned that a man named George Gibson is wanted there on a warrant charging threatening the commission of a felony. He called back his informant and asked where Gibson might be found. "You're talking to him," was the reply.

While being booked, Gibson told a Statesman reporter that he thought the warrant was brought by a "Dr. Robinson" in Bend. He said that there had been an altercation between he and the doctor about Aug. 8, 1952.

Gibson was lodged in the Salem jail without bail awaiting Deschutes County authorities.

CIO Pickets Oregon Pulp Log Dumps

CIO boom men of the Oregon Pulp and Paper Company established picket lines Wednesday morning at the Holman Dump on the Willamette River in West Salem and at the company's Court Street dump on the river.

Lines were also reported established at the company's Oswego boom, according to A. F. Hartung, president of the International Woodworkers of America.

An Associated Press dispatch attributed the strike to one of several throughout Oregon "in a union drive to win a wage increase for lumber workers." CIO woodworkers were also idled last week in five Oregon plywood firms which refused to grant pay increases.

M. L. Sullivan, of Portland, labor relations manager for the Oregon Pulp and Paper Company, declined to elaborate in a telephone interview Wednesday night on the strike or its causes. He did say that the strike, at present, affects 15 boom men in Salem, "but does not directly apply to papermill, sawmill or sash and door workers," he said.

E. A. Linden Jr., superintendent of the Salem company, visualized that the persistent stoppage of boom work might well clog many other logging phases aligned with the company's operation. He estimated that the company had, on hand, about 40 million board feet of logs already stacked out of the water, and, should negotiations continue to bog down, the plant could still continue "for about two or three months without closure," he said.

Very simply, the boom men's strike means logs can't be dumped in the river, Linden said.

Beaten Man Hospitalized

A man who identified himself to city police as Lonnie Seamonis, 43, transient, was picked up by ambulance in a hotel room in the 200 block of North Commercial Street Wednesday morning and taken to the hospital.

Representatives of Willamette Ambulance Service described him as the "most beat up person" they'd ever seen. His condition at Salem Memorial Hospital Wednesday night was listed as "fair."

He told police that he was employed by Nohlgren's Restaurant and had just received his pay this week. He said he went to a local tavern and there fell in company with two strawberry pickers. Seamonis said they were together for some time and the next thing he recalls is waking up in his hotel room Wednesday morning and calling for help.

His injuries include possible fractures to the ribs and pelvis, multiple bruises and severe abrasions about the arms and legs, apparently from being dragged.

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Boys State Puts Names on Primary Ballot

Candidates for key offices in the state government of Boys State were aligned Wednesday in primary balloting of the three major parties and the general election will be held today beginning at 2 p.m.

Candidates for the position of governor are Mark Earl, Portland (Federalist ticket); Ned Mackey, Bend (Nationalist), and David Kelsos, Medford (Independent).

Other Federalist candidates for key offices include Roy Turner, Portland, secretary of state; Richard Bevis, Newport, treasurer; Paul Menser, Hillsboro, attorney general, and James Crowell, Bend, labor commissioner. Candidates for these offices on the Nationalist ticket are Thomas Bourgeois, Springfield, secretary of state; Larry McKennan, Portland, treasurer; Terry Kenton, Portland, attorney general, and Leroy Cothrell, Cottage Grove, labor commissioner.

Included on the Independent ballot is Byron Vig, Portland, seeking the attorney general's post. Also to be voted on today are candidates for supreme court justice positions and 16 senators and 32 representatives in each of three parties.

Rep. Samuel W. Yorty 385,536; William T. Hooley 24,420; Isobel Cerney 14,012.

Democratic (17,942 pts): Kuchel 375,079; Yorty 630,284; Adam Derkum 69,173; Leo Gallagher 116,407; Cerney 22,653.

Highest combined vote total in tabulations to this point went to Democratic Atty. Gen. Edmund G. Brown who captured both party nominations. His combined vote was 1,672,159.

Only other assured double wins were by two Democratic congressmen.

Political Unknowns
The Democratic sweep of its own ticket was made by a group of political unknowns and two nationally known figures who ran over the protest of Democratic national chairman Stephen A. Mitchell.

Mitchell said Wednesday his attitude was unchanged toward the congressional candidacies of James Roosevelt, whose wife accused him of adultery, and Rep. Robert L. Condon, who had been denied admission to an atomic test as a security risk. Each decisively won his own party candidacy but lost the Republican nomination.

Roosevelt, son of the late FDR, credited his victory partially to the new state law which requires identification of each candidate's party affiliation on the ballot.

So did the Democratic candidate for governor, Richard Graves, who six months ago was a political unknown and a Republican.
