2 Salem Brothers Join Ranks Of Valley Soldiers in Far East

Two Salem brothers have joined the ranks of Willamette Valley soldiers and sailors on duty in the Far East.

One of the current military information releases shows that Pvt. Roger and William Maude, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Maude, 770 Winding Way, arrived recently to serve with the 2nd Infantry Division in Korea, after basic training at Fort Ord since last November.

Woman Dies In Crash; 2nd Victim Sought

SUNNYSIDE, Wash. (AP)—A woman was killed Thursday night when an automobile registered to a Denver, Colo., couple went out of control at high speed and crashed into a drainage canal.

A second possible victim is being sought in the swiftly flowing waters of the canal.

State Patrol Sgt. Ed Tull said the automobile was registered to Guy E. and Lorraine Sage. It is not known whether the woman whose body was taken from the submerged car was Lorraine Sage. Sgt. Tull said the woman was about 30 to 35 years old.

The belief that another person may have been in the car when it crashed was based on men's clothing and other items found in the vehicle after it was dragged from the canal.

Witnesses said the car was traveling at an estimated 75 to 80 miles an hour when its driver lost control while attempting to pass a truck. It swerved off the road and into the canal. The car was swept 150 feet by water before coming to rest.

Grappling crews are searching the canal waters in an attempt to find the possible second victim.

House Raises Ante on Ike's Budget Bureau

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House raised the ante on the President's Budget Bureau and its own Appropriations Committee Thursday to approve a budget of \$1,970,378,761 for the Labor and Welfare Departments during the fiscal year beginning July 1.

The two departments were voted \$5,093,500 more than the President requested and \$21,432,750 more than the appropriations committee recommended.

Most of the increases were for national health services, including research on cancer, mental health, heart disease, blindness and neurology.

Passed by a voice vote, the bill was the last of the big appropriation measures on which the House must act this year. It was sent to the Senate.

Perpetrator of Nearly Perfect Murder Dies

BALTIMORE (AP)—George Edward Grammer plunged to his death from the Maryland Penitentiary gallows at 12:06 a. m. Friday.

The former New York office manager, convicted of killing his wife in what was described as a near perfect murder two years ago, displayed no emotion as he stepped up to the death trap.

Grammer, the man the state said killed for the love of another woman and tried to make the killing appear to be an auto accident, spent much of his last day with his Bible.

Grammer was convicted of bludgeoning his 33-year-old wife, Dorothy Mae Grammer, mother of his three children, and sending her body down a hill in a car as an attempted cover-up of the killing.

Police found a pebble wedged under the accelerator of the wrecked auto in a manner that would keep it down.

Navy Bomber Crashes Into High Mountain

TOKYO (AP)—The Navy said Friday a PBM patrol bomber missing since Wednesday with 17 aboard crashed into a 6,500-foot island mountain 50 miles off Southern Japan.

There was no sign of survivors. A search plane radioed that the crash had broken the fuselage into three pieces, virtually demolishing the two-engine bomber.

Search planes identified wreckage on Yakushima Island, off the main island of Kyushu, as that of the missing amphibian plane. An Air Force helicopter with doctors and nurses was ordered to the scene. They planned to parachute. Ground parties also were organized.

Aboard were seven Navy and two Marine officers and eight Navy enlisted men.

The amphibian plane disappeared five hours after it took off from Iwakuni Air Base, in Western Japan, at 5:30 a. m. Wednesday. It was reported on a routine flight to Hong Kong but the Navy said Friday it actually was headed for Sangley Point in the Philippines.

Another Peak Flow Expected On Kootenai

PORTLAND (AP)—The Bonners Ferry area of North Idaho was warned Thursday to expect another peak flow on the Kootenai River before flood danger disappears this year.

The water management subcommittee of the Columbia Basin Inter-Agency Committee said water content of the snow pack in the headwaters indicated the Kootenai could go up again to levels as high as 33 to 35 feet at Bonners Ferry.

"With the dikes saturated as they are, the situation might become critical in that vicinity of the Columbia Basin," the subcommittee reported.

In the earlier peak the river there reached a level of 35.65 feet, breaking through some farmland dikes. The dikes stood around the city of Bonners Ferry.

The peak for the Lower Columbia River area still is expected to be between 23 and 25 feet in the Portland-Vancouver, Wash., area.

The subcommittee said Grand Coulee and Hungry Horse dams would be used to try to control flood peaks.

Jimmy, Wife Settle Part of Differences

LOS ANGELES (AP)—James Roosevelt, on the heels of his primary election victory, announced through his attorney Thursday he has reached an agreement which "completely settles" his differences with his wife, Romelle, who has accused him of adultery in a separate maintenance suit.

Samuel Picone, in a brief formal statement, said "the matter of final settlement of the marriage is being worked out by the parties and by the attorneys."

Picone declined to elaborate other than to say "this is in the best interests of all concerned and we believe that no further comment should be necessary."

Baby Stroller Found Sans Owner or Driver

A late model blue and white baby stroller, with built in multi-colored beads to match, was located this week by city police sans the owner and/or driver.

City police found the conveyance parked askew and untenanted in the 2000 block of Hazel Avenue Wednesday. The vehicle was brought to the station and tagged where it may be identified and claimed by the owner.

Police Probe Burglary at Realty Office

Two burglaries and two attempted burglaries, apparently occurring Wednesday night, were discovered when businesses were opened Thursday morning and one of each was investigated by Marion County sheriff's deputies and city police.

City police were called to investigate burglary of the Al Bell real estate office, 1430 S. 12th St., from which a total of about \$70 was taken.

Tom Pomroy, who has an insurance business in the office, told police three desks were looted and entrance was apparently gained via an unlocked door at the rear of the building.

Sheriff's deputies checked out a burglary at the Vista Lockers and Vista Freezer building, 3095 S. Commercial St. Entrance was forced by breaking out a window in the ice cream department and about \$75 was stolen from the office.

Two doors were jimmied by the would-be burglars and both structures sustained considerable damage. One damaged door, investigated by the county, was at Vista Market, 3045 S. Commercial St., where entrance was apparently tried at the rear of the building by the same person or persons involved in the Vista Locker burglary. City police investigated a damaged door at the Pharmacy Restaurant in the Medical Center, 2420 Green St. There was a spot dug beneath the door knob, but a locking bolt in the door prevented entrance.

Bank Debts Decline 4% During May

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—One of the indicators of business activity — bank debts — declined 4 per cent in May in the 12th Federal Reserve District compared with May 1953. These debts reflect the flow of money payments for goods and services.

The San Francisco Federal Reserve Bank Thursday announced the May debt total for the district was \$13,197,267,000.

Sixteen of the 35 reporting cities reported declines from a year ago. 16 reported gains and 3 reported no changes. Largest decline was 14 per cent in Oakland, Calif., Boise, Idaho and Ogden, Utah. Best gain was 17 per cent in Bellingham, Wash.

Valley Strike In Lumbering May Spread

The current lumbering and logging strike negotiations threatened Thursday to reach into another Salem industry.

The executive committee of the Willamette Valley district council of sawmill workers, an AFL affiliate, has elected a strike committee authorized to take strike action in "any and all operation at any time they deem it necessary," it was reported Thursday.

Locally the action involves about 180 men, employees of the lumber division of the Oregon Pulp and Paper Co. and the Capitol Lumber Co. on Cherry Avenue.

No strike had been actually called Thursday and plant officials said operations were continuing on a normal basis.

Meanwhile CIO boom men of the Pulp and Paper Co. continued Thursday the picket line established Wednesday at the Holman Dump on the Willamette River in West Salem and at the company's Court Street dump on the river.
