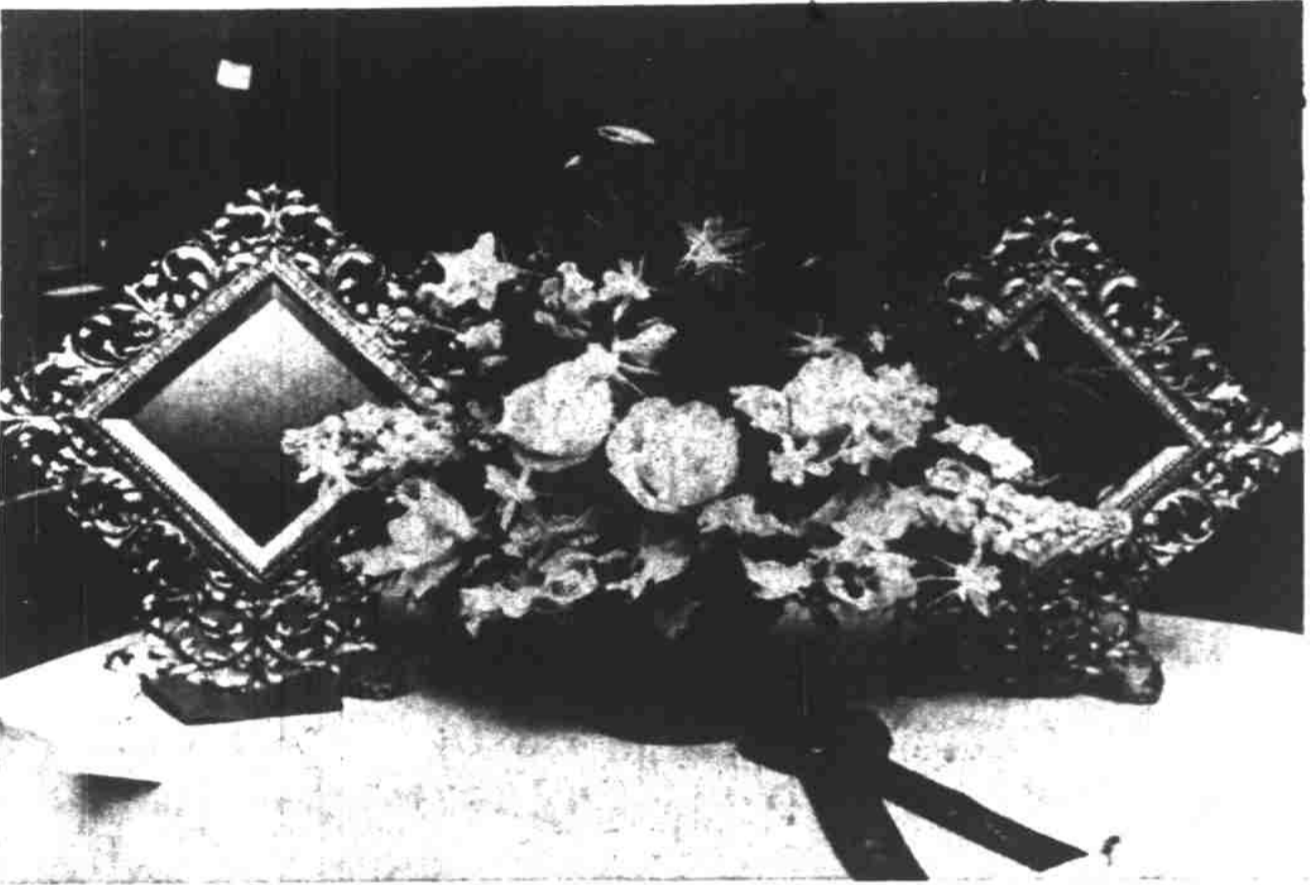

Bonesteel asked permission to use the foot of Academy Street, but the city administration said this would be up to the aldermen.
