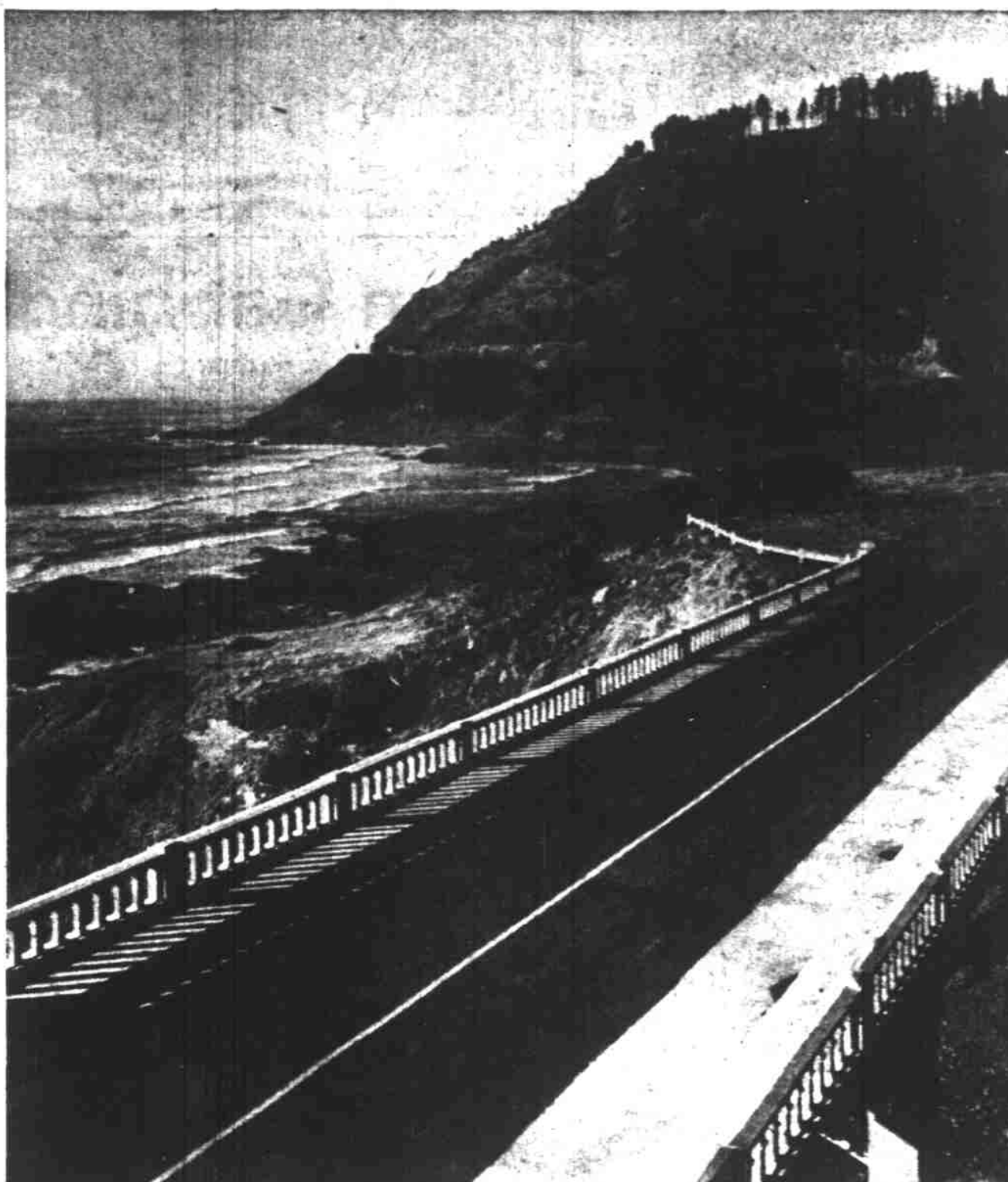




TIDEWATER—A few miles inland from the coast on Highway 34 is this popular fishing spot on the Alsea River. It is a short distance below the head of the Pacific tides and near this community which takes its name therefrom. There are many other fine fishing grounds on the Alsea and a dozen more coastal streams along the Oregon Coast. (About 90 miles southwest of Salem via Highway 99 to Albany, 20 to Corvallis and thence on 34—or through Independence and Monmouth.)



WALPORT—Cape Peretua, is one of Oregon's historic geographical features. History says it was discovered May 7, 1778, by Captain James Cook, English explorer, who is said to have named it because stormy weather kept him "perpetually in sight of it." (About 125 miles from Salem via Highway 22 to coast and Highway 101 South.)

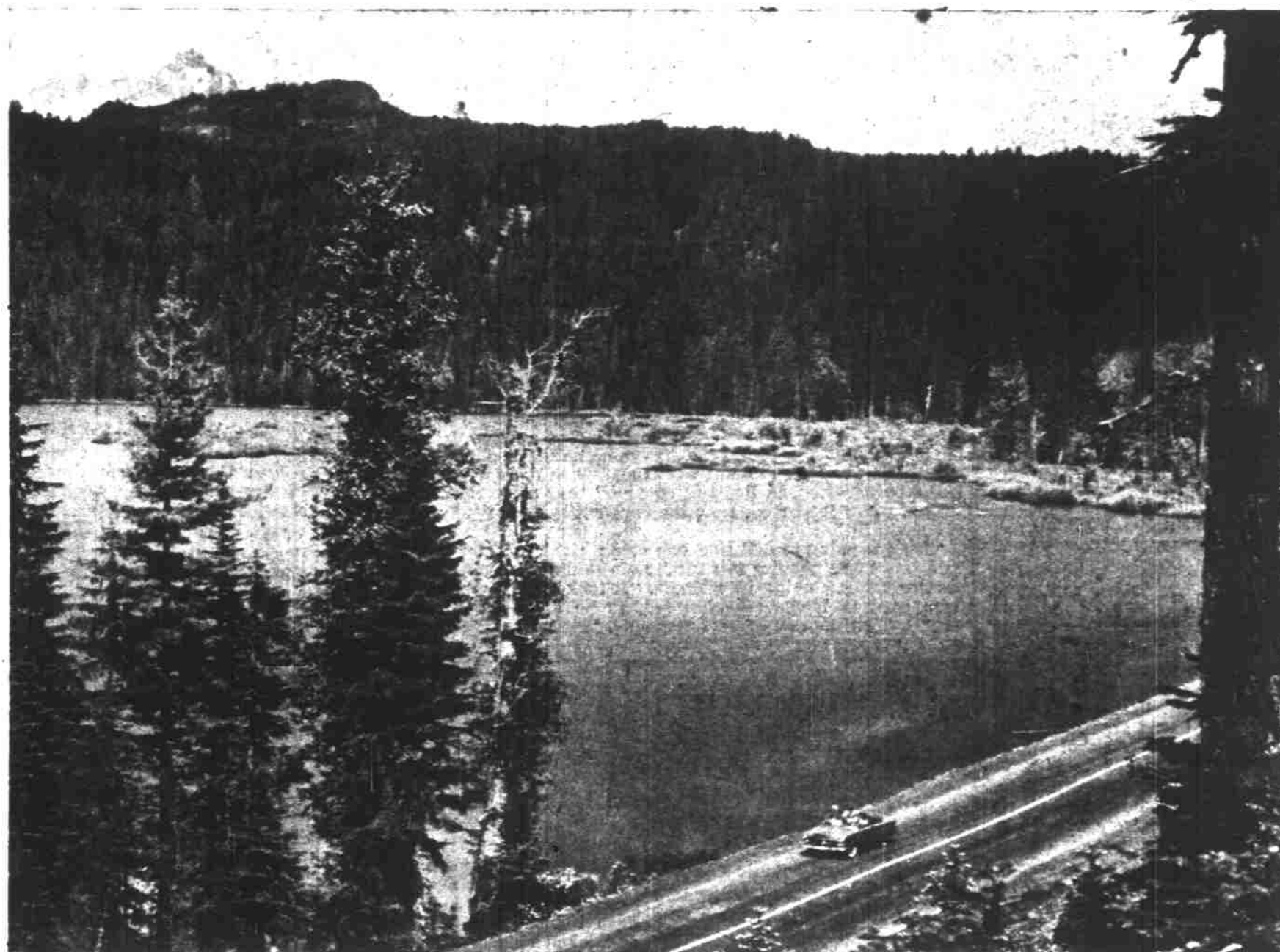
World's Greatest Playground (Pacific Northwest)



BREITENBUSH—Among the lakes nearer Salem is Breitenbush. It has facilities for camping and hotel accommodations, and fishing generally gets a high rating. Looming in the background is Mt. Jefferson. (About 70 miles from Salem via Highway 222, turning off at Detroit.)



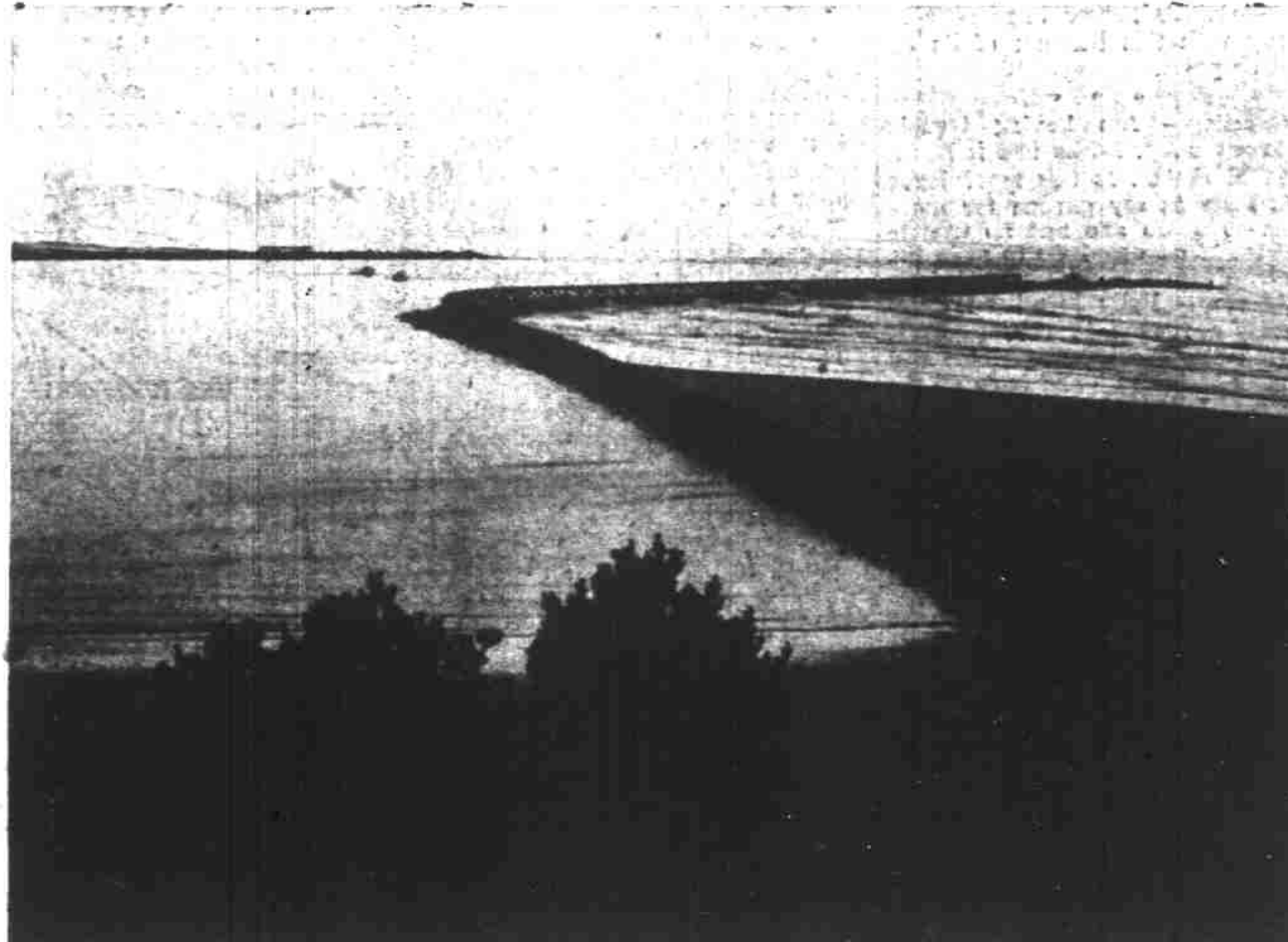
MT. HOOD—Slightly less than 100 miles from Salem is Timberline Lodge and the scenic 7-mile road leading to it from the Mt. Hood Loop highway. The winding road presents many an opportunity for the motorist to see alternately the grandeur of Hood and the broad sweep of the foothills below.



LOST LAKE—At the approach to Oregon's high-country lakes, Lost Lake is directly on U. S. Highway 20 near the Santiam Pass, so it no longer quite fits its name as it did when the Oregon pioneers discovered it. The lake is backgrounded by Three Finger Jack. It is at the border of the huge Central Oregon recreational area. (About 90 miles from Salem via Highways 222 and 20).



SEASIDE—Clam digging is but one of the recreations enjoyed at Seaside and many other Oregon beaches. Young and old alike enjoy the seaside pleasures along Oregon's smooth, sandy beaches, surfside highways and inspiring viewpoints. (About 125 miles northwest of Salem via Highway 22 to Valley Junction, Highway 14 to Hebo and north on Highway 101.)



NEWPORT—Oregon's 400-mile coastline has mile upon mile of sandy beaches, imposing promontories and interesting bays and inlets. This photo shows the jetty at Newport at the mouth of Yaquina bay, which is one of Oregon's prime exporters of lumber and wood products. (About 100 miles from Salem via Highway 22 to coast and Highway 101 south.)



YACHATS—The pure white caps on the Pacific surf is a challenge shot for photographers. Photo shows men fishing from the rocks above Devil's Churn near Yachats. The coastal fishing is a popular sport. No state license is needed and thousands of vacationists avail themselves of the opportunity to haul in sea fish annually. (About 110 miles southwest of Salem on Highway 101.)
