Nixon Asks U.S. Support Asian Causes

WHITTIER, Calif. (AP) — The United States must support Asian causes, including independence, to overcome the new Communist techniques of aggression shown in Indochina, Vice President Richard Nixon declared Saturday.

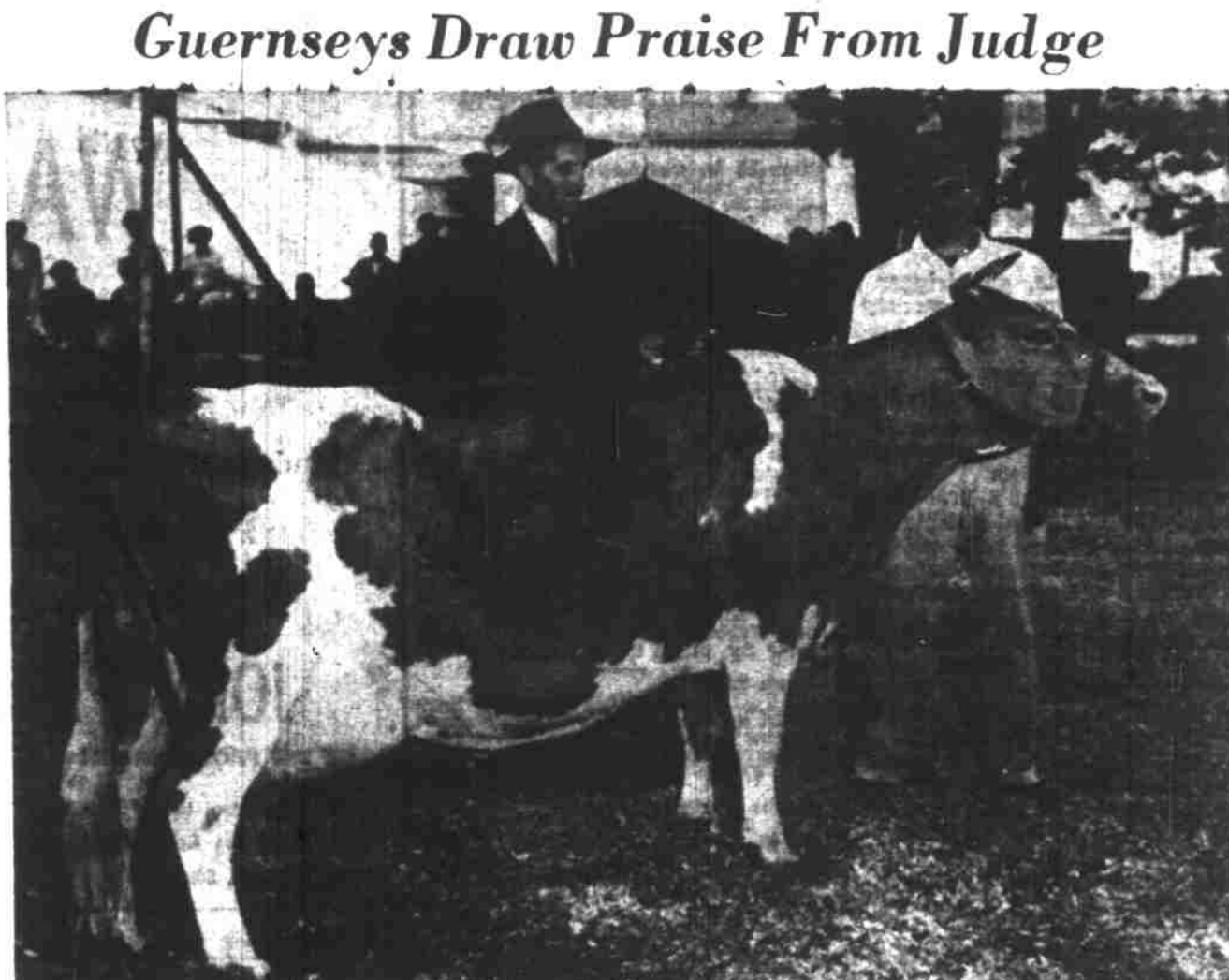
The United States can win "only if we associate ourselves vigorously and unequivocally with the aspirations of the people for economic progress, independence, peace and equality," he said.

Independence, he told a graduating class of 270 and a crowd of about 5,000 at an outdoor commencement at his alma mater — Whittier College — "means independence from any foreign domination."

The vice president said, "the use of foreign — controlled, directed and inspired revolutions, "the natives of the country they desire to dominate do the fighting for them. And they accomplish this by winning the leaders over to the Communist cause."

The vice president received an honorary doctor of laws degree from Whittier, where he graduated in 1934, and also a distinguished alumnus award.

He flew to nearby Los Angeles from Washington Friday night and then escaped injury in an automobile accident. The driver of a car which sideswiped one in which the vice president was riding was booked for misdemeanor drunk driving. No one was hurt in the accident.

WASHINGTON (AP) — "The Orphans," a harmonious Wichita, Kan., quartet of young men who sing "just for fun" Saturday night were crowned the champions of American barbershop singing for 1954.

The Kansans, performing in gay blue and red garb, nosed out the somber-dressed but bright singing "Four Hearsemens" who sing professionally for an Amarillo, Tex., funeral home.

The two quartets led a field of five finalists picked from 40 quartets vying for the title awarded each year by the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet Singing in America, Inc.

Grain Market Progress Slow

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains held in narrow price limits in slow dealings on the Board of Trade this week as talk of a possible wheat "price war" arose in international grain circles.

Wheat closed the week 2 1/2 cents higher, corn 1/4 cent lower, oats 1/4 cent lower, rye unchanged to 1 cent higher, soybeans 3/4 cent lower and lard 10 cents to \$1.93 a hundred pounds lower.

Probably the most interesting development during the week occurred in the world market. The United States raised the subsidy she pays exporters, enabling them to export wheat under the international wheat agreement at lower prices, and Canada promptly met the competition by cutting her export price.

Pope Pius XII Canonizes 5 Catholics

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Pius XII canonized five members of the Roman Catholic Church Saturday.

They ranged in age from Domenico Savio, fervently religious Italian boy who died in 1857 when he was 15, to Giuseppe Pignatelli, Spanish-born member of an Italian family who was 72 when he died in 1811 after long devotion to religious activities.

Saturday, under a hot sun in St. Peter's Square, an estimated 200,000 pilgrims, tourists and Romans heard the Pope elevate to sainthood:

Savio, young member of St. Giovanni Bosco's mission organization;

Pierre Louis Maria Chanel, Marist father who was born at Cuert, near Lyon, France, on July 12, 1803, and killed while engaged in missionary work on the island of Futna, April 28, 1841;

Maria Crocifissa di Rosa, founder of the religious order of the Handmaidens of Charity, died at Brescia, Italy Nov. 6, 1813, born Dec. 15, 1855;

Pignatelli, member of the Society of Jesus and the first organizer of the restored society in Italy;

Gaspard del Bufalo, founder of the Missionary Society of The Most Precious Blood, born in Rome Jan. 6, 1786, exiled from the city when he refused to swear allegiance to Napoleon, died in Rome Dec. 27, 1837.

U.N. Council To Discuss Indochina War

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Diplomatic sources said Saturday night the U. N. Security Council probably will meet some time next week to talk about the Indochina War.

They said the date would depend on "general consultations" Monday among members of the 11-nation council. These would take into account developments in the Geneva conference on Indochina and in the government crisis in Paris.

The specific issue before the council is Thailand's request for a border peace patrol to keep the war from spreading.
