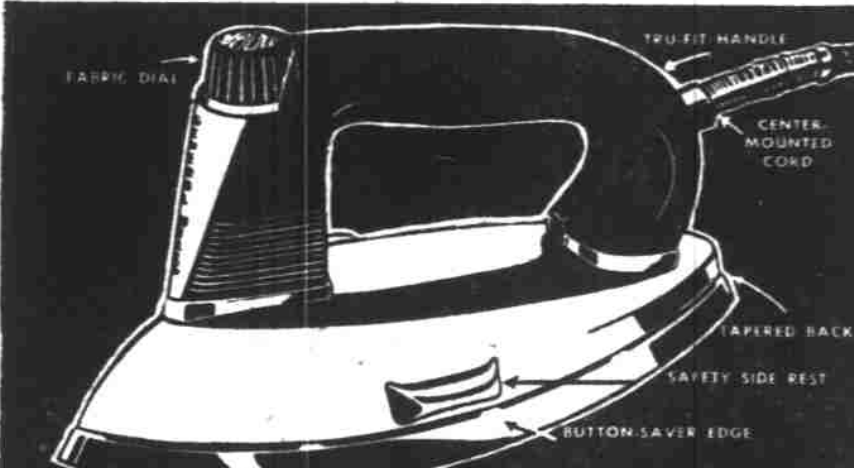
Attend Visit of Commander
