

U.N. to Hear Guatemala Plea Today

U.S. Rebuffs Claim of 'Aggression'

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. — The United Nations Security Council will meet here at 2 p.m. Sunday in extraordinary session on the Guatemalan conflict instead of Monday afternoon as previously scheduled.

The change was announced late Sunday night after Guatemala's delegate pressed repeatedly for the urgent session.

The council has met in such a special Sunday session only once before. That was on June 25, 1950, to cope with the Korean War which began on that day.

The Council president for the month of June, U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., at first declined to call a weekend meeting—for either Saturday or Sunday. Most delegates were reported weekending outside of the immediate area and could not be located readily Saturday afternoon.

However, as the Guatemalan pressed for the urgent meeting on his government's charges that Honduras and Nicaragua have committed "open aggression" the request was reconsidered and the Sunday meeting was set up.

The Guatemalan government pleaded that the council stop the central American conflict with U.N. armed force if necessary.

In a 1,000-word cable, Guatemala charged the armed attack on the Arbenz regime was instigated by "certain foreign monopolies whose interests have been affected" by Guatemala's policy of "economic and social progress."

It said a United States arms embargo had left Guatemala without an air force sufficient to repel it. Foreign Minister Guillermo Toriello sent the cable to Lodge, Toriello said the council should "take the measures necessary to prevent the disruption of peace and international security in this part of Central America and also to put a stop to the aggression in progress against Guatemala."

He proposed that it do this under three U.N. Charter articles (24, 35 and 39) that authorize it to call for disruption of economic and trade relations and, as a last resort, for use of member nations' land, sea and air forces to halt aggression.

Resistance to Guatemalan Rebels 'Feeble'

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras — Anti-Communist chiefs announced Saturday night they are encountering only feeble resistance to their invasion of Guatemala and said they expected to win over the whole country in a few days.

Leaders of the "liberation army" of Col. Carlos Castillo Armas said their forces had penetrated up to 25 miles inside Guatemala in their march on the capital city and "the people of Guatemala are arising to our cause."

An invasion headquarters had been set up at the Honduran town of Copan, four miles from Guatemala's border.

Four of the top leaders, including the liberation army's chief of information, Manuel Orellana Portillo, participated in the briefing of reporters there.

"Only sporadic scraps" with Guatemalan army forces were being fought, Orellana Portillo said. He added that at many places Guatemalan border guards had been withdrawn, leaving the frontier virtually undefended.

Probers Hear 3 'Friendly' Witnesses

PORTLAND — Homer L. Owen, who said he had been a Communist five years until 1952, was the first of three friendly witnesses to testify before the House Un-American Activities Committee which ended its Portland session Saturday. The others were Barbara Hargreave, who recently was sentenced to Seattle to five years in prison on a Smith Act conviction of being a Communist, and Robert W. Canon, 34, recently resigned dean of students at Reed College who said he thought the Communist student group at Reed no longer existed.

Among them they named 53 persons as Communists in the Portland area in the period from the late 1930s to the late 1940s. Of these 50 were students at Reed, three faculty members.

After hearing this, Rep. Frazier (D-Tenn.), the only other committee member present, asked Canon if he knew what "affiliations" the present president of Reed has. Canon said he did not know and later Frazier said he did not mean to imply anything improper.

Chairman Velde remarked that he understood the president, Duncan S. Ballantine, was "quite the other way" — apparently meaning the opposite of leftist.

Ballantine, who has been at Reed two years, has defended the school's students and faculty as being loyal, and insisted the school would continue its policy of free discussion of ideas.

Canon said he joined the Communist Party in 1947 while on the Reed campus as an employee of the Veterans Administration, but said he soon became fed up with the party, finding it "out of focus, out of perspective, intolerant" and full of "ritualistic nonsense." He said he broke off from the party before he joined the Reed staff as director of admissions in 1948.

Among the unfriendly witnesses was Frank Patterson, a University of Washington graduate of 1939, now a bookkeeper here. Owen had testified Patterson was expelled from the Communist Party in 1949 on a charge of being an FBI agent.

Kunzig said the Communists were mistaken in believing Patterson an FBI agent, but he could not get Patterson to discuss it.

The hearing was televised locally today, and several of the witnesses asked that the camera be turned away from them. Velde asked one of them to promise to answer questions if Velde would order the cameras off. The witness, Herbert Simpson, refused. Velde had to order the cameras away anyway, since committee rules stipulate that a witness can refuse to be televised.

Canon testified that he understood there were about 400 in the Communist Party at the time of his membership.

Senator Hunt Of Wyoming Suicide Victim

WASHINGTON — Sen. Lester Callaway Hunt, 61, former governor of Wyoming and a member of the Kefauver crime investigating committee of 1951-52, committed suicide Saturday.

Worried about a kidney ailment, he shot himself in the head with a .22 caliber rifle in his Senate office and died 3 1/2 hours later. The coroner pronounced the case a suicide.

The Wyoming Democrat announced a week ago Tuesday that because of his health he would not seek reelection and planned to retire after completing his first Senate term next January.

Police said at least two notes were found, one addressed to his wife and another to his chief of staff, Mike Manatos.

Sen. Clements (D-Ky.), a close friend of Hunt's, said there were three notes, two to members of the senator's staff and a third that was "not to the staff."

"There was nothing in the letters that gave any motive for the act," Clements said.

Manatos said Hunt "suffered from a kidney affliction which had given him great cause for concern."

"Two years ago," Manatos said, "the senator underwent surgery and had a cyst removed from his side and since that operation, has been bothered by a swelling of his hands when he exerted himself physically."

Hunt's death makes the Senate lineup 47 Democrats, 47 Republicans and 1 independent.

Appointment of a successor to serve the remaining months of Hunt's unexpired term may give the Republicans a numerical majority for the first time since the death last summer of Sen. Taft of Ohio. Taft was succeeded by a Democrat, Sen. Burke, but the Republicans retained nominal control.

Hunt's successor will be named by Acting Gov. C. C. Rogers, a Republican.

Mrs. Lulu Horton and Mrs. Dan Crery held a margin of 6 1/2 points over Mr. and Mrs. Max Moose of Scio at the halfway mark and were 10 points ahead of Mrs. Jose Moritz and Harry Freund of Corvallis. A total of 38 teams were competing.

In final sessions today single competition again will be held for senior and junior players while the championship section will be held for teams of four from western states.

WASHINGTON — The United States Saturday denounced as baseless a charge by the Red-tinted Guatemalan government that its strife-torn country is a victim of "aggression."

A statement issued by the State Department took the position that the uprisings are "a revolt of Guatemalans against the government." The spokesman said this meant rejection of the charge of aggression which is the basis of a Guatemalan government appeal to the United Nations Security Council to take up the case.

A statement, reporting information from Ambassador John E. Puerifoy at Guatemala City, also contradicted a claim by Foreign Minister Toriello that two aircraft, attacking the city, had bombed a house near the center of town and strafed the national palace.

The State Department said Puerifoy had "confirmed" that there had been no bombings or strafings by planes in the Guatemala City area.

Community Bombed
The time of Puerifoy's dispatch was not given. Associated Press correspondent Jack Rutledge reported from Guatemala that a lone fighter strafed Guatemala City's airport at 10 a.m. (EDT) Saturday and bombed a small community outside the capital.

The uprisings were described by the State Department as evidence of the trouble which results from "Communist intervention in Guatemala."

The department declared its intention of continuing to consult with other American nations "regarding action needed" to block "further encroachment by international communism" in the Western Hemisphere.

Heart Attack Fatal to Solon From Hawaii

WASHINGTON — Joseph Rider Farrington, 56-year-old delegate to Congress from Hawaii, was found dead in his Capitol office Saturday night, victim of a heart ailment.

Farrington, a Republican, had represented the territory and was a hard fighter for Hawaiian statehood, since 1942. He was president and publisher of The Honolulu Star-Bulletin.

It was the second death on Capitol Hill Saturday.

Sen. Lester C. Hunt (D-Wyo) committed suicide in his office by shooting himself in the head with a .22 caliber rifle Saturday morning.

Farrington's body was found lying on the floor of his office by his secretary, Mrs. Margaret C. Turner and Jan Jabulka, executive director of the Hawaii Statehood Commission.

A friend had called Farrington about 3:30 p.m.

Farrington, gasping for breath, excused himself and asked that he be called later. The friend called back in a few minutes but received no answer.

It was assumed then, friends said, that Farrington had left his office to see a physician.

When Farrington did not show up at a party given by Mrs. Helen Beam of Washington, Mrs. Turner and Jabulka went to Farrington's office and found him dead.

Dr. Matthew White Perry, personal physician to Farrington since he came to Congress in 1942 examined the body and pronounced death due to coronary occlusion.

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Indochina War Truce Talk Plan Agreed

GENEVA — East and West agreed Saturday night that Communist and anti-Communist military leaders of the Indochina War should begin talks at once toward a cease-fire in Laos and Cambodia.

These would parallel or be merged with discussions which have been going on for two weeks now between representatives of the French Union and Red Vietnam high commands toward a cease-fire for Viet Nam. Viet Nam has seen the most fighting of all three of the French Union associated states of Indochina.

The agreement came in an extraordinary Saturday night session of the eight-week-old, nine-party Indochina conference, held on the eve of the departures of top U. S. British and Soviet delegates.

V. M. Molotov, Soviet foreign minister, left for Moscow at five minutes after midnight Saturday night. He and others apparently took a large part of his delegation, took off in five planes. Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko was left in charge in Geneva.

Walter Bedell Smith, U. S. under-secretary of state, and Anthony Eden, British foreign secretary, earlier announced that they were leaving for home Saturday night, with their return uncertain.

A delegation spokesman said Chou En-Lai, Chinese Communist Premier, foreign minister, also would depart very soon—he would not say just when.

Eden, who had a final meeting with Molotov Saturday night, was reported to regard Saturday night's agreement as a real step forward. Smith was understood to have expressed some doubts of particular points in it.

The final day's activities were highlighted by a candlelight service in the rotunda of the capitol Saturday night. Present for the service, which was well attended by the public, was Jan Markstaller, queen of the Portland Rose Festival.

Prior to the capitol ceremony the 12 candidates for Girls Nation gave campaign talks. Judges who selected delegates to the national session were Dr. Howard Runkel, professor of speech at Willamette, Dr. George Martin, professor of education at Willamette, and Mrs. James Brand, wife of Justice Brand.

Guardsmen Ordered Into Phenix City

PHENIX CITY, Ala. — Alabama National Guardsmen were ordered into this town Saturday to keep the peace while officers hunt for the gunman who killed Alabama's anti-vice crusading Democratic nominee for attorney general.

Governor Gordon Persons said the guardsmen were ordered in as a precautionary measure to prevent possible trouble. He authorized Adj. Gen. Walter J. Hanna to take whatever steps he deems necessary to keep peace because of what he described as high feeling between rival political factions.

Persons offered a \$5,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person who fired three bullets into A. L. Patterson Friday night as he sat in his parked car.

The Army set an unprecedented "off-limits" sign on the town for soldiers from nearby Ft. Benning, Ga., world's largest infantry training center.

Individual night spots offering gambling and other inducements to Ft. Benning soldiers have been put off limits from time to time, but never before has the entire city been declared out of bounds.

Major Gen. Joseph H. Harper, commanding general of Ft. Benning, said he took the drastic action at the request of Gov. Persons. Meanwhile, the manager of the Phenix City Chamber of Commerce, Alton V. Foster, resigned his job and said he would move to another city because "this has reached the point where I personally cannot endure it any longer. I'm through."

Foster said he will seek a similar job in another city and expressed the hope that residents of Phenix City "will some day rise up and eliminate the cause of this situation."

Only a faint trail of footprints gave state, county and city officers the tiniest glimmer of hope they have some clue that could lead them to the gunman.

Joe Smalley, chief criminal investigator for the State Department of Public Safety, ordered casts made of the shoe tracks leading off from the downtown alley where the Democratic nominee for attorney general was slain.

154-Year-Old Paper Tells Rites For Washington
