

Guatemala Seeks Special U.N. Meet To Discuss War

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Guatemala urgently appealed to the U. N. early Wednesday for a second extraordinary session of the Security Council to discuss what it called continuing "acts of aggression."

A three-page letter addressed to Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld by Guatemalan Ambassador Eduardo Castillo Arria was delivered at U. N. headquarters just after midnight following long consultations by the Guatemalans with U. N. delegates here and with the foreign minister in Guatemala.

Guatemala made its request first in a telegram late Tuesday but the formal letter was held up several hours because of a statement issued by Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., U. S. delegate and council president for June.

Lodge warned the leftist Guatemalan regime not to be a "cat's paw" for a Soviet conspiracy and insisted the Guatemalan case must be dealt with by the Organization of American States.

The Guatemalans said they wanted the council to meet Wednesday. They attempted to persuade some council delegates to call for a meeting but they were not successful up to an early hour Wednesday.

Hammarskjöld is expected to communicate the formal request during the morning to Lodge for his action.

Lodge in his statement had indicated that he did not plan to call for a meeting at this time.

Ike Says Free Japan Key to U. S. Policy

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower declared Tuesday night that "absolutely mandatory" to this nation's security that Japan be spared from falling under the domination of the Communism spreading over Asia.

In an address before the National Editorial Assn., Eisenhower indicated that the preservation of a free Japan is the keystone of American policy in Southeast Asia and the Pacific.

Churchill, Eden To Arrive Friday

NEW YORK (AP)—Sir Winston Churchill and Anthony Eden will arrive in Washington at 9 a. m. Friday to begin talks with President Eisenhower, an official of the British Overseas Airways Corp. announced Tuesday.

The airways officials said the British Prime Minister and his foreign secretary will leave London at 7:45 p. m. Thursday in a special BOAC plane.

RAINS FLOOD JAPAN

TOKYO (AP)—Heavy rains lashing Japan for more than 24 hours Wednesday, touched off flash floods and landslides, derailed trains, flooded ricefields and homes and caused at least 14 deaths by National Police count.

CONFERENCE FAILS

LONDON (AP)—Diplomatic officials said Tuesday Russia and four Western powers have failed to agree on proposals for atomic and conventional disarmament and ended a six-week conference on the subject.

Justice Douglas Starts World Tour

NEW YORK (AP)—Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas left by air Tuesday for London on a three-month vacation trip which will take him around the world.

He plans to visit French North Africa, stop in Egypt for a "quick" look at the tomb of Cheops; visit Tehran and then go on to Darwin, Australia, by way of New Delhi and Singapore.

In Australia he hopes to spend two weeks in the bush country and "climb Mount Kosciuszko, a 7,000-foot peak, the highest in Australia." He will return to the U. S. by way of the Pacific.

Eisenhower Sends Message to Truman

KANSAS CITY (AP)—A telegram from President Eisenhower Tuesday was among the many messages received by former President Harry S. Truman who is recovering from a major operation.

The text of the President's telegram was not made public. Truman underwent an operation for removal of his gall bladder and appendix Sunday.

Board to Check On Progress at High School

Salem School Board Tuesday night made plans to visit the new South Salem High School July 6 for another check on construction progress.

The board, which examined the gymnasium area of the new school last week, authorized Board Clerk C. C. Ward to sign formal acceptance of that section of the building.

In a busy evening's work at the new Public School Administration Building, the board elected a new chairman, bought four 60-passenger buses, welcomed a new board member and hired nine teachers.

The new board chairman is Gus Moore. Harry Scott was elected vice chairman.

Visitor at the meeting was Ray C. Cates who was elected Monday to a board term beginning July 1 when Board Chairman L. J. (Roy) Stewart completes his term.

YM to Buy Bus

The board accepted an offer from the YMCA boys' work committee to purchase an outdated school bus for \$650.

Purchase of four new buses, two with automatic transmissions and two with standard drive, was approved by the board which had opened bids earlier.

Two of the buses purchased are GMC Hydramatic-drive buses with the Wayne super-custom body, at \$7,049 each. The other two are International, one with Superior's pioneer body, at \$6,650, and one with Carpenter body, at \$6,099.

Nine new teachers were hired. They are:

Mrs. Lois E. Brandon of Salem, a graduate of Montana State College, who will be dean of girls at South Salem High School; Mrs. Ethel R. Cosco of Tangent, as a substitute elementary teacher; Mrs. Eleanor Ellis of Salem, who has taught in Portland English and social studies at Leslie Junior High; Shirley Grace Marrs, Olympia, Wash., elementary.

Health Classes

Madge Rieke, Olympia, who will teach health classes in Leslie Junior High; Mrs. Jean Louise Roth, Salem, to teach at Bush School; Pat L. Slayter, Eugene, to teach at North Salem High School; Frances Louise Woods, Portland, elementary.

Repairs Planned

The board instructed Clerk Ward to call for bids on repair projects in several schools and on the purchase of hand instruments. Bids will also be accepted on fuels and automotive tires, batteries and other items.

Possible arrangements for re-needing insurance coverage on motor vehicles owned by the school system were considered by the board, which instructed a committee to provide for coverage with the Salem Insurance Agents Assn.

The board voted to schedule only one meeting a month during the summer. Meetings are planned for July 13 and Aug. 10.

Portland Bids on Oregon Liquor Warehouse Low

PORTLAND (AP)—Low bids for construction of the new Oregon Liquor Commission warehouse at Milwaukie added up to \$1,065,879, the commission reported Tuesday.

A spokesman said the commission would ask the State Emergency Board for additional funds for the project.

The low bids: C. M. Corkum Co., \$841,897, general contract; Heunergard Electric Co., \$72,000, electrical work; A. G. Rushlight and Co., \$191,982, plumbing and heating. All are Portland concerns.

State Handling of Portland Bridge Project Opposed

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Technical Council protested Tuesday against a proposal to turn engineering and construction of the new Morrison Street Bridge in Portland over to the State Highway Department.

The council, an organization of professional engineers and architects, said the work should go to private engineering firms. A council director, Thomas Smithson, said there is some question that the Highway Department is staffed sufficiently now to handle the project.

The proposal, made by County Roadmaster George Buck, will be discussed by county commissioners and the council Thursday. Buck said it would save the county \$160,000 in engineering fees.

Both Sides in Lumber Strike Standing Firm

Both labor and management indicated Tuesday they were standing firm in the area-wide strike of lumber and sawmill workers which has idled about 200 men in Salem.

No break occurred Tuesday in the strike of 140 AFL men in the Oregon Pulp and Paper Company's lumber division and about 50 CIO boom men. They went out Monday.

At a meeting of its board of directors in Salem Tuesday the directors showed no indication of yielding to the demand of the workers, who are seeking a wage boost.

It was indicated that the 200 idle men represented a monthly payroll of approximately \$100,000.

No change in the union attitude also was indicated by Gaylord Hibbs, representative of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers, Local 3050, Capitool Lumber Co. of Salem continued free of strike trouble Tuesday following a "no strike" vote by workers there Monday.

"But we don't know what will happen tomorrow," Hibbs said. Despite the fact that CIO boom men are out the mill still has about a six-month supply of logs on hand here, it was reported.

Meanwhile, no change was noted Tuesday in the Dallas and Lebanon areas where about 2,000 men are out on strike. Included in this area also are plants at Valselt and Sweet Home. One of the largest plants hit is Cascade Plywood at Lebanon where 900 workers are on strike.

Man Injured as Car Hits Truck

Robert Roy Becker, 880 Hampden Lane, received minor leg injuries Tuesday afternoon when his car struck a truck at Hayesville on Highway 99E, state police reported.

The truck, operated by Billy Thomas Davis, Oxnard, Calif., had stopped to permit construction workers to cross the highway, officers said. The Becker vehicle was damaged extensively.

Ike Regime To Let Hiss Keep Pension

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Eisenhower administration took the position Tuesday that Alger Hiss has a legal right to a \$700-a-year government pension despite his conviction of falsely denying that he gave secrets to a Communist spy ring.

Both the Civil Service Commission and the Budget Bureau, a White House office, held that the government is obligated to go through with retirement pay to federal employees even though they are imprisoned for criminal acts. They opposed pending legislation to deny the pension to Hiss.

Repercussions were prompt and critical.

Rep. Clardy (R-Mich.), author of one of several bills designed to make sure that the imprisoned ex-official gets no retirement benefits, said the administration attitude "leaves me aghast, enraged, boiling mad."

Rep. St. George (R-NY), author of another bill, called it "inconceivable to me that persons who have violated their trust—these convicted felons—should receive the same benefits as thousands of government employees who serve their country well."

Hiss, who'll be 50 years old next Nov. 11, rose to an influential post in the State Department in the 14 years and 9 months he worked for the government. That length of service would qualify him for a \$700 pension starting Dec. 1, 1956.

Chairman Philip Young of the Civil Service Commission, basing his argument of 30 years' operation of the retirement pay law, wrote:

"These bills would introduce an entirely new concept of the retirement law which in effect would be inserting a criminal penalty in a civil statute, thereby enlarging the penalty already prescribed by federal or state criminal laws."

The Budget Bureau's letter said the courts have held that retirement rights are contractual rights and the government is under the same obligation as private citizens to carry out an employment contract.

Unemployment Figures Cited At AFL Meet

ASTORIA (AP)—The AFL State Federation of Labor was told Tuesday that present unemployment in Oregon is 40 per cent higher than at this time last year.

Dan Goldy, Seattle, regional director of employment security, said the increase was due to a decline in the state's basic industries. One exception he cited was lumber, where he said production had increased despite the employment of 8.2 per cent fewer workers.

Goldy said "the coming year will be a major opportunity for labor to bring about improvements in legislation so as to provide greater cushions against unemployment."

The convention heard a number of other speakers including Albert Ullman, president of the Idaho-Oregon Hells Canyon Assn.
