

Mother of Mail Order Heir Vows to Clear Death Cause

CHICAGO — A troubled mother Friday stood in the plush surroundings of her Gold Coast apartment and vowed to unravel the mystery death of her "wonderful boy," mail order heir Montgomery Ward Thorne.

Actress' Hubby Arraigned in Run-Down Case

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — Shoe manufacturer Harry Karl was arraigned Friday on charges that he tried to run down with his car two news photographers who took pictures of his wife, actress Marie McDonald.

His preliminary hearing was set by Municipal Judge Henry Draeger for July 16. He is at liberty on \$1,000 bail.

The incident followed the arrest of Miss McDonald by Beverly Hills police last Monday on charges of hit-and-run driving and operating a vehicle while under the influence of drugs. She is scheduled to appear in court next Tuesday.

Mrs. Gordon C. Thorne, small, pale and appearing weary, told newsmen, "I will leave no stone unturned until I really find out what happened to my boy."

Her 20-year-old son, known as Monty to his friends, was found dead in his apartment early Saturday. The cause of death has not been determined.

At a recent inquest session there was testimony he felt he was unloved by his mother and wrote a new will in which he left her a comparatively small portion of his estate, with the greatest share going to his fiancée, Maureen Ragen, 18 — a girl his mother now contends was not engaged to her son.

And Friday, in Mrs. Thorne's apartment, Henry Kalchauer, attorney for Mrs. Thorne, told newsmen that Thorne had told him he was "compelled to sign something against his will."

The lawyer said Thorne had called him to arrange an appointment for Saturday—the day he was found dead.

The lawyer also related that Thorne said: "Don't worry, everything is going to be all right between mother and me."

In other developments meanwhile:

1. The coroner's office reported that heroin, a powerful narcotic, and a marijuana cigarette were found in a woman's gold compact in a bureau drawer in Thorne's room.
2. Mrs. Thorne declared flatly that "My son was never engaged to Miss Ragen."
3. Dr. Harry C. Leon, coroner's physician, said he believes death was not due to natural causes. He said liquor, traces of which were found in Thorne's stomach, could cause death if combined with a narcotic.

Federal Law On DST Urged At Labor Meet

ASTORIA — Daylight saving time should be governed by federal legislation, the Oregon State Federation of Labor decided Friday at convention delegates rejected a resolution calling for immediate establishment of the time change in this state.

The convention adopted a resolution "that the officers of the federation work for a law opposing any change in time until the federal government passes a law forever closing this controversial subject."

The Portland Junior Chamber of Commerce is spearheading a campaign to get a daylight saving time measure on the November ballot, and reportedly was in sight of its goal.

Also approved was a resolution urging local, state and federal agencies to make immediate plans for public works projects to take up the lag in employment.

Delegates selected Medford for next year's convention and approved resolutions which:

- Opposed the wire tapping bill now in Congress.
- Urged retention by the government of all rights in the development of atomic energy for peace-time uses.
- Protested income taxes on union pensions.
- Opposed the Idaho Power Company's plans for construction of low dams on the Snake River.
- Ordered a survey of proposals for a guaranteed wage.
- Opposed the "partnership" hydro-electric power policies of the Eisenhower administration.
- Favored use of the State Board of Conciliation in labor disputes between public employees and public officials.
- Favored holding school elections on the same date primary elections are held.
- Favored retention of tenure and its extension for teachers; a class load of 25 pupils; and a state-wide minimum of \$3,800 a year for teachers with bachelor degrees.

Negotiations Renewed At Shipyards

PORTLAND — Efforts to head off a strike that would affect 123 West Coast shipyards were renewed here Friday with negotiations between management and the AFL Pacific Coast District Metal Trades Council.

The union, which is asking a "27-cent hourly package deal" and the employers, who are offering to renew the present contract, scheduled another session for Saturday.

Thomas A. Rotell, San Francisco, secretary of the union council, said, "If we don't get anywhere by Saturday night, we're not going to get anywhere."

Rotell said the present contract expires June 30 and that the unions have authorized their negotiators to call a strike.

Keizer Man Held In Assault Case

Joshua Donald Watson, Salem Route 2, was arrested by Marion County sheriff's deputies Friday night on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon.

The charge was in connection with an alleged attempted knife incident reported near Watson's home in the Keizer district Friday night, deputies said. He was held Friday night in lieu of \$1,000 bail.

Remington in Hospital Following Heart Attack

Roy W. Remington, state purchasing agent, was admitted to Salem Memorial Hospital early Friday morning after suffering a heart attack at his home on Route 3.

His condition was listed as satisfactory Friday night, the attending physician reported.

Settlements Trickle in Lumber Tieup

A trickle of settlements, but with neither unions nor management retreating from their stands, wound up the first week of the widespread Northwest fir lumber tieup.

But the prospect the strike would show a marked effect on other industries began to grow.

The scattered agreements included those with seven small mill operators in Snohomish and Skagit counties in Washington, reported by John Christensen, president of the AFL Lumber Workers Union local in Seattle; and a return-to-work agreement for the Port of Longview, Wash., operations of the Aborigine Lumber Co., announced by the CIO-IWA local at Longview.

The Snohomish-Skagit agreement reportedly was for a 12 1/2-cent-an-hour increase, while the Longview settlement provided a conditional wage increase that will be subject to review should an industry-wide settlement call for less than the 12 1/2 cent increase granted there.

Meanwhile, a spokesman for the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee, an employer group, said 20 operators employing about 8,000 men have accepted "no raise" contracts.

Communists Warned by Senate Vote

WASHINGTON — The Senate, acting against the background of civil war in Guatemala, adopted 69-1 Friday a resolution warning "international communism" away from the Americas.

Senators generally regarded it as "a modern interpretation of the Monroe Doctrine," proclaimed in 1823 when an alliance of European powers proposed to overthrow democratic governments erected from former colonies of Spain in the Western Hemisphere.

Once the resolution is adopted by the House—and prospects for speedy action there look good—it will serve to express the sense of Congress that "interference in Western Hemisphere affairs by the international Communist movement" is intolerable.

Sen. Knowland of California, the Republican leader, asked for unanimous adoption by the Senate, but on a roll call vote Sen. Langer (R-ND) voted "No." Langer gave no reason for his vote.
