Ike Regime Rallies Forces For Farm Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—Administration forces rallied Saturday for a party—splitting battle in the House next week in a showdown effort to save the Eisenhower farm program.

Republican leaders were prepared for a fight with farm-state members of their own party for the President's politically explosive program of variable farm price supports, designed to cut down the multi-billion dollar surpluses now glutting government warehouses.

House Speaker Martin of Massachusetts predicted an administration victory when the time comes for a roll call vote next Friday, with enough Republicans and Northern big city Democrats joining together to defeat the high-support sections of the bill approved by the House Agriculture Committee Friday.

Republican expectation of support from Northern Democrats was challenged by Democratic House leader Rayburn.

"I think 90 per cent of parity supports will be sustained in the House by a big majority," Rayburn said.

"I feel confident at least 75 per cent of the Democrats in the house will vote for it."

In the face of these predictions, it appeared that the final House outcome might be decided by those Northern Democrats from city districts where housewives view farm problems in the light of grocery store prices.

Republican leaders, aware of the approaching November elections, were ready to make consumer prices a major issue in next week's farm price battle.

GOP strategists are expected to force a roll call vote to put members on record on the price issue. They expect city Democrats to go over to the Republican side in such a show down.

Pedestrian at Brooks Hurt; Driver Held

A Brooks pedestrian was seriously injured Saturday evening when he was struck by a car while crossing Highway 99E at Brooks. State police later arrested a Newport driver on a charge of failure to stop at the scene of an accident.

Injured was Alfred Franklin Hearall, 50, who was taken to Salem Memorial Hospital by Wilamette Ambulance Service. He sustained compound fractures of the right leg and arm, possible fractures of the ribs and pelvis and severe lacerations on the right hand. His condition was listed as fair late Saturday night by hospital officials.

State Patrolman N. G. Johnson said Hearall was struck by a car driven by James Ralph Burton, 44, of Newport. The patrolman said he observed the Burton vehicle traveling north following the accident and followed it to a point about a half mile down the highway where Burton had stopped behind a garage. Following his arrest Burton told police he had stopped behind the garage to "think over" what he should do, Johnson said.

Burton was lodged in the Marion County jail Saturday night in lieu of \$500 bail.

Slow Driver Arrested on Drunk Charge

A Coronado, Calif., driver was arrested by state police Saturday evening on a charge of driving while intoxicated and two companions were charged with being drunk on a public highway.

Police said Joe Raymond Telles of Coronado, was stopped near the Gervais junction north of Salem after he had driven his car about 15 miles an hour on the highway and impeded the flow of traffic. He also was charged with no operator's license and was held in the Marion County jail Saturday night in lieu of \$275 bail on the two counts.

Charged with being drunk on a public highway were Ray Pat Aliras, Canby, Route 1, and Eugene Roland Fluit, 370 Magnolia Court, West Salem. Both were held Saturday night in lieu of \$25 bail.

Guatemala To Permit Investigation

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Guatemalan Embassy announced early Sunday the revolt-torn Central American country has changed signals and now permit International American Peace Committee investigators to probe its charges that Guatemala is the victim of foreign aggression.

Guatemalan officials had announced Friday night that Peace Committee investigators would not be permitted to enter Guatemala. They contended at the time that the case was under the "jurisdiction" of the United Nations Security Council and that the Peace Committee lacked authority to handle it.

An embassy spokesman said Sunday the Guatemalan charges remain in force before the Security Council and "apparently that body will act on the report of the Peace Committee."

It seemed apparent that the Guatemalan government had reconsidered its ban on the entry of Peace Committee investigators in the light of a Security Council vote Friday to put off further discussion of the aggression charges.

The Security Council voted to defer the case until the organization of American states could act. The five-nation peace committee was set up by the OAS.

Critics of the Red-tinged Guatemalan government have contended it wanted the Security Council, rather than a Western Hemisphere group, to investigate its charges because Soviet Russia is a member of the Security Council.

Church Meet Tiff Centers on Oregon Group

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—A spirited dispute over the national system of convention representation broke out Saturday morning at the Congregational Christian Churches' convention here.

The dispute was touched off by the demands of an Oregon group for recognition. The argument was left unsettled for a later session. The issue could affect the overall national representation system for the denomination, and had indirect ramifications on a proposed merger with the Evangelical and Reformed Church.

The demand for accreditation as a delegate came from Mrs. Ernest Billingham, of St. Helens, Ore., representing five churches in Northern Oregon.

Six years ago, they quit their regular geographically-formed association because its majority favored the merger, and set up an association of their own without regard to geographical lines.

The Rev. Clarence McCall, of Forest Grove, Ore., speaking for the Oregon State Conference of Churches, said admitting a delegate from the separate group could "fracture our fellowship."

Officials said approval of the move could set a pattern that might allow little groups of churches to band together, along strictly ideological lines, and pack the conventions.

Under the general council's by-laws, each regional association gets one delegate, and additional ones for each 1,000 members above the first 1,000.

GERVAIS (Statesman News Service)—Mrs. Dora Christine Englehardt, 73, resident of Gervais for nearly 20 years, died at her home here Saturday morning.

Born in Stockholm, Sweden, Nov. 18, 1882, she came to the United States with her parents at the age of one year. The family settled in Minnesota where she was married to Antone Englehardt. The couple moved to their home at Gervais in 1936. Her husband died in April of this year.

Mrs. Englehardt is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Jim Wilson of West Salem; sons, Henry Englehardt, Medford, and Hugo Englehardt, Eugene; brothers, Clarence and Arvid Erickson, both of Klamath Falls; three sisters, Mrs. Ann Beddingfield, Salem, Mrs. Ida DeVore, Bremerton, Wash., and Mrs. Esther Englehardt, Medford; and 11 grandchildren.

Funeral services will be announced later by the W. T. Rigdon Company in Salem.

Solons Ask Ike Reject British Proposal for Asia

WASHINGTON (AP)—Twelve members of the House Foreign Affairs Committee have advised President Eisenhower to flatly reject the British plan for a non-aggression pact in Asia—or face a complete review of foreign aid.

In a letter to the White House, it was learned, the congressmen said that British Foreign Secretary Eden's call for a non-aggression treaty with Asian Communists "shatters" the American policy of using aid to weld free nations together to stop Communism aggression.

They held that the Eden plan would not only accept Communist conquests but "guarantee" them.

Clothes Taken From Hotel

City police Saturday evening investigated a reported burglary in a local hotel.

Jack Gibson and E. W. Holmes, residents of the hotel told police a suitcase and several articles of clothing were removed from their room sometime Saturday afternoon. Value was estimated at about \$20.

FBI Arrests Illinois Red

CHICAGO (AP)—The FBI Saturday night arrested Claude Mack Lightfoot, 44, whom they described as the leader of the Communist Party in Illinois.

Chicago FBI Chief Guy Bannister said Lightfoot had been sought for several months.

Bannister said Lightfoot was arrested on a federal warrant charging him with membership in the Communist Party "which advocates the violent overthrow of the government of the United States."

Bannister said Lightfoot, a Negro, had been in hiding. He was seized in the Negro district on the South Side.

Los Angeles Oil, Gasoline Fire Quelled

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A million-dollar oil and gasoline fire was pronounced under control Saturday though still burning, with 10 huge storage tanks destroyed, two damaged and one man missing and feared dead.

Flame and black smoke continued shooting skyward from one of the harbor area's worst fires in 10 years. Enough fuel was ablaze in the Tidewater Associated Oil Co. tank farm to keep the fire going all day.

Navy intelligence officers and the FBI were checking the possibility of sabotage but the company expressed doubt of this likelihood. Spokesmen pointed out that the tank area was heavily protected by fences, barbed wire, mechanical alarms and a 24-hour guard system.

Flames roared within a 17-tank enclosure rimmed by a 20-foot concrete fire wall. Water, foam extinguisher fluid, fuel oil and debris were 14 feet deep inside the wall. The blaze started late Friday when one of the tanks within the wall area blew up, from unknown cause, with an earthquake-like concussion. It lid flew about 250 feet into the air. The blast spewed flaming gasoline on other tanks, which erupted with loud whooshes.

Puerto Rico Chief Backs U. S. Stand

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP)—President Paul Maguire of Haiti Saturday backed the United States in its warning that Communists should keep out of the Americas. He said all American nations should get together to prevent communism from getting a foothold in this hemisphere.
