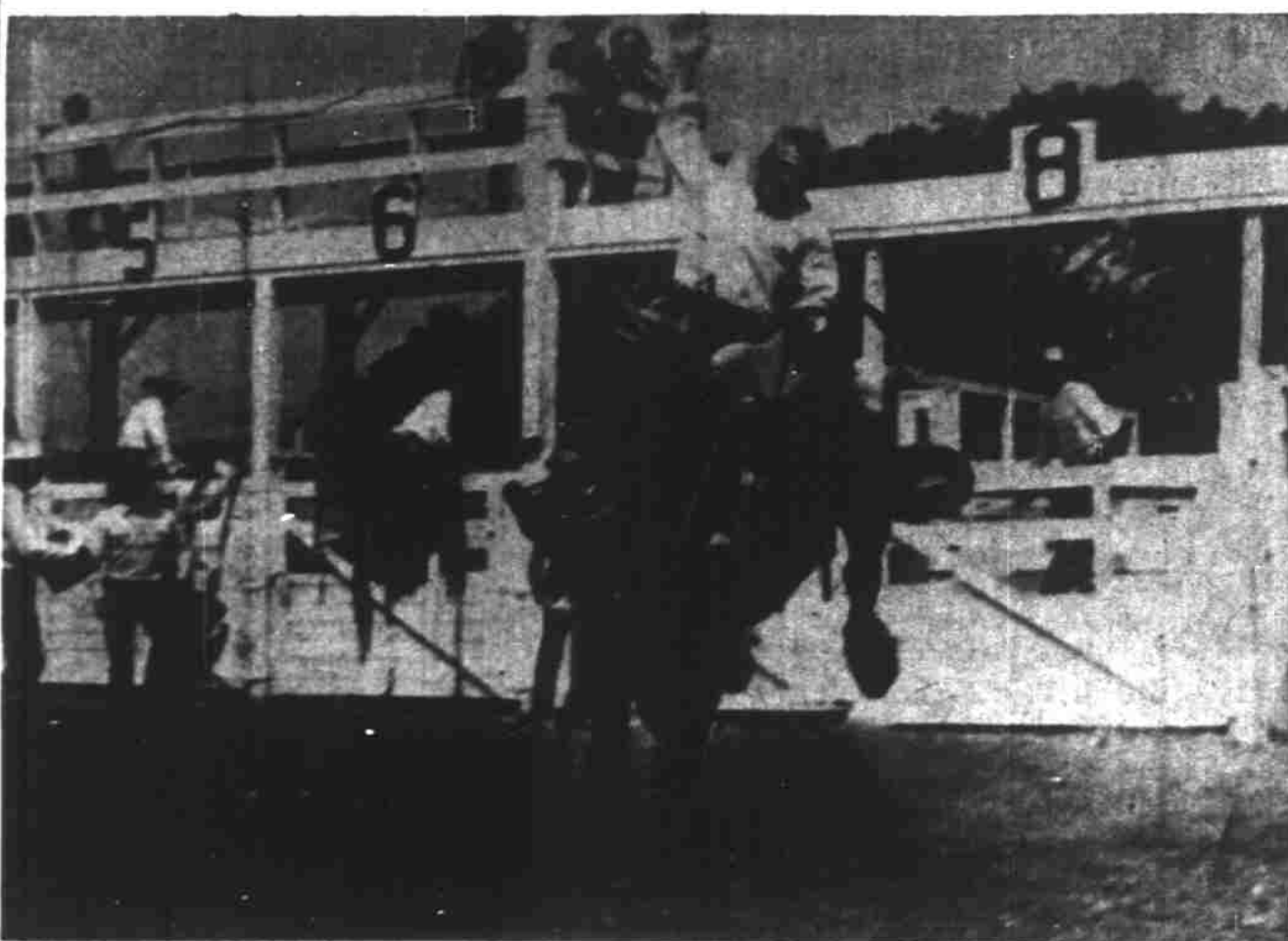
Plenty of 'Fourth' Sports Activity

CAPILANO STADIUM, Vancouver, B. C. (Special)—The Salem Senators struck for six runs in the ninth inning Monday night to grab an 8-6 Western International League baseball victory from the Vancouver Caps, league leaders.

The Caps had broken a 2-2 tie in the eighth with four runs off Gene Johnson, Senators starter.

The win broke a five-game losing streak for the Salems, who are having a close battle with Wenatchee, Victoria and Tri-City to keep clear of the WIL's cellar.

Salem scored first in the game, which started out as a hurling duel between Johnson and Lefty Bud Beasley, coming from Vancouver hurling veteran from Reno, Nev.

Harry Warner walked and was forced at second by Jim Deyo. Bob Kellogg then singled Deyo to third, after which a double steal was worked effectively, with Deyo stealing home.

Vancouver got two in the third on Danny Holden's single, a sacrifice, Marv Williams' single and another single by Ken Richardson.

The Senators tied it in the seventh when Dennis Luby doubled, was sacrificed to third and scored on Carl Bellotti's sacrifice fly to center.

Big Bob Wellman smashed a home run in the eighth. Ken Richardson doubled, Dick Greco tripled and both Bob Durrett and Nick Pesut singled for the four Cap runs.

Then in the ninth Deyo singled, Kellogg walked, Floyd Ogden delivered a pinch single for one run. Lou Scrivens singled for another, Gene Tansell doubled for the third and out went Beasley.

Lefty John Cordell relieved, walked Connie Perez, gave up a two-run single to Harry Warner and then saw an error allow the final run to score.

Larry Borst started to pitch the ninth for Salem but was jerked quickly when Holden lined out hard and K. Chorlton bled. Jose Bayle relieved and bled the next two swingers on fly balls.

Each side had 12 hits. Salem's Mel Krause was ejected from the game in the first inning after getting a single and getting thrown out trying to steal second base. He argued too vehemently with the umpire.

Trabert Looks Like Shoo-In . . .

Upsets Spice Action In Wimbledon's Play

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Jaroslav Drobny and Budge Patty, old line tennis travelers who left home early and have been moving ever since, made Wimbledon's seeded list look upside down Monday with quarterfinal upsets of Lew Hoad and Vic Seixas.

The efforts of these two, seeded eleventh and seventh, respectively, in what amounts to the world championship of amateur tennis, greatly enhanced Tony Trabert's chances of adding the Wimbledon title to his American championship.

Trabert, the top-seeded player, breezed past the first Australian obstacle in his path, Mervyn Rose, 6-2, 6-2, 7-5 to lead the way into the semi-final round. Only one other Australian was left to oppose him as 19-year-old Ken Rosewall eliminated his countryman, Rex Hartwig, 6-3, 3-6, 3-6, 6-3, 6-1, after an unexpectedly hard tussle.

The day's big news, however, was that Hoad, the second-seeded player, and Seixas, the defending champion who was rated fourth, had the daylight whaled out of them by a couple of players who aren't supposed to provide much opposition.

Tubby Drobny, a Czech-born Egyptian who makes his home in England, trounced Hoad, 6-4, 6-3, 6-3, when he had been expected to lose in straight sets. The 32-year-old Drobny, seeded 11th, thought he should have been rated higher and said: "I went out to prove it against Hoad today."

Defending champion Seixas, a good looking Philadelphia who puts a chop on everything, lost to Patty, 7-5, 4-6, 6-3, 6-2. Patty, 1950 Wimbledon champion, is a real internationalist. By birth he's an American and his home is in Los Angeles. But in recent years he has spent most of his time in Paris or playing tennis all over the world.

He and Drobny set a record here last year with a four hour and 20 minute match which Drobny won. Wednesday they meet again.

While all this was going on, the girls were playing their round of 16 according to form.

No. 1 seeded Maureen Connolly of San Diego, Calif., took two love sets from Britain's Angela Buxton. No. 2 Doris Hart of Coral Gables, Fla., defeated Nicola Pietrangeli, Italy, 6-1, 6-1.

There was no action in the majors on Monday, but all teams in both leagues open full blast on Tuesday, in night games mostly. Elsewhere in the National League the St. Louis Cardinals are at Cincinnati, Philadelphia is at Pittsburgh and Chicago at Milwaukee.

Dodgers Add New Players

BROOKLYN — The Brooklyn Dodgers Monday brought up reinforcements from their farm system, pitcher Pete Wojey and outfielder Walt Moryn, for their important three-game series with the New York Giants.

Wojey, a 31-year-old righthander, was recalled from Mobile of the Southern Association where he had an 8-3 record and a .323 earned run mark with 93 strikeouts in 103 innings. Moryn, who had been assigned outright to St. Paul, was re-acquired and outfielder Don Thompson was sent to the American Association farm.

Moryn, a left-hand pitcher, batted 301 in 71 games with St. Paul, hitting 18 home runs and driving in 50 runs.

Polo Ground Clashes Looming as Sellouts

NEW YORK (AP)—Leo Durocher is toying with the idea of starting a "sleeper" who never pitched in the majors in Tuesday night's series opener with the Brooklyn Dodgers as his New York Giants defend their one-game lead in the National League.

Ramon Montant, a 21-year-old righthander from Caracas, Venezuela, who joined the club Sunday after building up a 7-3 record on the Minneapolis farm, is the man.

Gambling Leo may decide to take a chance with the youngster and save Sal Maglie, the old Dodger killer, for Wednesday's day game. Maglie prefers to work in the daytime but he well rested and ready if Durocher says the word.

For the first time this season, New York baseball fans are battling for tickets for "the" game. Giant officials predict a capacity house of between 48,000 and 50,000 at the Polo Grounds with about 40,000 seats sold in advance. There is a strong advance sale for the Wednesday and Thursday day games that will complete the series.

Willie Mays and Co. come up to the vital series bursting with optimism after winning 22 of their last 26, including a 12-2 romp over the invading Western teams.

Day after day, Mays or some other Giant has popped into the hero role to keep the club moving. Although Brooklyn has played .800 ball since June 1, the Dodgers still are a game out of first place.

Brooklyn hits the Giants at full strength with its pitching all lined up and its injured regulars back in action. Pee Wee Reese, rested for three days because of a pulled leg muscle, is ready to play.

Don Newcombe shook off his shoulder trouble and won his last two starts, both complete games, to qualify for the opener.

Although the season is nearing the half way mark, the Giants and Dodgers have met only six times, each team winning three. Five of the games have been played at the Polo Grounds where Brooklyn has a 3-2 edge. They have met only once at Ebbets Field, April 18, when New York won.

Maglie, of course, has a long record of knocking off Brooklyn. His season record of 7-4 includes a 2-1 mark against the Dodgers but his lifetime mark against the Brooklyn is staggering 20-5.

Newcombe, the jumbo-sized Negro righthander who came back from the Army this year, has a 5-3 record with one decision over the Giants, the second game of the season, April 14.
