Utility Firm's Action Draws State Ruling

Any Union County petitioners may proceed against the California Pacific Utilities Co., for contributing funds to a campaign to defeat a \$4,500,000 PUD bond issue, Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton said Wednesday.

Thornton said the power company's contribution to a committee opposing the issue was in violation of Oregon's corrupt practices law and punishable if found to be "deliberate, serious and material."

The opinion was asked by George L. Anderson Jr., Union County district attorney. The company contributed \$4,000 for the campaign against the bond issue to finance condemnation and purchase by the district of the property of the private utilities company.

U.O. Historian Tells Rotary Club of France

In an address liberally spiced with sharp wit Dr. Gordon Wright, chairman of the history department of the University of Oregon, discussed France of today at a Salem Rotary Club meeting Wednesday noon.

Having spent five years in France as student and as member of the U. S. embassy staff and having written a book on French postwar politics which has been highly praised by critics, Dr. Wright speaks with real authority on French affairs.

Among the French, said Wright, there is a streak of anarchism and one of skepticism. They have a sort of instinct for resisting the government, are skeptical of authority and of doctrine. Yet for all the signs of political instability there has been a remarkable continuity in French policy — until the present cabinet took office only two men, Robert Schumann and George Bidault had served as foreign ministers under the postwar constitution.

The present government is definitely leftist as have been all the others since the war, though the extremes of left and right together command about half the voting strength, Wright said.

France remains static politically because the politicians fear any change. Dr. Wright pointed out, however, that French opinion had undergone considerable change in the past ten years. He expressed the view that evolution rather than revolution offered the better hope for France, and that the United States should be sympathetic with that country which has shown consistent support of postwar American policies.

124 Arrested In May for Drunk Driving

State police arrested 124 persons for drunken driving during May, with fines aggregating \$18,143, state police reported to Gov. Paul L. Patterson Wednesday.

There were 774 arrests for violation of the basic rule with fines of \$5,468. Arrests for reckless driving numbered 79 with fines of \$3,330. There were a total of 283 arrests in the game code division with fines aggregating \$7,772.

Arrests in the commercial fisheries code division numbered 36 with fines of \$1,264. The state police conducted 401 investigations of which 177 were cleared. There were 4,701 arrests in the motor vehicle division with fines of \$58,965.75.

Aurora Flight Strip Gets 25-Year Lease

A 25-year lease, effective immediately, was received Wednesday by the State Board of Aeronautics for the Aurora Flight Strip, Earl Snyder, board director announced.

The strip, with a 4,000 by 150 foot paved runway, will be used largely by western Oregon pilots, Snyder said.

County Budget Gets Stamp Of Approval

Marion County's 1954-55 budget, calling for expenditures of \$2,618,915, received the official stamp of approval at the final, public hearing Wednesday of the budget committee.

No last minute changes were made, said Commissioner Roy Rice.

The committee failed to be moved by a request from a representative of the Marion County Bar Association that the amount of money allocated for the hiring of office help for the circuit court judges be increased.

Reginald Williams, member of the Bar association board of directors, said that judges need full-time office secretaries who could take part of the load off the judges in the matter of meeting the general public and the legal profession.

County Judge Rex Hartley said the Bar should have appeared before the committee before the budget was made up. Williams said the association had no idea what the committee intended to do in the matter of secretarial help.

Beginning today secretaries for both Circuit Judge George Duncan and Judge Wallace Carson will be appointed.

Red Cross Conclave in Salem Today

Red Cross officials from the Willamette Valley and Southwestern Washington will gather in Salem today for a conference on federated fund raising as related to the American Red Cross.

Harold M. Davis of Salem, state representative for the Red Cross, reported some 30 persons are expected for the session to be held in the Senator Hotel. Invited to speak to the group is John Dismukes, representative of the Pacific area office in San Francisco. Dismukes attended the national Red Cross convention held during June in Los Angeles.

Delegates here today will be from chapters where a United Fund has been approved or is contemplated, Davis said. The discussion, following a noon luncheon, is expected to conclude about 4 p. m.

Careful Hosts Not Liable for Guests' Falls

A social guest cannot recover from her hosts for personal injuries resulting from a fall when there is no concealed danger or active negligence, the State Supreme Court ruled here Wednesday.

The opinion by Justice Walter Toomey, was one of six handed down by the court Wednesday, and confirmed a decision by J. S. Bohannon of Tillamook County in the case of Georgia McHenry vs. Horace W. Howells and Jane Doe Howells.

Other cases included: A contract cannot be reformed or rescinded merely because a successful bidder has made an error in his computations and the other party had no reasonable grounds to have known it, ruled Chief Justice Earl C. Latourette, in reversing a decision by Judge James W. Crawford, Multnomah County in case of General Electric Supply Corporation vs. Republic Construction Corporation.

Child Struck By Automobile

Kimmy Bradshaw, 4, of 3915 N. River Rd., escaped with a head abrasion Wednesday morning when he ran in front of a car near his home. The car, driven by Beverly Jean Hughes, 5100 Chehalis Dr., was going an estimated 25 miles per hour at the time of the accident, according to sheriff's deputies.

The little boy ran in the path of the car while on the way to a mail box with his father, Clarence Bradshaw. First aid treated the boy and advised his parents to take him to a doctor.

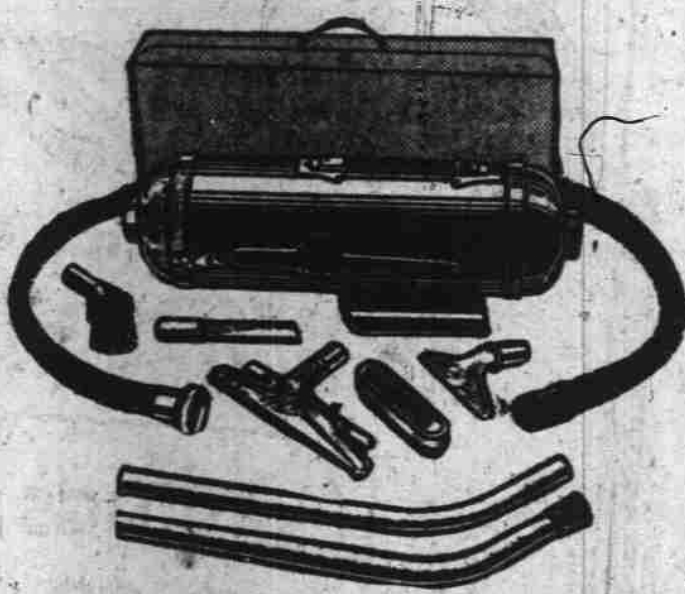
