Gaiety Wanes As Liberators Delay Arrival

GUATEMALA — The gay mood of Guatemala City celebrating the end of the nation's vicious two-week anti-Communist revolt evaporated quickly Friday night.

The damper fell when it became apparent the two principals in a new patched-up ruling junta have deferred their triumphal return to the capital.

Rebel leader Col. Carlos Castillo Armas and Col. Elfigo Menzies, chief of the junta which took over the government in the midst of the revolt, signed a peace pact in the pinkish dawn at San Salvador Friday and announced they would return to the capital.

Guatemalans touched off firecrackers and rang church bells and draped the streets of the capital with blue and white pennants to celebrate.

Crowds in fiesta attire hurried out to La Aurora Airport to greet the two chiefs with flowers. A holiday was declared, and business closed up.

But enthusiasms dimmed out under the bright July sky as the hours passed and the two colonels failed to appear.

Sheer fatigue from the two-nights-and-a-day negotiations at the Salvadorean capital and the desire of Castillo Armas to reorganize his headquarters at Chiquimula and prepare his troops for entry into the capital were given here as the reasons for the postponement.

Cordon May Get Powerful Senate Post

PORTLAND (U)—Sen. Guy Cordon (R-Ore) appears "certain" to become chairman of the Senate Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, succeeding Sen. Hugh Butler of Nebraska, who died Thursday night, says a Washington dispatch to the Oregonian.

While chairmanships usually follow seniority rule, Cordon may get the assignment over Sen. Eugene Millikin (R-Colo) because Millikin is chairman of the Finance Committee and Senate custom opposes the holding of dual chairmanships, the article says. Cordon is next in seniority to Millikin on the interior committee.

Cordon several times has been acting chairman of the committee, principally during the hearings on the tidelands oil bill last year and drafting of the Alaska and Hawaii statehood bills.

French Pullout Given Month Of Warning

WASHINGTON (U)—France Friday was reported to have warned nearly a month ago it would be necessary to make major troop withdrawals in Northern Indochina unless three divisions of outside forces were rushed to the critical delta area.

French diplomatic officials who told a reporter about this said the information was given during confidential military talks with top staff officers of the United States, Britain, Australia and New Zealand.

French military leaders, they said, made it clear at that time that France did not have the reinforcements needed to maintain the existing perimeter defenses shielding Hanoi and Haiphong, the key strongholds in the rice-rich Red River region.

Oregon Tax Expert Dies, Funeral Set

PORTLAND (U)—Services will be held here Tuesday for F. H. Young, 62, manager of Oregon Business and Tax Research, Inc., who died while attending the Portland-Hollywood baseball game Thursday night.

A native of Portland, Young attended public schools in Eugene and was graduated from the University of Oregon in 1914. He was a past president of the alumni association.

From 1922 to 1932, he was on the staff of the Oregon Voter, and in 1935 he founded Oregon Business and Tax Research. He was a recognized expert in his field and familiar figure at legislative sessions in Salem.

The widow, a son and daughter survive.

'Moonshine' Seized in Baker County

BAKER (U)—State and county enforcement officers arrested two Baker men in widely separated communities Friday and confiscated about 16 gallons of illicit liquor, two stills and other "moonshining" equipment.

Jailed on charges of operating an illegal still were Tom Russell Calder, of Hereford, and William Henry Streeter, of Eboli Creek, 15 miles east of here. They were lodged in the Baker County Jail.

The arrests were made by Sheriff Fred Thom and Deputy Virgil Parker of Baker County, and state liquor control enforcement officers.

It was the first seizure of its kind in the county this year.

Death Takes Former State Press Writer

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (U)—Harry L. Kuck, 59, Los Angeles newspaperman, died of a cerebral hemorrhage Friday in Santa Monica Hospital. He was born in The Dalles, Ore., and was graduated from the University of Oregon.

In his newspaper career Kuck was sports editor of the San Diego Tribune, assistant news editor of the Portland Oregonian, and had occupied other positions on the Oakland Tribune, San Francisco Examiner, Oakland Post-Enquirer, Los Angeles Examiner and Los Angeles Evening Herald Express. He joined the Los Angeles Times in 1952 as a copyreader.

BLEYTHING NAMED

Appointment of Dr. Martin W. Bleything, Portland, as a member of the State Board of Naturopathic Examiners, was announced by Gov. Paul L. Patterson Friday. He succeeds Dr. A. C. Fieitz who was not a candidate for reappointment. Dr. Bleything will serve a three year term.

PORTLAND (U)—Adlai E. Stevenson, the 1952 Democratic presidential candidate, arrived here Friday night to begin a week's vacation at an undisclosed Eastern Oregon ranch.

Compromise Farm Bill Passes House

WASHINGTON (U)—A compromise farm bill calling for flexible price supports for major crops and arming President Eisenhower with other powers to attack the problem of mountainous surpluses was passed by the House Friday and sent to the Senate.

Action was on a voice vote. The President didn't get all the authority he wanted to administer price supports on a sliding scale ranging from 75 to 90 per cent of parity.

Blocked 90% Parity
But the House voted 228-170 on a rollcall to allow the Agriculture Department to adjust its price props on a range extending from 82½ to 90 per cent of parity.

This was an administration-backed compromise introduced at the last minute by Rep. Harrison (R-Neb). It effectively blocked a strong drive by farm state legislators to continue supports at 90 per cent of parity through 1955.

Incentive Payment
Outstanding provisions in the bill include:

1. A 2½ billion dollar "set aside" of surpluses from the Commodity Credit Corporation's stocks for relief, foreign aid, stockpile and other purposes.

2. An incentive payment plan for wool growers, permitting the secretary of agriculture to support wool prices as high as 110 per cent of parity to encourage production closer to the level of domestic requirements.

3. A hike in price supports for dairy products from the present floor of 75 per cent of parity to 80 per cent.

Miss MacLean's home nursing committee includes Mrs. Clyde Warren, chairman, Mrs. Edwin J. Burke, Mrs. Malcolm Cameron, Mrs. John Golden and Mrs. Robert Radcliff.

This committee plans to set up an equipped room in the new chapter house for teaching classes in care of the sick at home.

Funeral Rite Set for Victim Of Drowning

Funeral services will be held Tuesday at 10:30 a.m. at the W. T. Rigdon chapel for Samuel Oliver Mowery, 51, who drowned Wednesday while fishing in the Deschutes River. Burial will be at Belcrest Memorial Park.

Mowery, an employee of the State Hospital, is survived by the widow, Jean; a daughter, Mrs. Mary Ellen Sommer of Portland; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert H. Mowery of Atascadero, Calif.; a brother, Waldo Mowery, Santa Rosa, Calif.; a sister, Mrs. Dorothy Potter of Atascadero, Calif., and two grandchildren.

Pacific Roller Rink at Coos Bay Burned

COOS BAY — Fire swept the Pacific Roller Rink here early Friday, causing an estimated \$65,000 damage. Fire Chief Francis M. Mulvey said investigation is underway to determine cause of the blaze.

The alarm was turned in at 12:10 a.m., shortly after an explosion blew out windows in the front of the building and sprayed glass and flaming debris across the four-lane Coast Highway.

Firemen had the blaze under control within 45 minutes but they remained on the scene three hours to prevent sparks from spreading to nearby buildings.

Larson Given Entomologist Post in State

Selection of F. P. Larson as head entomologist for the plant pest and disease survey program of the state department of agriculture was announced Friday by E. L. Peterson, director of agriculture.

He fills the vacancy created when John E. Davis, who developed the survey activity nine years ago, retired June 30. Larson has been with the program as an assistant entomologist since 1949.

He grew up in Woodburn, received his degree in entomology from Oregon State College in 1942 and following world war II was veterans' agricultural instructor in Salem before joining the department. The survey work is attached to the department's division of plant industry at Salem.

The survey work was recently expanded by addition of an entomologist who is working under a three-way agreement with the federal and state departments of agriculture and the state college extension service and experiment station.

Safety Action Urged by ARC For Holidays

The Marion County Red Cross this week issued a plea to holiday-bent motorists and vacationers to observe safety practices on both the road and play areas during the long weekend.

With the view in mind that a few common-sense precautions can prevent most accidents, Red Cross officials pointed out that accidents still will occur and outlined some elementary first aid instructions.

Some do's and don'ts listed are: Never move an injured person unless it is absolutely necessary; look for bleeding and try to stop it if found; help prevent shock by keeping a patient lying down and warm; call a doctor or ambulance and give a specific location of the accident; never give liquid to an unconscious person; and keep onlookers away from the victim.

A final word of advice: "Don't eat too much; don't drink too much; and don't exercise more than usual."

Water System Planned for Brush College

A 20-year progressive water program for the Brush College area was launched Friday with the filing of articles of incorporation for the Madrona Water System, Inc., to operate a \$3,000 system. Filing were Emmet T. Rogers, Genevieve Deering Rogers and Barnes D. Rogers, all of Salem, Route 1.

Emmet Rogers reports that the 20-year plan calls for an eventual reservoir of two million gallons, servicing some 800 homes. He said test wells have been utilized in the Brush College area for the past two years and prove there are reliable water veins. Some dozen homes have used the water exclusively for a considerable time.

Rogers adds that plans call for water rates comparable with those of Salem.

Other articles of incorporation filed Friday were: Hicks Sundry Co., Salem, \$100,000, drug sundries, P. E. Hicks, C. E. Hicks and Leonard G. Hicks.

Salem Couple Blamed for Crash Injuries

A Salem couple was sued for \$5,945 in Circuit Court Friday for injuries received in an accident last April 9.

A complaint filed by Mrs. Lena Jarvis charged that Mr. and Mrs. Clark Sutter were responsible for a two-car crash in which she received a broken rib, cuts and bruises.

The accident occurred at the intersection of Market and Summer streets. The complaint charged that a car driven by Mrs. Sutter failed to stop for a red light and crashed into a car in which Mrs. Jarvis was riding.

The complaint asks \$5,000 general damages, \$600 special damages, and \$285 to cover automobile repairs.

Wendt Seeks Damages for Fall Injuries

Carl J. Wendt, 651 Manbrin Dr., asked \$12,883 damages Friday in a complaint filed in Marion County Circuit Court. The action grew out of an accident March 7 in which Wendt broke his ankle when he tripped over a curbing at Church and Ferry streets.

Named as defendants in the complaint were Mr. and Mrs. Glenn O. Burright, owners of Burright's Cleaners, 198 S. Church St. The accident occurred in front of the firm.

Wendt charged that the Burrights had been negligent in installing a new curbing when they had a driveway built in front of the building. He asked \$12,500 general damages and \$383 special damages to pay for medical treatment and an ankle brace.

H. C. Saalfeld, director of the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs, will leave Tuesday to attend the annual conference of the National Association of State Directors of Veterans Affairs in Mackinac Island, Mich. Saalfeld is on a panel which will discuss education and training of veterans.
