

Guatemala Junta Probes Atrocities of Arbenz Regime

GUATEMALA CITY (AP) — Guatemala's new man of the hour, Col. Carlos Castillo Armas, said Sunday his victorious rebel command is collecting "much information" on alleged atrocities charged against ousted President Jacobo Arbenz Guzman and his Communist-backed regime.

He said in an interview the data probably will be submitted to the United Nations.

He said his rebel forces, whose two-week campaign after an invasion from exile June 18 toppled the former leftist government, consider Arbenz and a number of his colleagues "criminals" and declared they "must be punished."

Meanwhile a source close to Castillo Armas reported that more than 1,000 alleged Communists have been rounded up and jailed in Guatemala City's central penitentiary.

Arbenz and Foreign Minister Guillermo Toriello have taken refuge in the steel-shuttered Mexican Embassy and have been reported preparing to fly out of the country Monday.

"Screening Due"
The Junta has said political refugees will be carefully screened to determine whether they are involved in criminal cases before they can be granted safe conduct out of the country.

The declaration by Castillo Armas Sunday indicated the Junta may be building up a court case against Arbenz.

Castillo Armas has agreed to take a secondary post on the Junta, with Col. Eliezer H. Monton holding the presidency until July 17 when a "permanent" president is chosen. It is unprecedented in Latin America for the leader of a successful rebellion not to insist upon getting the top post.

Armas' supporters are openly disgruntled with the present Junta arrangement and want him to be president even though he has said emphatically he doesn't want the job.

Evidence Gathered
Castillo Armas said Sunday reports and evidence of atrocities committed by the Arbenz police also were being gathered.

"Many people were killed and tortured," he said, adding that Arbenz "is no. 1" on the rebel list of criminals. Others, he said, include Toriello, former Police Chief Col. Rogelio Cruz Wer and former secret police boss Jaime Rosenberg. The two Arbenz police heads have fled to Mexico.

Police already have found a number of bodies they say are those of victims of tortures and massacres during the final days of the Arbenz regime. Many of them have been women and teenage girls. Newsmen have been shown some of the bodies and have reported there were indications of torture.

Newsmen attempting to see Arbenz at the Mexican Embassy could not get past the locked iron gate. A doorman told them the Mexican ambassador and the embassy secretaries were "too busy."

Congress Said To Lack Faith In Eisenhower

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. McCormack (D-Mass.) said Sunday that Congress is taking the initiative on foreign policy away from President Eisenhower.

He said Congress, by taking the lead on three major foreign policy issues in a week, had showed a "lack of confidence" in administration leadership.

McCormack, deputy House Democratic leader, named two of the congressional actions as a resolution warning Communists out of the Western Hemisphere, and a proposal in the foreign aid bill to cut off aid to any nation joining a nonaggression pact with Asian Communists.

In each case, he said, Congress has taken over functions which rightly belong to the executive branch.

The latest move in this trend, he said in an interview, is the declaration by Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) that he would resign as Senate Republican leader and fight for congressional action to take the United States out of the U. N. if the Chinese Communists are seated in that international organization.

Tot Hurt in Fall From Highchair Progresses

A Salem infant was pronounced in satisfactory condition at a Portland hospital Sunday following a fall from a highchair Saturday night.

Mary Louise Sears, 15 months, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Sears, 3770 Hurley Ave., bumped her head in the fall and later lost consciousness for a time. She was rushed to Portland by Willamette Ambulance Service early Sunday morning.

Graham Holds Conference On Indochina Nears Crisis

ABOARD QUEEN MARY (AP) — American evangelist Billy Graham, returning to the United States after a five-months preaching tour in England and Europe, held Protestant services in the main ballroom of this Cunard liner Sunday.

The evangelist was invited to speak by Capt. D. W. Sorrell. Although the captain was unable to give advance publicity to the meeting, the room was filled to capacity.

Graham told his listeners "There will never be peace in the world until people turn to the Prince of Peace — Jesus Christ."

The evangelist, who is due in New York Tuesday, is to address members of Congress at a private meeting in Washington Thursday morning.

Records Set At Carnival

ALBANY, Ore. (AP) — Two records were set Sunday in the final events of the 10th annual Albany Timber Carnival, watched by an estimated 10,000 persons.

The record-breakers were Harold Johnson, Morton, Wash., and Danny Sailor, Bloedel, B.C.

Johnson set a tree-topping mark by climbing 100 feet and cutting off the top of the tree in one minute, 57 1/2 seconds.

Sailor's record was in tree-climbing. He climbed 100 feet and returned to the ground in 37 and one-tenth seconds.

Gus Russell, Otis, Ore., won the log-chopping event, chopping through an 18-inch alder log in 55 1/2 seconds.

Phed Wittaker, Duncan, B.C., placed first in log-bucking. He sawed through a 3-foot fir log in one minute, 47 1/2 seconds. He also was third in log-chopping.

Eddie Herron, Kelso, Wash., defeated his brother, Jimmy, also of Kelso, in log-rolling. In that event two men balanced on a floating log trying to spin each other off.

Each of the five event winners received a \$250 prize.

Truck Struck, Driver Runs

Puerto Ricans Held for Action Along Ike's Route to Vacation

JERSEY CITY, N. J. (AP) — Two men were being held by Jersey City police Sunday night in connection with suspected operations of Puerto Rican Nationalists along President Eisenhower's route to his Maryland vacation retreat Friday.

Police said Jose Angel Bonilla, 22, and Miguel Angelo Rivera, 19, both of Jersey City, were arrested Saturday and questioned as possible occupants of an automobile listed in a Maryland State Police alarm as seen on Route 240 near where Eisenhower had been scheduled to pass.

The car later was found abandoned in Jersey City. Police said it belonged to Victor Rivera, an unemployed dishwasher of Jersey City, who is no relation to the Rivera being held.

Police Capt. Edward J. Keating said Saturday that Victor Rivera was cleared by the secret service of any connection with a Puerto Rican terrorist organization. Police Sunday night said they still were trying to locate him.

Police said Bonilla and Miguel Rivera were arrested at their home Saturday afternoon and were being held for further questioning because they were unable to give a good account of their movements during the time the auto was seen on Route 240.

It turned out that the presidential party did not travel Route 240 on its way to Camp David in the Catoctin Mountains. It went, instead, via Leesburg, Va., Point of Rocks, Md., and then over Route 15.

Spokesman for the party said the route was not changed because of Puerto Rican Nationalists, but to allow the President to see different scenery and avoid traffic.

Russians Work On New Atom Power Plant

MOSCOW (AP) — The Literary Gazette announced Saturday Russian engineers are working on a new and bigger atomic power station and predicted atomic powered airplanes with "practically unlimited range."

The paper's statement amplified the Soviet government's announcement on Wednesday of the opening of a small 5,000-kilowatt atomic power station.

The Soviets said the station was the first in the world to furnish power to industry and agriculture. It added that bigger stations were planned.

The Literary Gazette gave the proposed capacity of new Soviet atomic power station as from 50,000 to 100,000 kilowatts, a size sufficient to supply the power needs of a medium-sized city. It said a 100,000 kilowatt station would consume but 250 grams of uranium daily.

"This small expenditure of fuel," the paper said, "will make it possible to build a power station at any place in our country."

The Literary Gazette also predicted atomic powered ships, locomotives and "other forms of transport."

The Russian atomic power station announced last Wednesday is not a large installation. The United States and Britain have experimental atomic electric power units. Although the Soviets claim theirs is a commercial station, it appears from its size that it is primarily an experimental operation.

The United States has projected an atomic power station of about the size which the Russians say their engineers are working on. It is to be located north of Pittsburgh, Pa., and have a capacity when complete of 60,000 kilowatts.

Present schedules have called for its completion in four or five years. The British are building an atomic power station in Scotland which they hope to have in full production before the end of 1955.

The indications from the Literary Gazette announcement seem to be that the Russians are quite possibly trying to beat both Britain and the United States in building a big atomic power station.

Bank Deposits In Salem Total \$47,000,000

Almost \$47,000,000 was on deposit in the two branches of the U. S. National Bank in Salem at the end of June, a report from Salem manager Rex Gibson indicated Saturday.

The U. S. National system throughout Oregon showed an increase in deposits of more than 40 million dollars during the fiscal year ending June 30. Its total resources were listed as \$694,976,970.

The Ladd & Bush and West Salem branches here made loans and discounts during the year totaling more than \$13,000,000.

Mrs. Dempsey Said Improving

Costa Rica To Get Weapons From U.S.

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (AP) — Foreign Minister Mario Esquivel said Saturday Costa Rica will receive "modern arms" from the United States next week.

Esquivel said the arms will be delivered during the week by U. S. military planes and that the head of the U. S. military mission in Costa Rica will have charge of training the country's civil guard in their use.

It was learned in Washington that Costa Rica bought the arms about two months ago under a provision of the mutual security act permitting friendly nations to acquire surplus American equipment at a discount.

(No details were available, except that the equipment consists of light arms for the Costa Rican civil guard, or police force. Costa Rica has no standing army.)

Fall Fatal to L. E. Johnson, Amity Resident

Linden E. Johnson, 44, a resident of the Amity area for the past eight years, died Sunday in a Portland hospital of injuries received in a fall from a silo at his home.

Johnson was injured approximately a month ago. He was working about the silo, was overcome by gas accumulated inside the structure and fell a considerable distance.

Johnson is survived by the widow, Eleanor, Amity, two daughters, Darlene and Sandra, both of Amity; mother, Mrs. Evalena Johnson, Niobrara, Neb.; sisters, Mrs. Marjorie Knutson, Niobrara, Neb., and Arlene Vilhauer, Sioux City, Iowa; and brother, Lyle Johnson, Niobrara, Neb.

Funeral services will be held at Clough-Barrick Chapel Wednesday, July 7, at 1:15 p.m. Interment will be at Belcrest Memorial Park.

Civil Defense Office to Move

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a new step to prepare for any H-bomb attack on the United States, the Federal Civil Defense Administration announced Friday it would move its headquarters to Battle Creek, Mich. The transfer will be completed within 60 days.

Officials said the main reason for the move is to get the agency away from Washington or any other major city which would be likely to be a target of atomic attack in case a major war should break out. Battle Creek, in the south central part of Michigan, had a population of 46,600 in the 1950 census.

The civil defense agency employs 406 persons and has an annual payroll of 34 million dollars. A spokesman said it is expected that a good percentage of the employees will move to Battle Creek.
