

2 Little Boys Rescued From Bridge Pier

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Two scared little boys, perched atop a 100-foot high bridge pier, looked down at the hushed crowd. They seemed like tiny birds who had lost their wings.

For 2½ hours Tuesday a pair of veteran bridge painters had tried to reach them. The youngsters, Ronald, 8, and Billy Hughes, 6, had spent a night of cold and hunger on the abutment.

Their rescuers, Regis Cusick and Bill McNally, finally climbed along a catwalk and then slid down to the pier with the aid of a rope.

The two painters trapped the youngsters into a boatswain's chair. As the boys slowly swung into the waiting arms of a policeman, the hundreds of spectators cheered. Then gazing up at the youngsters' rescuers the crowd roared an ovation.

No one was able to learn just how the boys got to their perch on the Westinghouse Bridge which is 265 feet high. However, police said they apparently climbed down a catwalk, then slid down a huge archway to the abutment where they were stranded 100 feet from the ground.

The boys, barefoot and covered with dirt, were dazed when they finally were rescued. But in a moment a smile flickered across Billy's face. He grinned a little at his 10-year-old brother, Dan. It was Dan who had heard his brothers' yells and started the rescue effort.

Ronald and Billy were rushed to a hospital. They were none the worse for their experience but neither wanted to talk. Ronald shyly answered questions by nodding his head.

Asked if he had stood guard while his younger brother slept, Ronald nodded affirmatively. Was he scared? The youngster nodded no. Had he and his brother run away from home? Ronald nodded yes. Asked why, Ronald stared straight ahead, his lips pressed together, his head still.

Mrs. Sarah Hughes, the boys' mother, said she had locked them in a room as punishment for minor disobedience Monday. She added: "Somehow they snuck out. I didn't sleep all night. Dad and Danny searched until 4 o'clock this morning with flashlights. I don't know why they did this."

2 City Groups To Move Into Courthouse

The Salem Industrial Development Council will be settled in its new offices in the Marion County courthouse by the end of this week and the Chamber of Commerce will move to the courthouse early next week, according to J. Russell Dudley, executive manager of the development council.

Members of the council will meet Wednesday morning to make final plans for the move, Dudley said.

New headquarters for the two groups will be Room 338 of the courthouse. The large room, designed for eventual use as a courtroom, will hold general offices. Two smaller rooms will serve as offices for Dudley and for Clay Cochran, manager of the Chamber of Commerce.

The Chamber of Commerce board of directors voted last week to move to the courthouse. The industrial development group had already accepted an offer of space. The two organizations are separate but work closely together.

Morse Not Happy Over Prospect of Cordon Promotion

PORTLAND (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse is not pleased with the probability that Oregon's other senator, Guy Cordon, will become chairman of the Senate Interior and Insular Affairs Committee.

He told The Oregonian by telephone Tuesday that with former Gov. Douglas McKay as head of the Department of the Interior and Cordon chairman of the committee, "the private monopolies will reap a harvest of special privilege handouts and the people will reap a whirlwind of destruction of their heritage in natural resources."

Tornado Hits Port Angeles

PORT ANGELES, Wash. (AP)—An unwelcome stranger blew into town here Tuesday evening, leaving a trail of damaged television antennas, broken glass, twisted fences, snapped tree limbs and wrecked lawn furniture.

The visitor was a small-bore tornado which struck a 2-block area in the southeastern section of town at 8:30 p. m. It twisted the roof from a carport at the Jack Post home and slammed it against a neighbor's house, 50 feet away.

A dozen or more antennas were partially or completely wrecked. Power lines snapped. A 5 by 10 foot greenhouse was pushed two feet and 75 per cent of the glass broken. A metal lawn table set was picked up and broken in pieces against a garage 15 feet away.

Mrs. R. A. Butler, who lives next door to the Post, said the twister hit town as it dropped over a hill, traveling from the southeast to the northwest, and broke up on another hill two blocks distant.

No one was injured.

Ex-Salem Woman Dies in California

Industry Report to Note Trend Toward Dispersal of Plants

An evident trend for the dispersal of large industrial plants now located in metropolitan areas in this country presents a sizeable opportunity to an alert industrial development commission.

This observation along with some suggested answers to Salem's industrial problems are contained in a report prepared by E. Burr Miller, chairman of the industrial council's public relations committee. The report will be presented to council members at a breakfast meeting at the Marion Hotel this morning.

The report is a resume of the Western Regional Industrial Development Workshop held at Santa Clara, Calif., in June. Delegates from 11 western and three southern states attended, Miller said.

In answer to the question of how cities comparable in size to Salem are handling fire protection and water and sewage facilities, Miller reports that most industries prefer to locate within zoned areas thus taking advantage of uniform standards. For the most part new industry pays its own way on utility extension and use, he said.

The problem of annexation of land already developed but without public utilities has been met in many communities by a sharing of the cost of utility extension by both industry and the city, Miller reported.

City government's part in furthering industrial development should include wholehearted moral support, a courteous service to all inquiring industry and a balanced tax load, the report continued. The workshop brought out that desirable industry does expect to carry its full share of taxation.

Gas Line Due In Northwest By End of '55

PORTLAND (AP)—The Pacific Northwest will be getting natural gas by the end of December, 1955, Robert R. Herring predicted here Tuesday.

Herring is vice president of the Pacific Northwest Pipeline Corp., Houston, Texas. His company won Federal Power Commission approval June 18 to build a 1,466-mile pipeline from San Juna Basin natural gas fields in the Southwest to the Pacific Northwest.

Work on the project, to cost about 160 million dollars, will start as soon as financing is completed, said Herring, here to discuss contracts with the Portland Gas and Coke Co. He predicted financing would be finished by the end of next September.

Herring said he did not expect any long delays to result from appeals by other companies from the FPC decision. He said Oregon, Washington and Idaho natural gas distributors will buy from his firm at the same rate.

Judge Change Made Again

KLAMATH FALLS (AP)—Another change in judges will become necessary here in circuit court criminal cases.

Defense attorneys in two separate cases filed motions Tuesday for the State Supreme Court to appoint a judge other than Ralph M. Holman of Oregon City. Court officials said it is mandatory for the court to do so.

Holman himself was a replacement named by the Supreme Court after Dist. Atty. Frank Alderson had asked that another judge take over from the regular judge, David Vandenberg.

Alderson and Vandenberg have been at odds for months. Holman was named to take over four criminal cases. He still is scheduled to hear the other two cases.

Woodburn Seeks Sewage Disposal District Bids

WOODBURN (AP)—The city council here Tuesday night authorized the calling for bids for the Hardestad-Lincoln Sewage Disposal District. Bids for the estimated \$55,000 project will be accepted up to 5 p.m. on July 27 at which time they will be opened by the council.

The council also amended an ordinance which requires mandatory connection to the sanitary sewer system. The amendment pertains only to those sewers inspected and declared adequate by the council.

The amended ordinance retains the Sept. 15 deadline for connection to the city sewer as well as other details such as methods of connection, inspections, fees and penalties.

In other business council members approved a state highway commission proposal which would increase the speed limit on Highway 99E through Woodburn from 35 to 40 miles an hour.

5 Arrested as Moonshiners

PORTLAND (AP)—Federal officials arrested five men at scattered locations in Oregon over the weekend, and accused them of making moonshine.

The arrests were at Albany, Eugene and Baker.

Federal agents reported they seized 70 cans of moonshine whiskey in No. 2½ cans at Albany. They also seized a Cadillac and arrested Paul Lowery.

Two men were arrested on a farm 15 miles west of Eugene, where a 25-gallon still was found in operation. Bond of \$250 was set for each in their appearance before the U. S. Commissioner in Portland Tuesday. They were Joseph R. Glisan, 54, and Peter Rittthaler, 50, both Eugene. Rittthaler was the farm owner.

Arrested at Baker were Tom Russell Calder, 54, and William Henry Streeton, 52, both Baker. They were charged with operating stills, one of them made from a five-gallon pressure cooker. Bond of \$1,000 each was set at Pendleton.

Czech Bid to Trade Captive GIs Rejected

BAERNAU, Germany (AP)—West German border police said Tuesday night they received and rejected a Czech bid to trade seven U. S. Army men seized Sunday for three Czech political refugees.

U. S. Army headquarters in Heidelberg said it had nothing to do with the Czech-German negotiations.

The Army added it hoped to obtain the release of the Americans "soon and without difficulty" by other means.

The Americans, a captain and six enlisted men from the medical detachment of an artillery battalion, apparently were grabbed by Czech border guards when the soldiers strayed across the border while on a liberty sightseeing trip. Their names have not been disclosed pending their release.

Emil Preiss, West German border police commander, said Tuesday night the Czechs had insisted on trading the men for the three Czechs who fled to the West recently. He added the Germans had rejected the barter proposal at "the last meeting with the Czechs." He continued:

"There is nothing we border police can do any more. We have tried everything possible, but we were unsuccessful. The next step is up to the Americans."

It was the second meeting Tuesday between the German and Czech border police at an undisclosed place. No Americans were present either time, Preiss said. He said the Czech negotiators were led by a major. The Czechs later told the Germans the Americans had been turned over to the Czech border patrol headquarters in Prague.

TRADE BILL EXTENDED

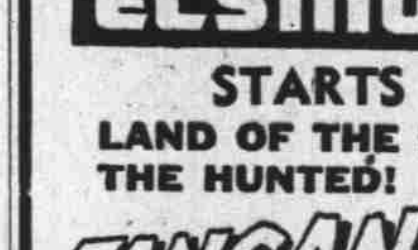
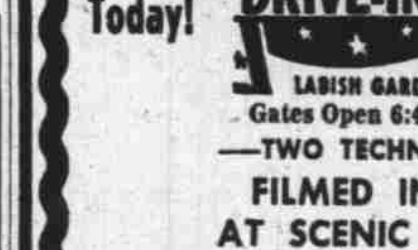
