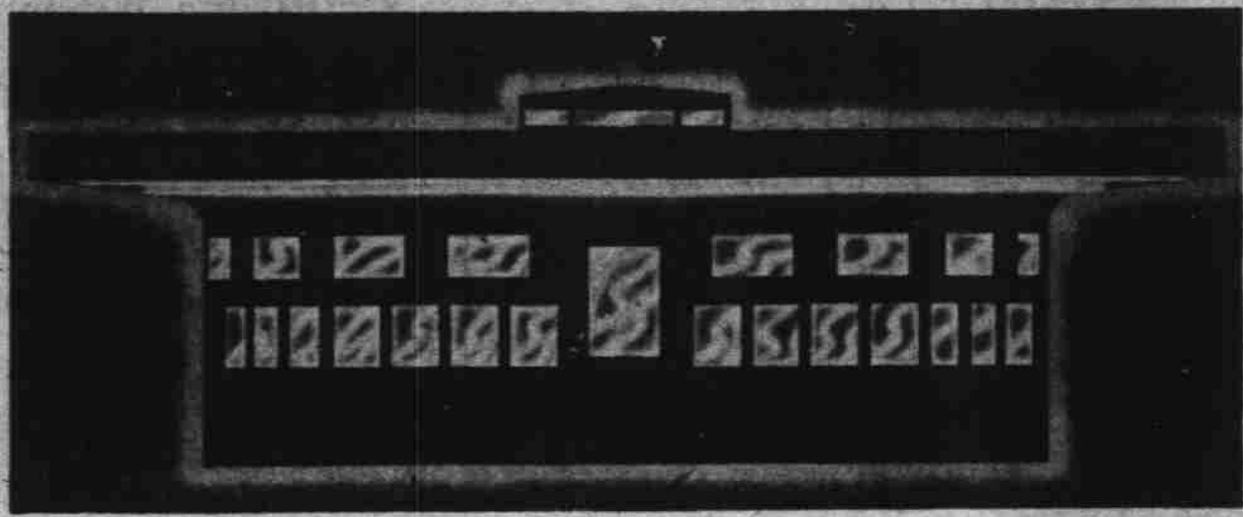


## New Information Booth Readied for Fair

## Senators Ask Study of Possible Legal Action Against Home Builders

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate housing scandal investigators voted Monday to ask the Justice Department whether criminal action should be brought against two New Jersey builders.

The vote, in the Senate Banking Committee, followed a public hearing at which one of the builders, Sidney Sarnar of Tenafly, N. J., refused to answer questions. Sarnar stood by his rights under the Fifth Amendment not to testify against himself.

The committee decided to send to the Justice Department the transcript of testimony taken recently in a secret committee meeting from Sarnar and Ralph Solow, his partner, for possible criminal action.

Further, Chairman Capehart (R-Ind.) said the committee decided to ask the Senate's legislative counsel whether George I. Marcus, a Sarnar-Solow partner

and their attorney, was in contempt of the Senate. Marcus refused to answer questions, but did not plead the Fifth Amendment.

**Reports of Profits**  
The committee is inquiring into reports of huge windfall profits on government-insured housing loans.

During Monday's stormy public session, Sarnar would give only his name and address. Marcus shouted at Capehart:

"We are unable to prove or disprove your insinuations. We are not going to permit you to publicize these matters and shoot your mouths off. We did nothing wrong."

At one point Monday, Capehart declared that the committee is laying bare a situation that dwarfs such scandals as the Teapot Dome oil deal of the 1920s and the Reconstruction Finance Corp. loans that made "mink coats" a political byword in 1952.

**Berne Testifies**  
This Capehart comment came during the testimony of Gustave M. Berne, of Great Neck, Long Island. Berne said under questioning that he had figured on making a profit by getting a loan in excess of actual costs.

There was "a common understanding that a builder... would be likely to end up" with a margin, he testified, and he was sure the FHA knew of that understanding.

Berne testified his FHA-insured loan exceeded the cost of the Rockaway Crest Apartments he built at Far Rockaway, Long Island, by \$1,370,000 and he also made a million dollar profit on a separate land transaction.

Capehart said Berne put in only \$3,000 as sponsor and builder of the 14 1/2 million dollar apartment development.

Attorney Marcus, in complaining about the way the committee was handling the inquiry, protested that it "didn't give him, Berne, the chance to prove that he also put up FHA fees" and other expenses.

## Discovery of Body Clears Air Mystery

TOLEDO — The heavily-wooded area eight miles north-northeast of Toledo yielded the body of R. W. Hall Monday to clear up a three-month-old mystery of the air lanes.

Hall had left Boise, Idaho, to fly to Newport, on April 12 last. While still in the air, he radioed the Eugene field that he had landed safely. It was for that reason no cognizance was taken of his disappearance for several days. He was to have paid a surprise visit to relatives here.

A prolonged air search for him subsequently failed.

The body and wrecked plane were found by two Valseck loggers, Vernon Castle and Milton Davenport. State police and the State Aeronautics Board area designer, Harvey Henderson of Pacific City, brought out the body.

Hall's home was in Bakersfield, Calif.

## Three Escape State Hospital, One Caught

Three escapees from the State Hospital were reported to police over the weekend—but one was quickly located at his home in Seaside.

Due for a quick return to the institution is Richard Wachmuth, age 33. His wife notified authorities that he had arrived in Seaside and that she would return him.

Still missing are Kenneth Edgar, 50, and Bill Estes, 15. Estes escaped late Sunday while being transferred from one ward to another.

## YM Campaign At \$378,277

A total of \$378,277 has been subscribed toward the \$450,000 campaign to erect an addition to Salem's YMCA facilities, the building fund committee reported Monday. At the weekly report meeting \$1,345 was added to the total.

A preliminary study by Salem architect James L. Payne indicates that the full goal will be needed for the new structure, according to Gus Moore, YM general secretary.

Some six months probably will be needed to complete building plans while actual construction will require about a year, he pointed out. The new addition will face on Cottage Street.

## Burglary of Grocery Nets Small Loot

Police are investigating the weekend burglary of the Miller Street Grocery—a venture which yielded the culprit or culprits nothing more than \$2 worth of cigarettes and cigars.

Roy Adsitt, owner of the store at 1199 S. Commercial St., reported that the break and entry apparently took place sometime between Sunday and Monday morning. Adsitt discovered the burglary when opening the place for business Monday.

Police report entrance was gained to the store by prying off boards at a rear door leading to a store room. The lock was then broken on a door leading into the store. The office was entered, drawers ransacked and an attempt made to open the safe, police said. The cash register also was rifled—but the thieves netted not a dollar in cash for their pains.

Missing were 12 cartons of cigarettes and three packages of cigars, according to officers. The safe was slightly damaged.

## Senator Morse Asks U. S. Stay In United Nations

NEW YORK (AP)—The United States should stay in the United Nations, even if that organization seats Red China, Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon believes.

"If our allies make the serious mistake of voting Red China in," Morse said, "we should sit there and try to see to it that Red China lives up to her moral responsibility."

Morse added: "It is important to keep the voice of America strong in the United Nations. Rather than get out of the international organization, it is important that we stay in."

He said an apparent American tendency to "go it alone" already has reduced American prestige to its lowest point in 35 years. The Oregon Independent addressed the opening session of the American Electroplaters' Society here.
