Supports for Certain Dairy Goods Hiked

Producers of manufacturing milk have recently been receiving an average price below the minimum placed at 75 percent of parity, government officials noted. The result is a week-end announcement of support prices for certain dairy products being increased. Commodities affected will be cheese and non-fat dry milk solids.

Prices for these commodities, becoming effective Monday, were increased 1 cent a pound. The new purchase price to be paid by the government for support purposes will be 33.25 cents a pound for Cheddar Cheese. The spray product of non-fat dry milk solids will be increased 1 cent a pound, amounting to 16 cents. The purchase price for the roller product of non-fat dry milk solids will be 14.25 cents a pound.

The full increase of 1 cent a pound in the purchase price is expected to be passed on to the dairy farmer.

Steady to Firm
Prices for most dairy commodities during this past week were steady to firm. The cheese markets showed some firmness because of the announced increase in purchase price. The non-fat dry milk markets also showed some firmness although prices have not increased as yet.

The output of butter and cheese on a weekly basis throughout the nation has been showing a decrease for the past two or three weeks. Supplies, however, continue well above the demand. Surpluses continue to move to the Commodity Credit Corporation. Purchases by the Commodity Credit Corporation, however, have been tapering off for support purposes.

Prices received for milk cows have been holding fairly steady in Oregon in recent weeks, although nationally, prices have been showing a downward trend.

Head Downward
However, prices received during June of this year, were down nearly one-fifth compared to a year ago. Prices also continue about 42 percent below the record high for dairy cows during the spring of 1952, although they still held above the past 10 year average.

Prices during June on a national basis were about 15 percent less than a year earlier, and holding about 40 percent below the 1950 high national price range.

Registered heifers of Guernsey and Jersey breeds have been bringing from \$150 to \$250, depending upon their production ratings. Producing cows have been running about \$50 more on the average. Particularly high producers, with official test records, however, have been bringing more, ranging from \$100 to \$200 more.

Salem Heights Man Hurt in Coast Wreck

NORTH BEND, Ore. — Donald Vernon Randolph of Salem Heights was improving at Keizer Hospital here Monday after surviving a head-on highway collision Sunday that killed the driver of the second car, James Leonard Ledford, 17, of Bandon.

Doctors said Randolph's condition was very good. He suffered fractures of the knee and hip and was to undergo hip surgery within the next few days.

Police said both drivers were alone in their cars when they collided near Bandon.

(Randolph, a resident of 460 W. Salem Heights Rd., is co-owner of the Commercial Contracting Co., in Salem. He was on a business trip when injured in the accident near Bandon Sunday.)

The bleachers are to seat 4,000. The field has been completed. The meeting will take place tonight at the new School Administration Office building, 1309 Ferry St.

Unander Asks Justices Pay Remitted Fines

Legal proceedings to end the practice of many Oregon justices of the peace of remitting portions of fines assessed against log truck operators for overloads were asked here Monday by State Treasurer Sig Unander.

Unander made the request to Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton in a letter stating that the practice has cost the state several hundred thousand dollars since Jan. 1. It is also permitting a great deal of damage to Oregon highways, Unander pointed out.

The request followed an opinion by the attorney general last month that the practice was illegal.

Unander suggested a mandamus proceeding be instituted to compel the courts to impose and collect penalties upon conviction and prevent the justices of peace from making improper reduction of fines in the future.

If courts uphold the state's contention that fines for overloads cannot be remitted, Unander plans to request the attorney general to take legal steps to recover money lost to the state, either from the justices or their bondsmen.

Unander said it appeared the remitting practice was most prevalent in Lane County, though practiced quite generally throughout the state.

Mrs. Hiebert, Grandmother Of 78, Dies

DALLAS — Mrs. Marie Hiebert, grandmother of 78 and great-grandmother of 28, died in Dallas Saturday and funeral services will be Tuesday, July 13.

Death came to the 88-year-old woman after a week's illness. She resided at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Agnes Wiens of Dallas.

She was born Jan. 25, 1866, in Russia. She was married Dec. 20, 1887, at Goessel, Kan., to David R. Hiebert, who is deceased. Prior to coming to Dallas 13 years ago Mrs. Hiebert also lived at Perryton, Tex., and Newport, Wash.

A member of the Grace Mennonite Church she is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Wiens and Mrs. Maire Balzer, also Dallas; sons, Frank of Deer Creek, Okla., Jacob of Custer, Wash., and William, Henry and Gustav, all of Newport; sister, Miss Lizzie Janzen of Walton, Kan., and brother, Peter F. Janzen of Walton.

Services will take place at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the Grace Mennonite Church here with the Rev. J. M. Franz officiating. Services also will be held Friday at 2:30 p.m. at Newport, Wash., with interment in the Mennonite Cemetery there.
