Beavers Blasted, 9-2, by Hollywood

Stengel Hopes On Ford Today

National Leaguers Favored to Repeat

CLEVELAND (AP) — Whitey Ford, 23-year-old New York Yankee left-hander, is Manager Casey Stengel's surprise pitching choice to start against Philadelphia's Robin Roberts in Tuesday's 21st All-Star baseball game at municipal stadium.

Seeking to break a four-game American League losing streak, Stengel drew on his own staff to face the favored National Leaguers who pack three lefthanded sluggers — Cincinnati's Ted Kluszewski, Brooklyn's Duke Snider and St. Louis' Stan Musial — in their starting lineup.

With a break from the weatherman who predicts a partly cloudy day with the thermometer soaring to the middle 90s, the All-Star attendance record of 69,812, set at Cleveland in 1935, might be broken.

More conservative estimates call for about 65,000 loyal souls, despite Cleveland's "lost weekend" in Chicago.

Game time is 1:30 p.m. (EDT) with network radio (Mutual) and television (NBC and Mutual) coverage. In case of rain, the game will be played at 8 p.m. (EDT) Tuesday night. If the weather should force other postponements, Commissioner Ford Frick has set aside 11 a.m., 2 p.m., or 8 p.m. (all EDT) Wednesdays.

The game receipts plus the \$110,000 radio-TV money go into the central fund out of which the player pensions are paid.

Although the Americans still hold a 12-8 edge in the series, the Nationals' home run power makes Manager Walter Alston's team an 8 to 3 choice.

Both clubs are in tough shape for pitching after Sunday's heavy doubleheader firing and injuries that cost the American the services of New York's Alie Reynolds and Cleveland's Mike Garcia, two of the very best.

Stengel admits he planned to use Garcia until he got word Sunday that he was unable to pitch for his own team against the White Sox. He also expected to use Chicago's Virgil Trucks but may not work him because he pitched a tiring nine-inning game Sunday.

"I wanted a lefty to get after their lefthanders," Stengel said, explaining his choice of Ford who has been erratic in compiling a spotty 7-6 record. Ford, however, threw a strong game against Boston last week and looked so good in relief at Washington Saturday that he was elected to start. "If he throws like that nobody ever will hit him."

Alston, who got the job as a freshman manager because Brooklyn fired Chuck Dressen, the '53 pennant winner, followed the book in naming Roberts (11-8), a 27-year-old righthander who started three of the last four National League victories since 1950. No club, incidentally, ever has won five in a row. The Americans copped four straight from 1946 through 1949 and then the Nationals took charge.

"We've got some fellows which can hit home runs too," said Stengel in answer to all the talk about the Nationals' fence-busters. "My centerfielder (Mickey Mantle) can hit that ball. Al Rosen (Cleveland first baseman) and Larry Doby (Cleveland center fielder) also have hit home runs in this league. "It's up to us to keep them from hitting home runs."

Stengel won't name a second or third pitcher until Tuesday. From his conversation, you get the idea he is thinking of Washington's Bob Porterfield or Chicago's Sandy Consuegra (Garcia's replacement) for the middle three. That would give him well-rested Bob Keegan of Chicago or Dean Stone of Washington, his other lefty, to finish up. Casey pointed out that the last pitcher could possibly work more than the maximum three innings in case it should go into extra innings.

Stengel also will have available Baltimore's Bob Turley, Cleveland's Bob Leon and Trucks, all of whom pitched Sunday.

After Roberts, Alston is undecided. He probably will shift to a lefthander, Johnny Antonelli of New York, for the middle three. That would leave lefthander Warren Spahn of Milwaukee and righthander Carl Erskine of Brooklyn, Marv Grissom of New York and Milwaukee's Gene Conley and Jim Wilson. Five of the Nationals' seven pitchers worked Sunday. Spahn pitched Saturday and Antonelli Friday.

Roy Campanella, the Brooklyn catcher who has been behind the plate for 43 consecutive All-Star innings, got a go-ahead from his doctor Monday in Brooklyn. The doctor reassured Campy that a recent numbness in his fingers, following an operation, was only a natural reaction and he soon would be as good as ever.

The 16 starters, exclusive of pitchers, were named by the votes of 4,272,476 fans and must play at least three innings. Pitchers were selected by the managers along with the other members of the 25-man squads. No pitcher can work more than three innings, unless the game goes overtime.

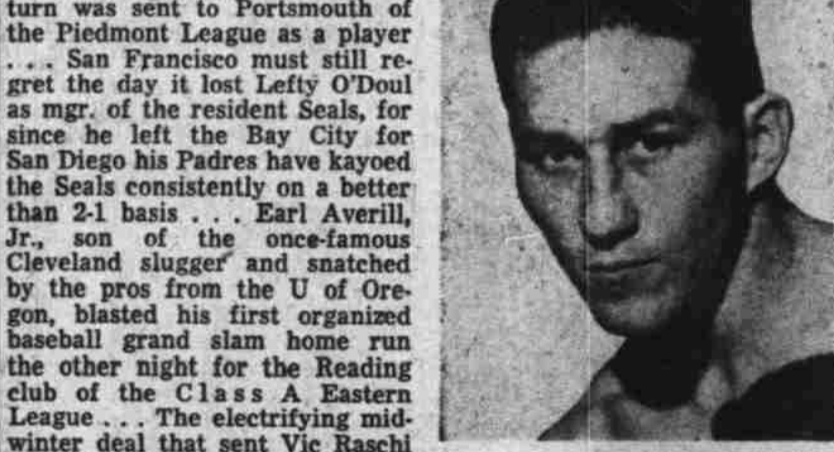

Hollywood Pounds Portland Pitching

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Hollywood thrashed Portland Monday night, 9-2, punching 11 hits off Red Adams, Jess Flores and Lee Anthony. Roger Bowman was the winner, although giving way to Forrest Main in the eighth. The game attracted only 1,424.

Hollywood jumped on Adams for two runs in the first inning. Carlos Bernier and Dick Smith singled, Bernier making third and Smith then stealing second, both coming in on Jack Phillips' smash.

The Stars clicked for five more in the fourth, getting five hits and knocking Adams out. Phillips doubled, Walls singled, Monte Basgall singled and Bernier walked. With the bases jammed, Smith doubled to center, scoring two. Flores took over and Tom Saffell stroked to score Smith and Bernier.

Hollywood got two more in the sixth on Bowman's single, Bernier's triple and a squeeze bunt by Smith.

It was Bowman's 13th pitching victory. Portland's Fletcher Robbe ruined Bowman's try for a shut-out when he whacked his 13th homer of the campaign over the right field barrier.

The Beavers added their second run in the eighth when Bowman filled the bases on two walks and an error and Rocky Krsnich bounced into a double play off reliever Main.

Up to the time he apparently lost sight of the plate, Bowman had given up only four hits.

Freitas Takes Sacramento Managership

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — The Sacramento baseball club elevated Tony Freitas, one time pitcher turned coach, to manage the ailing Solons Monday after Gene Desautels quit suddenly in the midst of his second season.

General Manager Charles Graham said Desautels was not pressured to resign. Desautels, 46, said he decided to leave for the good of the team, currently tied with Portland for seventh place in the Pacific Coast League.

"I have made mistakes," he declared, "and some of my decisions backfired."

Desautels, who came here after five years of managerial experience in Eastern leagues, said his future plans are indefinite. He intends to remain in Sacramento for awhile before returning to his home in Flint, Mich.

Freitas, a long-time pitching favorite of Sacramento baseball fans, inherited a team which finished last in 1953 and which has fared this year after getting off to a fast start.

He spoke of Desautels' resignation as a great shock, and pledged to "do my best to get the club on the winning track."

The new manager, also 46, broke into organized baseball with the Solons in 1929 to begin a 26-year pitching career. He later went to the Philadelphia Athletics, Portland, St. Paul and Cincinnati before returning here in 1937.

Freitas pitched for and managed Modesto of the California League in 1951. He retired from active pitching with the Stockton Ports and was signed as a Solon coach last December. The little lefthander left behind a total record of 362 victories and 258 defeats.

Whether Freitas will get the managerial post permanently or merely on a stop-gap basis was uncertain. A final decision probably will await the return of Solon President Eddie Mulligan from an eastern trip.

Most Leaders In Star Game

CLEVELAND (AP) — Only two of the 10 leading hitters of the National and American Leagues will be absent Tuesday when the leading players clash in the annual all-star game.

Every member of baseball's big ten, except rookie Wally Moon of the St. Louis Cardinals and Jim Busby of the Washington Senators, either was elected or named to the all-star squad.

Moon, a candidate for National League rookie honors, is batting .333, good for fourth place in the senior circuit; and Busby, with .312, is seventh in the American League.

Senators, Braves Vie Here Tonight

'Jacks Swamp Solons, 14-3

The Salem Senators return to Waters Field tonight to start a three-game series with the Tri-City Braves. Game time is eight o'clock. The two clubs swing over to Kennewick on Friday, Saturday and Sunday for additional games this week.

Anxious to crack a second-half pennant race losing streak that has now reached four games, the Senators will lead off with their young pitching whiz Johnny Briggs in tonight's opener with Manager Edo Vanni's Braves.

Briggs won his last outing, against Yakima, and it was No. 10 for the hard-throwing kid from Folsom, Calif. He fanned 13 Yakima swingers in the process to run his season total to 130, highest in the WI League.

Since Briggs downed Yakima in the opening game of second half play almost a week ago, however, the Senators have lost four in a row to the same Yaks.

For their first-half schedule the Solons downed the pesky Tri-City crew only five times in 16 tries.

So High Luby's outfit has its work cut out in no uncertain fashion this week.

Possible flinger for the Braves in tonight's mix here will be Jess Dobernick, the veteran righthander who defeated the Senators in close ball games the last two times he faced them.

In last night's game at Coos Bay with Manager Curly Leininiger's power-laden Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks, the Senators used five pitchers in a vain effort to keep the 'Jacks from their 18th straight victory.

The 'Jacks, made up of all former professional players, pounded out 19 hits—every man 'Jack getting in at least one lick—for a crushing 14-3 triumph over the helpless Senators. A stand-up crowd of 2265 paid roared their approval.

The bay nine wasted no time shelling Salem's Roenspie and Gene Johnson for five hits and six runs in the opening inning. Roenspie was pounded for five runs, all of them earned, before yielding to Johnson with one out. Del Sarto came on in the second and fared not much better, watching three runs come in in the pair of innings he worked. And so the story went including Johnny Kowars' inside the park home run in the seventh inning with one on board.

Meanwhile the Senators weren't making hay against former Solon Cal Melvin. They bunched three hits for a pair of runs in the second, and bunched three more for one run in the sixth. But that's all they wrote. Only Harry Warner was able to double up against Melvin, collecting two of the Senators total of six.
