The youth suffered an extended illness, and was forced to leave Cascade Union High School, where he was a freshman, in April.

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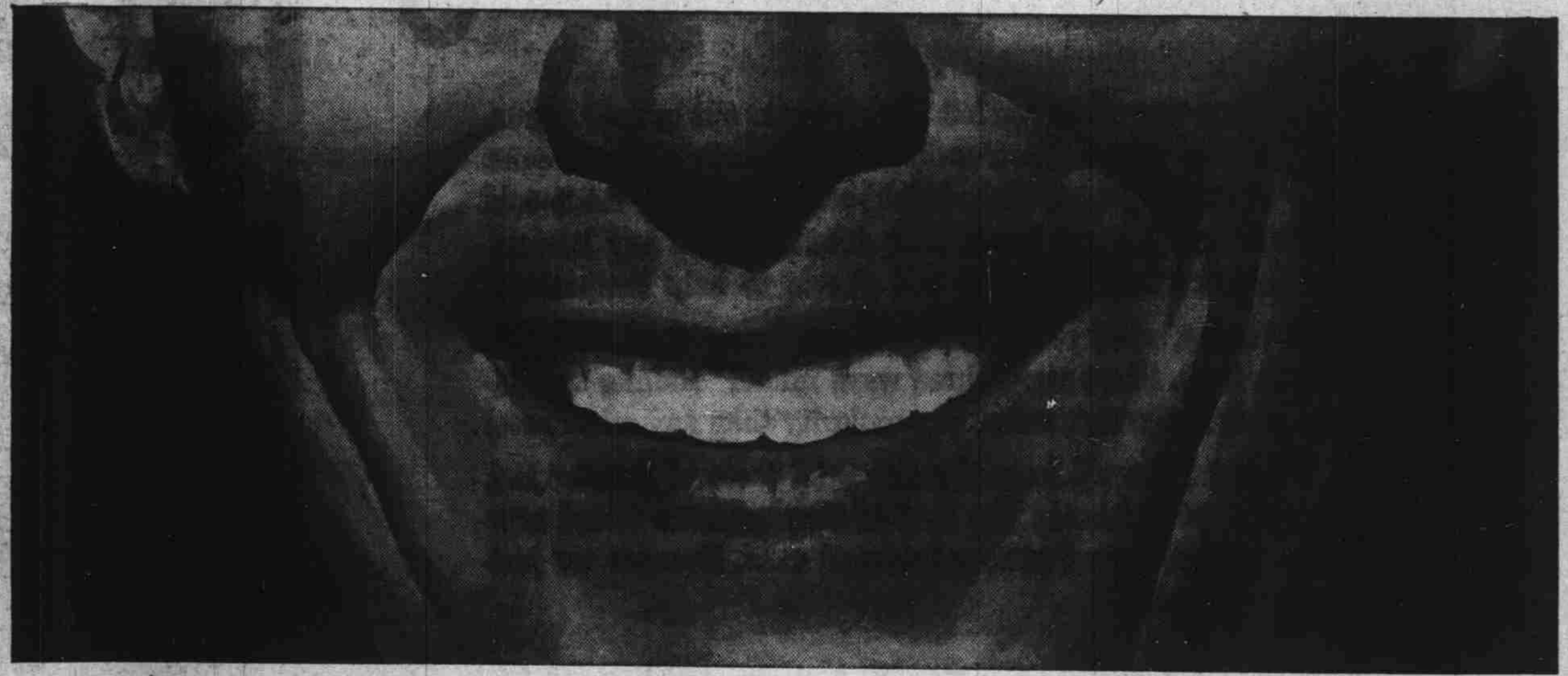
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
