WASHINGTON IM - Members of Congress from the Pacific North-west states split along party lines in House and Senata votes on two 1 important measures Wednesday. In the Senate, Washington's two

Democratic members, Jackson and Magnuson, and Oregon's Independ-ent, Morse, voted for an amend-ment to ban President Eisenhower's plan for a new private power plant in the Tennessee Valley Boost in Pay area.

The amendment was defeated, 55-36; with the three Republican senators, Dworshak and Welker of Idaho, and Cordon of Oregon, vot-

ing on the prevailing side. In the House, Washington's six Republicans, Coon, Ellsworth and Norblad of Oregon and Budge from Idaho voted for a bill to raise the pay of postal employes and in-crease postage rates. Although they were in the majority, the Republicans failed as a two-thirds vote was needed for passage. Oregon's Rep. Angell did not vote. Voting against the measure were Washington's Democratic Rep. Magnuson and Idaho's Pfost.
