The bids will be opened by the school board at its next meeting, Aug. 10. Money from the bonds will be used to pay for the first steps in a building program to meet anticipated needs of the school system.

Sale of the bonds will use up the last of \$4,200,000 of bonding authority which was approved by the voters in 1952 for the construction of the new South Salem High School.
