Plywood by Christmas Aim Of New Firm

INDEPENDENCE—The National Plywood Corporation plant, slated for construction here, expects to be shipping green plywood by Christmas time, Independence civic leaders were told at a Tuesday night meeting.

Tom O'Connell, chairman of the corporation's board, said 125 shares out of an announced goal of 300 already had been sold to Independence persons.

The plant will be on the site of the Beaver Plywood firm, which folded last winter before beginning operations.

Merritt Steele Contractors of Portland will build the new plant. Machinery is expected to be installed not later than November, O'Connell said.

The corporation official emphasized that National Plywood has no connections with the Beaver Plywood firm that failed because of insolvency.

The problem of housing for workers in the new plant was a chief point of discussion by O'Connell and Independence Chamber of Commerce members at the meeting.

Polk's Rural Schoolhouses Appraised

DALLAS—Polk County's rural school buildings have been valued at \$1,300,000 in an appraisal just completed under the direction of F. C. Green, county superintendent.

The survey reportedly is the first of its type ever conducted in the county. It covers building structures, but not equipment and grounds, of the county's 28 rural schools including three second-class high schools, Perrydale, Valsets and Falls City.

Purpose of the survey was to give an idea of valuation for insurance and to form a basis for figuring depreciation.

Green has recommended that each district set up a percentage of its annual budget for depreciation and a sinking fund for future building replacement.

Amounts not spent for repair and maintenance should be placed in a building fund, he said.

A report by George F. Anderson, engineer who assisted in the appraisal, pointed to the need for repairs to avoid excessive depreciation in many of the structures.
