

State Demo Leader Says GOP Violates Corrupt Practice Act

State Democratic leader Howard Morgan Thursday accused the Republican National Committee of violating Oregon's corrupt practices law.

The state Democratic central committee chairman, in a letter to Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry declared the GOP committee had not reported any political advertising expenses back of a radio and television speech delivered May 10 in Portland by Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay.

State Pioneer Resident Dies At Corvallis

Rachael S. Coon, 86, pioneer resident of Oregon and formerly of Salem, died Tuesday night at a Corvallis nursing home.

Mrs. Coon had lived in Salem off and on for the past 10 years with her daughter here, Mrs. Mildred Harmon. She suffered a stroke about a month ago and was taken to Corvallis.

The deceased was born at Beaver Creek April 1, 1868, daughter of W. S. and Keziah Gibbs, early pioneers. She was married to George W. Coon Oct. 26, 1878, at Corvallis. She was a member of the Methodist Church.

Surviving are six sons, Thomas of Newport, Clarence of Florence, Chester of Oakland, Calif., Arthur of Roseburg, Francis of Philomath, and Lester of Richland, Wash.; daughters, Mrs. May Thayer of Corvallis, Mrs. Evan Smith of Richland and Mrs. Harmon; brother, William Gibbs of Milwaukie; sister, Corda Lee of Florence; 19 grandchildren; 36 great-grandchildren, and five great-great-grandchildren.

A son, A. W. Coon, former owner of the Top Hat Restaurant in Salem, died here in 1951.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 2 p.m. at the Mayflower Chapel in Corvallis. Interment will follow at Pine Grove Cemetery in Linn County.

Act Would Aid Unemployment Benefit Paving

WASHINGTON — Congress Thursday completed action on a bill to create a 200 million dollar reserve fund to help states if they run into difficulty in paying unemployment benefits.

The act also would earmark all unemployment taxes for the unemployment insurance program, stopping a diversion to the Treasury's general funds.

And, eventually, the act would return surplus federal unemployment funds to the states.

Amendments Accepted

The House passed the bill last year and the Senate approved it recently, with some amendments. The House accepted the Senate amendments late Thursday and sent the measure to the White House.

Under present law, a tax of three-tenths of one per cent is levied on payrolls to pay for federal administrative expenses under the unemployment insurance program. The remainder of the tax, which can run up to 3 per cent, goes to the states to pay for benefits.

In practice, however, the federal share of the tax has raised million more than federal admin-

istrative costs. This surplus has gone into the Treasury's general funds.

Reserve Fund

The new act specifies that the federal share of the tax—if not spent for administrative costs—goes into a reserve fund until the

reserve reaches 200 million dollars.

States then could borrow from this reserve fund, if heavy periods of unemployment or other factors put a strain on the state trust fund from which benefits are paid. After the reserve fund is established, a further surplus in federal funds could be distributed among the states.

The Senate amendments made it easier for a state to borrow from the reserve fund and softened the requirements for repayment.

9 Considered For School Job

Nine applications from persons seeking to succeed Mrs. Lena Smithson, as superintendent of the Hillcrest School for Girls, were considered at an all-day meeting of the advisory committee to Hillcrest School and MacLaren School for Boys Thursday.

Names of the applicants were withheld by the advisory committee pending further investigations and interviews.

Actual appointment of the new superintendent will be made by the state board of control which has jurisdiction over most of the state institutions.

Miss Darling Reappointed By Governor

Reappointment of Miss May Darling, Portland, as a member of the state board of education was announced by Gov. Paul L. Patterson Thursday.

Her appointment is subject to confirmation by the senate committee on executive appointments.

William Hansell, Athens, was reappointed as a member of the state board of livestock auction markets, representing the Oregon Cattlemen's Association.

Other reappointments announced by the governor:

R. P. Dixon, Eugene, as a member of the state air pollution authority.

Ulysses G. Plummer Jr., Portland, as a member of the advisory committee of the fair employment practices act.

Garnett Barrett, Heppner, as a member of the upper Columbia River basin commission of Oregon. Harry Heuer, Portland, was appointed a member of the state apprenticeship council, representing veteran-employers.

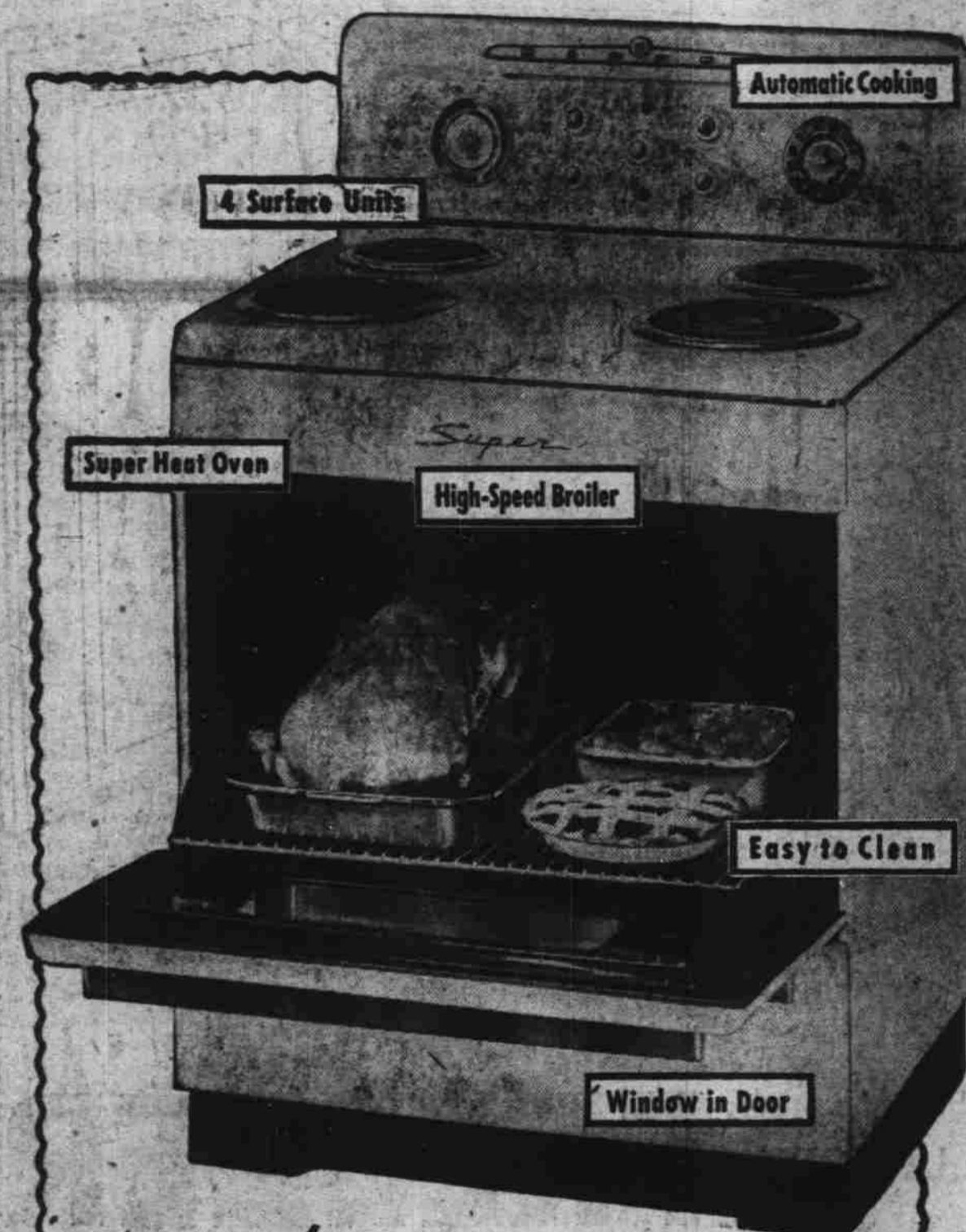
