

Rhee Heads for Ike Meeting As Asian Tensions Increase

WASHINGTON (U) — New tensions along the Communist front in the Far East Sunday sharpened the importance of conferences starting Monday between President Syngman Rhee of South Korea and President Eisenhower and other top U.S. officials.

They also increased the possibility that Eisenhower will revise plans for heavy U.S. Army with-

drawals from Far Eastern positions. As the 79-year-old leader of South Korea flew toward Washington, where he is due at 5 p.m. Monday, several developments indicated that decisions bearing on the role of the United States and friendly nations in maintaining Far Eastern security against Red Chinese pressure are in the making.

Developments Noted

These developments include:
1. Some evidence that the Chinese Communist regime, free of Indochina War commitments, may be shifting its main aggressive pressures now to the Chinese Nationalist controlled island of Formosa. Washington officials were deeply interested in reports that the Reds are beginning to beat the propaganda drum.

A big rally on this issue was reported held at Peiping Saturday with much speechmaking about breaking up the Nationalist rule of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek.

2. A review of plans for military cutbacks in the Far East, with the prospect that much greater American strength will be maintained than was contemplated after the Korean War ended a year ago.

At that time the Joint Chiefs of Staff laid down programs for reducing the U.S. Army from 22 to 17 divisions, mainly by withdrawing forces from the Far East. There were to be smaller cuts in naval and air strength there.

No Longer Feasible

It is understood now that military chiefs no longer consider this plan feasible and that a revised program of Far Eastern commitments is up for Eisenhower's decision.

Kuomintang Fliers Warned By China Reds

TOKYO (U) — Emphasizing tighter air defense along the southeastern coast of China, a Communist Peiping radio broadcast said Sunday night it will shoot down any Nationalist Chinese planes flying in "violation of its territorial rights."

The broadcast, heard in Tokyo, said "we will shoot down, as we did before, any planes, if the United States orders Nationalist Chinese troops to fly planes to challenge us."

The radio added, "The (Red) Chinese army, navy and airforce troops stationed along the Southeast Coast have taken an oath to fight to 'liberate' Taiwan (Formosa)."

"Morale of coast guard corps of the peoples republic of China is extremely high. The men are angered by U.S. sponsoring of a mutual defense pact with the Chiang Kai-Shek regime," the radio said, adding: "They have made up their minds to 'liberate' our territory from the 'enemy'."

New Money Sought to Get Added Taxes

WASHINGTON (U) — Sen. Capehart (R-Ind.) said Monday he plans to revive next year his proposal to call in all the nation's currency and issue new currency as a means of forcing out of hiding wealth on which taxes haven't been paid.

Capehart told interviewers on the NBC TV-radio show "Meet The Press" he "wouldn't be surprised" if this brought the government over one billion dollars in taxes.

The senator made the comment in answer to a question injected in a discussion of the Senate Banking Committee's investigation of "windfall" profits by builders on government insured housing loans.

Asked if he favored the motion by Sen. Flanders (R-VT) to censure the conduct of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) as chairman of the Senate investigations subcommittee, Capehart called the proposal "just a publicity stunt."

If Flanders brings up the motion next Friday, as scheduled, Capehart said, he will vote to table it. He said Flanders is guilty of the same thing of which he accuses McCarthy by making charges against the Wisconsin senator he can't prove.

The United States sent carriers to protect American-British-French rescue craft and then announced the action so that Red nations and allies alike would understand the extreme seriousness with which officials here, from President Eisenhower down, regard this "want-on-attack."

Crack Sabre Jet Wing Will Get Rockets

TOKYO (U) — The sharpshooting 51st Fighter Interceptor Wing—whose Sabre jets ran up an impressive record of MIG kills during the Korean War—is being moved to Okinawa from Korea next week to be re-equipped with rocket-firing Sabres.

Gen. Earle Partridge, Far East Air Force commander, announced here the move will strengthen rather than weaken air defense of South Korea.

Armistice terms prevent United Nations forces from introducing new combat materiel into Korea. Hence outmoded air groups are withdrawn to areas outside Korea for modernization.

The 51st is the third air wing of the U.S. 8th Air Force to be pulled out for modernization.

"In case of future hostilities, Korea is 1 hour and 49 minutes F86 flying time from Okinawa," Partridge said.

"By modernizing our units when new type aircraft are available we can keep our air crews proficient in the use of the most advanced weapons and thus increase our striking power."

When conversion is complete the 51st Interceptor Wing will be equipped with Sabre jets which are radar guided with electronic equipment which "locks" on a target and automatically fires a bomber-destroying battery for four rockets at the appropriate moment.

The Koreans had hoped to receive the equipment which is being replaced but the Air Force explained that it would be used to bolster other elements of the expanding U.S. air power.

Instruction on Communism in School Urged

CHICAGO (U) — A proposal that the theory and practice of communism be taught "in appropriate forms" in all schools in the U.S. in conjunction with the teaching of American government was made Sunday by an American Bar Assn. committee.

The recommendation of the committee on American citizenship will come before the association's House of Delegates during its annual convention Aug. 16 to 20 in Chicago.

The report of the citizenship committee, headed by U.S. Judge Walter M. Bastian of Washington, D.C., states:

"The dangers of communism could be readily understood if properly taught and it would be of great value to the youth of our country if they could be adequately shown the differences between the theory and practices of communism."

The report said its recommendation was similar to one recently adopted by the Pennsylvania Bar Assn.

"It is recognized that this is a controversial subject," the report said in part. "The committee believes it is one that should be met head-on. Some lawyers have written to the committee advocating that this be done, but that the teaching be done by lawyers."

"With this we do not altogether agree. If lawyers are available, this could be done, but we believe that the teaching profession is able to handle the situation and that it will be well handled."

Scientists Ask New Approach To Security

WASHINGTON (U) — A group of atomic scientists, declaring "there is a need for a new approach" to security, proposed Sunday a six-point revision of government standards.

The Federation of American Scientists made public the proposal which it said was prepared by its representatives at the Atomic Energy Commission's Los Alamos installation and presented there July 16 to AEC Chairman Lewis L. Strauss.

Strauss was not available for comment.

The federation statement said that "loyal people at all levels of responsibility in the atomic energy program, including the commission-ers themselves, might well be indicted by the same kind of standards as were applied to Dr. Oppenheimer."

Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, who supervised development of the atomic bomb at Los Alamos, was declared a security risk last month by the commission, which revoked his access to secret information.

Raid Fatal to Guard Chief In Costa Rica

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (U) — Reports received here Sunday said the commander of the civil guard at Sarapiquí was killed Saturday during an attack by an armed band.

The reports identified the assailants as followers of former President Rafael A. Calderon Guardia, now in exile in neighboring Nicaragua. They are believed to be the same band which attacked the telegraph office at Vara Blanca two days ago.

Relations between Costa Rica and Nicaragua have been strained recently because of Nicaraguan charges that a group of men who attempted to assassinate President Anastasio Somoza came from Costa Rica.

Washington Girl Beaten With Hatchet

BELLINGHAM, Wash. (U) — A 7-year-old Ferndale girl was beaten savagely with a hatchet early Sunday and the Whatcom County sheriff's office here was holding the lot's 6-foot, 1/2 inch mother for questioning.

In serious condition at St. Lukes Hospital, her small body laced with cuts and bruises and both eyes swollen shut, was little Margaret Dykstra.

Her mother, Mrs. Regina Dykstra, was being held for questioning. The sheriff's office said an investigation was being made. No charges were filed against the woman.

Deputy Sheriff Cliff Axling quoted the woman as saying:

"I didn't want her to live the kind of life I have been living."

Axling said officers were summoned to the Dykstra home eight miles north of Ferndale early Sunday morning by a phone call from a woman who urged them to send an ambulance and a "deputy to pick up a murderer."

The sheriff's office said later Mrs. Dykstra admitted making the call.

On arriving at the Dykstra home, Axling said, an officer found the little girl lying on a bed, stripped to the waist. Her body was a mass of welts, cuts and bruises.

Lying beside the bed was a small axe. Its handle had been broken from the head.

Axling quoted Dykstra, who was at home when officers arrived, as saying his wife had been despondent.

The Dykstras have several other children.

French GI Dies at Hands Of Tunisian

Tunis, Tunisia (U) — Violence continued Sunday in this tense French North African protectorate. A revolver-wielding Tunisian killed a fellow countryman and a French soldier and wounded another soldier.

French authorities clamped on tighter security measures against nationalist terrorists after the assassination Saturday of French Col. René de Benoit de LaPallone. The colonel commanded the guard for the protectorate's nominal ruler the Bey of Tunis.

French Resident General Pierre Vizaro postponed a scheduled trip to Paris. Police ordered all Arab cafes closed. Roadblocks were set up on all routes.

In Paris a cabinet meeting was expected to take up the Tunisian problem early this week.

Tavern Fight Injures 2 at Klamath Falls

KLAMATH FALLS (U) — One man was critically wounded by a gunshot and another suffered a serious knife wound in a tavern fight at Bly, 48 miles east of here, Sunday.

Sheriff Murray Britton said Alfonso Torres, 33, a Mexican, pulled a gun during a fight with Jimmy Anderson, 31. The gun was fired several times, one of the bullets wounding a customer, Lon E. Jenkins, 32, in the chest.

Anderson then pulled a knife and wounded Torres in the throat, Britton said.

Anderson was released from the state penitentiary 12 days ago after serving 13 years on a Klamath County manslaughter conviction. Britton reported.

Both Torres and Jenkins were reported in critical condition.
