Red Plot Seen In Hi-jacking Of Dynamite

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (U.S. —) Police said Tuesday they believed the hi-jacking of a load of dynamite from a U.S. construction company Sunday was part of a plot by Communist sympathizers to sabotage U.S. arms shipments to Honduras.

Honduras has been receiving U.S. arms under a recently signed defense agreement.

A group of men Sunday held up Charles Register, an American citizen, and stole a large quantity of dynamite from a road depot of the Jones Construction Co., a U.S. company which has been paving a highway from Tegucigalpa to the coast.

Stock Market Gains Slightly

NEW YORK (AP)—Fifteen cross-currents of trading pushed the stock market about irregularly, Wednesday, but it managed to close with a slight net gain.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks gained 10 cents at \$132.30. That is the second straight net high for the average at the best levels since October of 1929.

The industrial component of the average advanced 20 cents at a new high of 179.00, and the utilities were up 30 cents at a new high of \$63.50, but the railroads stepped back 20 cents.

The market was broad with 1,220 individual issues traded of which 580 were higher and 392 lower with 164 new highs and 3 new lows for the year recorded.

Volume was heavy at 2,740,000 shares. That compares with 2,690,000 shares traded Tuesday when the market was strong.

Wheat closed 2 1/4 - 2 3/4 lower, corn 1/4 - 1 1/4 lower, oats 1/4 lower, rye 1/4 - 1 1/4 lower, soybeans 2 1/4 - 5/8 lower and lard unchanged to 8 cents a hundred pounds lower.
