## School Board To Open Gas, Fuel Oil Bids

Bids on the large quantities of gasoline, fuel oil and lubricants required in the coming year by Salem School District will be opened at a School Board meeting Aug. 10.

School officials also have advertised for bids on \$780,000 worth of bonds, the last to be sold of a \$4,280,000 bond issue authorized by voters in 1952 for the new high school and other construction. Towel laundry bids also are called for Aug. 10.

A School Board committee which had studied several other bids received this month by the board has authorized contracts for several school improvement projects.

Universal Marble & Tile Co., Portland, won the contract, at \$3,400, for ceramic tile for shower rooms at Leslie Junior High and North Salem High.

R. L. Elstrom Co., low bidder at \$3,314, was granted contract for acoustical material for installation at North Salem, Leslie and Richmond.

Woody Furniture won the contract for \$6,513 worth of asphalt tile for floors at the new Grant School and other schools.

## AF Offering Higher Grades To Enlistees

Men with prior military service who qualify in any of 25 job specialties can enlist in the Air Force in grades higher than any previously offered, T. Sgt. William F. Vanderpool, Salem recruiter, reported Wednesday.

The policy applies to men qualified in intelligence, photo interpretation, catagraphis supervision control systems, electrical weapons, radio and radar, aircraft engines and maintenance and other fields.

Qualified men may enlist with grades up to technical sergeant, Vanderpool explained.

BROOKS — Residents of Brooks are already rallying to the aid of the large Adam Free family whose home was destroyed by fire Wednesday.

The Frees lost nearly everything in the fire—possessions they valued at \$3,000. Even the mother's spectacles were lost.

Mrs. W. R. Pfau, district health chairman and the Oregon Statesman's Brooks correspondent, is coordinating efforts to help the Free family. She reports the need for children's clothing and shoes especially urgent. There are eight boys and three girls living at home.

Clyde Robinson and his son, residents of the other house, saved some of their possessions. The two dwellings were owned by Britt Aspinwall. He said the larger house was insured.

## State Divisions Tender First Fund Requests

First financial requests of state departments and institutions for the next biennium arrived at the state budget division this week.

State Budget Director LaVerne Young said no time would be lost in preparing the state budget for the 1955-57 biennium so it may be printed and distributed among legislators well in advance of the 1955 legislative session.

The word has gone out from Gov. Paul L. Patterson and the state budget department that all frills must be eliminated and that financial requests must be based on necessities. Particular reference was made to proposed capital outlays including construction operations.

Young estimated that less than \$6,000,000 of surplus state funds would be available at the end of the current biennium. Nearly \$30,000,000 was available at the close of the previous biennium.

All financial requests must receive approval of the governor before being sent to the legislature.

Any recommendations for state institution construction, other than that approved by the voters, will come from the state board of control.
