

New McCarthy Recall Drive Coming in Fall

WASHINGTON (U)—A new move to unseat Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) will be launched after the November elections, LeRoy Gore, chairman of the "Joe Must Go" clubs, announced Thursday.

As outlined, this will be a more elaborate drive than the one that failed last spring. Not only will the "Joe Must Go" people be after signatures from Wisconsin voters, but they also will launch a nationwide campaign to persuade citizens to write their senators.

Senate Approval Sought

The aim is to make sure that, in case Wisconsin votes to unseat McCarthy, the Senate will go along with the decision.

Gore predicted he would encounter no difficulty in: 1) Getting enough signatures to set up a recall election, and 2) defeating McCarthy in that election.

"The people of Wisconsin have changed their mind about McCarthy," Gore said, "and he ought to have to go to bat again."

Gore, 50-year-old editor of the Sauk (Wis.) Prairie-Star, was in town Thursday to line up backing for his renewed recall campaign and also to do what he could in behalf of the move by Sen. Flanders (R-Vt.) to censure McCarthy.

To Talk to Wiley

Gore said he would be talking with a score of political leaders of both parties, but he declined to identify any of them except Sen. Wiley (R-Wis.). He added that Wiley was a personal friend of his and that he would not try to pressure Wiley into taking a stand on the recall move.

The Wisconsin constitution, Gore explained, provides that 25 per cent of those casting ballots in the last previous gubernatorial election must sign recall petitions before a special election can be held.

He said it was necessary to get 405,000 signatures after the '32 elections but that he doesn't believe he will need to get more than 250,000 after the '54 vote.

Slayer Wins New Delay Of Execution

SAN FRANCISCO (U)—Caryl Chessman, convicted Los Angeles sex terrorist, turned best-selling author, Thursday won a new stay of execution less than 24 hours before he was to die in San Quentin's lethal gas chamber.

And California Atty. Gen. Edmund G. Brown announced he will seek to have the stay—Chessman's fourth in six years—reversed and suggested possible action toward abolition of the state's death penalty, on the grounds court maneuvers by condemned men are making a mockery of the administration of justice.

Brown attacked the stay—granted to permit Chessman his fourth appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court—in a bitterly worded statement and asked Gov. Goodwin Knight to hold up the executions of two other felons scheduled to die Friday in the gas chamber.

"There's no reason," Brown said, "why a man who can write a book should have an advantage that these two other apparently friendless people do not have."

After consulting his clemency secretary on Brown's request to delay the executions of Chessman's fellow convicts to permit them, too, to seek Supreme Court review, Knight said he saw no reason to intervene.

The cancellation of Chessman's execution resulted in moving up the other two's death hour from 2 p. m. to 10 a. m.

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Tip by Girl Brings Arrest Of Suspects

EUGENE (U)—A girl was credited Thursday with the tip that led to the arrest of two men and a 16-year-old youth on charges of armed robbery.

The girl told police at nearby Springfield that the three had invited her and two girl friends to accompany them to California. She said their car contained cigarettes and other things that appeared to be possibly burglary loot.

Springfield police contacted Eugene police and they linked the trio with the holdup Thursday night of a Eugene grocery store. Mrs. Iola McMillan, grocery store proprietor, reported that a gunman took \$70 from her while two companions waited outside in a car.

Police were directed by the girl to a Springfield motel where they arrested Henry Bradley, 35; James Alldridge, 25, and Con LeRoy Shuck, 16. The three were arraigned in district court and Shuck was remanded to juvenile authorities.

Development Of New Onion Announced

CORVALLIS (U)—Development of a new hybrid onion which promises to become the "premium" variety for commercial growing areas of Eastern Oregon, Southern Idaho and parts of Utah and Colorado was reported here Thursday.

DeLance F. Franklin, superintendent of the Parma, Idaho, branch experiment station, told the annual northwest meeting of horticulturists, entomologists and plant pathologists that the new hybrid, Fiesta, gives bigger and earlier yields than other onions.

Franklin and scientists at five other stations in the United States have this year been trying out 11 hybrids and Fiesta, he reported, tops present yellow sweet Spanish onion varieties in yield, storage qualities, size uniformity and has 25 to 30 per cent greater solid content for dehydrating. Commercial production is expected by 1956.

Also speaking was W. A. Luce of Yakima, county extension agent, who said that despite occasional failures, the surest and most economical protection against frosts is burning oil.

Two few heaters, lighting too late or turning off too soon have sometimes caused crop losses, he said.

Recitation of the rosary will be in the W. T. Rigdon Chapel at 8 p.m. Sunday. Burial will be at the Mt. Crest Abbey Mausoleum.

Police Search For Missing Jefferson Girl

State police from the Salem office Thursday were trying to locate a 16-year-old girl from the Jefferson area who has been missing from her home since Sunday.

The girl, Lois Marie McComb, was reported to have left with Norman Eugene Hill, 20, a transient farm worker. Hill was employed on a farm adjoining the farm of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Howard McComb, two miles southwest of Jefferson.

The parents said the girl had met Hill for the first time Sunday evening when he invited her to go with him to Albany for a soft drink. They agreed to return home within half an hour. Mr. and Mrs. McComb notified police after they had failed to return several hours later.

Hill has not reported back for work. Police broadcast a "locate" notice for him Thursday afternoon. He was driving a dark green 1953 Chevrolet automobile with California license plate 2K3150.

Speculators Blamed for Coffee Costs

WASHINGTON (U)—The Federal Trade Commission Thursday attributed the sharp rise in coffee prices last winter to speculation, an increase in Brazil's export price figures, and other factors including "market imperfections."

The commission's report was the fruit of an investigation begun last January under orders of President Eisenhower. There had been widespread indignation among United States housewives when the retail price of coffee shot up to \$1.15 a pound and more.

In the report, the FTC saw prospects for lower prices in the future unless there is excessive crop damage, and provided "supply and demand are permitted freely to run their course."
