Cordon Plans All-Day Tour of Polk Co.

DALLAS — The current Oregon Itinerary of Senator Guy Cordon will include an all-day tour of Polk county on Wednesday, Sept. 8, and an evening speaking engagement at Dallas City Hall.

The senator will speak at a dinner meeting in the Chamber of Commerce rooms under auspices of the Polk County Cordon for U. S. Senator Committee, headed by V. O. Williams of Dallas, general chairman.

One hundred tickets are available for the dinner which is slated for 6:30 p.m. All interested persons are invited to his main talk at an after-dinner meeting at 7:30 in the chamber rooms.

Cordon will visit Monmouth, Independence and West Salem before arriving in Dallas in the afternoon. He is running for his third term in the U. S. Senate following his 1944 appointment to fill the unexpired term of the late Senator McNary.

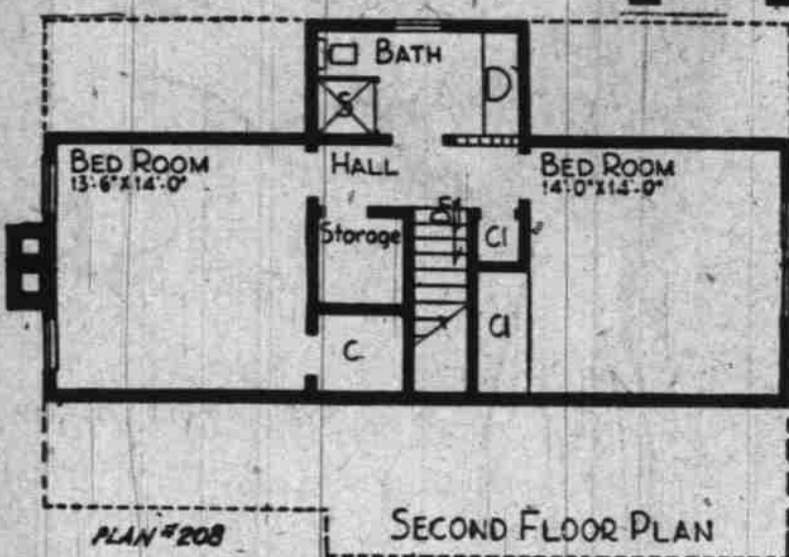
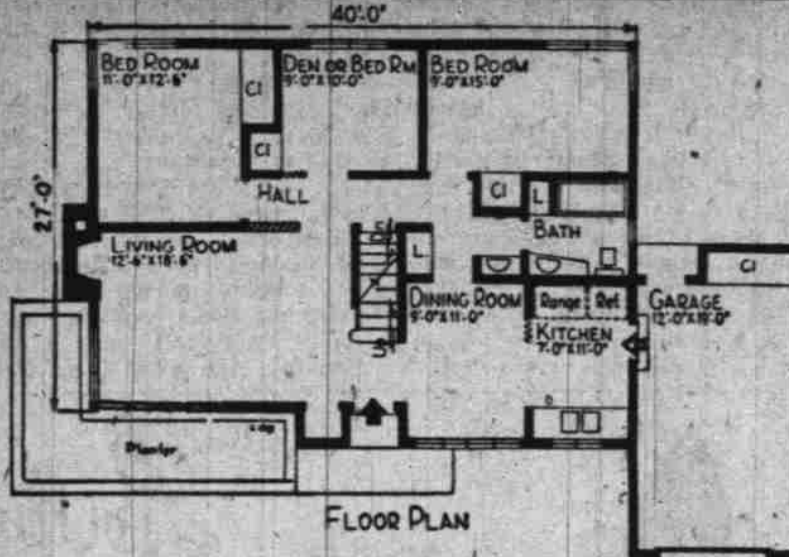
