

## Portland Zoo Has 'Visitors'

PORTLAND (UP)—The Portland zoo was visited by three young Thailanders Thursday who will probably stay around for a while.

The visitors were two bear and a leopard, all about four months old, who are the latest in the series of animals presented to the zoo by people in Thailand. They were forwarded here by Austin F. Flegel, resigned chief of the Mutual Security Agency in that country who is due to return here shortly.

Previous gifts by Thailanders provided the zoo with "Rosy" the elephant, two gibbons and a Bengal cat.

WASHINGTON (UP)—Mrs. Percy A. Lains of Fort Madison, Iowa, took over as new president of the American Legion Auxiliary Thursday with a promise to back the Legion's big drive for universal military training.

Incoming vice presidents who assumed offices here included Mrs. Faye Dorsett, Phoenix, Western division.

Cordon said the mills, mainstays of John Day's economy, have nearly exhausted their stands of private timber and will be forced to rely chiefly on federal stands.

"I hope a federal cutting circle with full sustained yield and maximum timber utilization can be established within the John Day economic area," Cordon said.

Oregon's senior senator, making a campaign tour through central and eastern Oregon, conferred here with mill operators and national forest representatives.

He suggested that small operators that have difficulty meeting federal standards of maximum

utilization, sustained yield and access roads band together for those purposes while continuing to market their timber individually.

## Sale of Ford Stock 'Mere Speculation'

DETROIT (UP)—Ford Motor Co. refused Thursday to confirm or deny a report it was planning to issue stock for public sale in an effort to surpass General Motors as the auto industry's kingpin.

A spokesman for the billion-dollar company said an article appearing in this week's issue of Fortune Magazine saying stock would be offered "within the next several months" was "mere speculation."

## Oregon City to Have Safeway Warehouse

OREGON CITY (UP)—Plans for a 10 million dollar warehousing plant to serve Safeway stores were revealed here Thursday when the chain store firm applied for vacation of streets southeast of Clackamas, Ore.

Herb Hardy, counsel for Safeway stores, told the Clackamas county court that the firm plans an extensive warehouse development that would employ some 250 persons. Completion is planned for sometime in 1955.
