In 1918 the girls division of the YWCA was known throughout the country as the Girls Reserve. Later in 1946 as other communities used the term "Y-Teens", Salem named the junior girls clubs Y-Teens, while the senior clubs took the name "Tri-Y" to coincide with the boys' Hi-Y.

The newly named Y-Teens are off to a start of another rewarding year of YWCA activities, and the beautiful new building will add greatly to the enthusiasm of the Y-Teens.
