Rigdon Estate Valuation Set At \$105,834

A report by executors on the estate of Lloyd T. Rigdon, who died Feb. 25, shows the total valuation of the estate to be \$105,834, according to a Marion County probate court filing Wednesday.

The valuation is made up of \$25,100 in real property and \$80,734 in personal property.

Total deductions from the estate are \$27,323.

Rigdon was associated with his father in the ownership of the W. T. Rigdon mortuary for several years and in 1925 bought Mt. Crest Abbey Mausoleum, which he sold in 1949 to the mortuary.

Youth Remanded To District Court

Lendell Buttram, 17, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon along with six other boys in an escape at MacLaren School for Boys last week, was remanded to the Marion County District Court following a hearing in Juvenile Court Wednesday.

Three others, all 18, are being held in lieu of \$3,500 bail each. Another 17-year-old Tuesday was remanded to District Court, and two others, 16 and 17, are in custody of Juvenile Court.

Suit Filed in Auto Accident

An auto accident in Salem Feb. 20, 1934, resulted in an \$18,644 damage suit being filed in Marion County Circuit Court Wednesday.

Edna Hatfield filed the complaint against Glen Siddall and Evelyn S. Siddall.

According to the complaint the plaintiff was seriously injured in the crash which occurred at Court and N. 15th streets. She is seeking \$18,200 general and \$444 special damages.

New Bank May Open Temporary Office in Salem

The Commercial Bank, to be built on the corner of Chesapeake and N. Church Sts., may open an office in Salem previous to completion of the bank building, said Tinkham Gilbert, vice president, Wednesday.

Gilbert said he is now looking for a temporary site. He explained that if the proper office space was obtained the bank office would probably open around Jan. 1, two or three months before the bank building is scheduled to be finished.

Lipman's Plan Store Debut This Morning

Grand opening ceremonies for Lipman's of Salem, new \$3 million department store, begin today at 9:30 a.m.

Gov. Paul Patterson will open the store by cutting a pink satin ribbon across the Liberty St. entrance. A little over eight months ago Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay poured the first cement for the foundation of the new building.

Special feature of the opening ceremony is a handcarved wood antique sled filled with 30 dozen roses, which will stand at the Liberty Street entrance. The sled once belonged to a duchess in the court of Queen Marie Antoinette, according to Lipman's interior decorators.

Harold Wendel, president of the Portland company, will appear at the opening ceremonies, along with John W. Adion, general manager of the Salem store, to welcome the public to their first view of Salem's newest department store.

Landscaping Work Now Underway At Courthouse

Work started Wednesday to install an underground sprinkling system on the grounds of the new Marion County Courthouse in downtown Salem.

The Harry L. Pearty Nursery Co., which was awarded the job Tuesday of landscaping the grounds after submitting the low bid for the job, said excavation work for the planting of lawn and shrubs will start today.

Pearty said he hopes to have the sprinkler system and lawn completed by Oct. 1 and the shrubs planted shortly later.

Salmon Pack Decline Said Big in Alaska

Larry Meyers, city editor of the Ketchikan News, was a Salem visitor Wednesday.

Ketchikan calls itself the salmon capital of the world, but Meyers, in an interview, painted a sad picture of the decline of salmon fishing in Alaska. The value of the annual pack has decreased in late years from over \$8,000,000 to around \$3,000,000.

Over-fishing, use of fish traps, lack of adequate regulation and enforcement threaten this resource on which Alaska has depended greatly since the days of the gold rush, he commented.

Meyers had praise for the efforts of Secretary McKay whose Interior Department has supervision of Alaska fisheries, to set up conservation policies to save the salmon runs both in South-eastern Alaska and Bristol Bay, the leading producers of salmon.

High Court Resumes

The State Supreme Court Wednesday resumed hearing of cases but no decisions will be handed down this week, Chief Justice Earl Latourette said. Several of the justices were out of the city the past two weeks.

City Grocery Clerks Given Wage Boost

Wage increases for a large group of unionized Salem grocery store clerks was announced Wednesday.

The increases are retroactive to Aug. 1, according to John R. Moore, business representative of the AFL Retail Clerks Union, Local 992. The contract was signed Tuesday night following a negotiation meeting.

About 150 grocery and vegetable clerks in most of Salem's larger markets are included in the union. Cooperating in the negotiations have been the Federal Mediation Service and the Salem Central Labor Council.

Women clerks in the top wage brackets will receive a 7 1/2 cents per hour increase and men in that category will receive 6 1/2 cents.

Both men and women in lower brackets will receive increases ranging from 2 to 5 cents per hour.

Youth Group Selects Calves At State Fair

Spotlighting junior activities Wednesday at the Oregon State Fair, was the 8th annual calf selection sale sponsored by the Oregon State Holstein Association.
